Great resources are located in your community. When developing a 4-H Cloverbud Camp think about the following:

- » What organizations might be able to assist in program delivery?
- » Are there locations in your community you could visit as a field trip?
- » Do current 4-H volunteers have an expertise they could share?
- » Would a local police or fire department offer tours or come and talk to campers?
- » Are there community partners that might sponsor a specific theme for a camp?
- » Would local businesses sponsor campers so they could attend at a lower cost?

Statewide Resources and Partners

Don't forget that other MSU Extension and 4-H staff can be great resources for 4-H Cloverbud Camps. Utilizing other MSUE or 4-H programs is a great way to enhance your programming and help meet the needs of other staff. Consider the following:

- » Asking work teams if there are activities or programs that can be used or provided.
- » Asking local nutrition or early childhood staff to provide an activity or program.



GOOD TO KNOW

- ⇒ Check out SharePoint under the Cloverbuds folder for ready-made templates and samples.
- ⇒ Don't reinvent the wheel: if you are hosting a 4-H Cloverbud Camp for the first time — reach out! Talk to staff that have gone through the process and see what materials, thoughts and ideas they have to offer.
- ⇒ Keep it simple: providing programming for Cloverbuds is more about the experience than the project. Focus on providing a fun, safe environment where the youth are free to explore and learn.
