- More exposures to a type of food can lead to greater
- Lesson plans bring meals and nutrition into the classroom and allow children to come to food on their own terms
- Opportunity to build in other subjects in innovative ways





WHAT CAN BE INCLUDED IN LESSON PLANS?

- Nutrition, health, and healthy eating
- Information on local agriculture, crops that grow near
- > Environment
- Stories highlighting food and agriculture
- Farm field trips and activity days
- Gardening activities

STEP 1: CHOOSE FOODS TO HIGHLIGHT

- Create a calendar
- Plan days for education before products show up in meals
- Focusing on one a month to start can make a program more sustainable
- Build activity into part of your day
- Involve teachers in planning

EASY WAYS TO INTEGRATE

- > Taste tests or other observations with highlighted food
- ➤ Involve children in snack preparation
- Build stories about food into morning circle time
- Chef or farmer visits to talk about specific food highlighted





LESSON PLANS FOR ANY VEGETABLE

- ➤ Discuss different types of a product, including comparing shapes, sizes, smells, tastes, etc.
- Count seeds from different types of vegetables
- > Plant seeds and have children note the differences
- Discuss the different parts of plants, how they grow, and what part you eat
- Develop an art project around the featured food

EXAMPLE FROM ADVENTURES LEARNING CENTER

- <u>Math</u>: Seeds (counting, sorting, different shapes), Sprouting (measuring sprouts, documentation, graphing)
- <u>Science</u>: Soil, worms, lots of discovery table use, being the growing process inside, "Smelling" garden (which all items can be tasted too!), dissecting vegetables and fruits
- <u>Art:</u> painting with vegetables, painting with soil, using gardening tools to paint, lots of finger painting and printing to make vegetables and fruit pictures
- <u>Books & Reading</u>: <u>The Tiny Seed</u> Eric Carle, <u>Growing</u> <u>Vegetable Soup</u> Lois Ehlert, <u>Planting a Rainbow</u> Lois Ehlert, <u>The Little Gardener</u> Jan Gerardi, <u>Eating the Alphabet</u>, Lois Elhert.
- Cooking: Each week lesson plans include a cooking activity;
 items from the garden are being used for snack time
- Home Area/Dress up Area: gardening gloves, hats, gardening tools, baskets, overalls, boots, play vegetables and fruits
- Moving and Grooving: Garden Yoga for Kids
