

## **Spring Beauty and Busyness**

Our Gardens are starting to bloom. In Mid-March we began seeing our Hellebores bloom (pictured top right), as well as our spring ephemerals like Winter aconite (Eranthis hyemalis; pictured bottom right).

## HONORING THE FATHER OF MODERN HORTICULTURE

Liberty Hyde Bailey (pictured bottom right) was one of America's greatest horticultural minds. Born and raised on a fruit farm in Michigan, he earned his undergraduate degree in Botany at Michigan Agricultural College (MAC; now MSU) in 1882. A few years later, he established the first horticulture department in the U.S. at MAC and served as its professor and chair. Bailey was a gifted and enthusiastic botanist, taxonomist, philosopher, writer, and teacher and is considered by most to be the Father of Modern Horticulture.

To honor this renowned 19th-century horticulturist, the Liberty Hyde Bailey Sculpture Plaza was established in the MSU Horticulture Gardens in 1993 by two generous donors. The plaza features a bronze life-size statue of Bailey (pictured top right) sculpted by a Michigan artist and is the largest and most prominent statue in our Gardens. Countless students, faculty, staff, and visitors take selfies with Bailey each year and often pick a flower in the gardens and place it in his hands.

Over the years, the Bailey statue has experienced extensive degradation of its finishes (pictured middle right). Of particular concern is the face and inside of the figure's trousers, where rivulets of water have left pronounced vertical streaks. Left unchecked, these oxidative mineral deposits will etch into the bronze, permanently disfiguring the statue.

We are seeking support to restore this treasure. We are running a CrowdPower campaign (which is MSU's version of GoFundMe) to help raise funds needed. All donations through this campaign will go directly to fix the sculpture.

The restoration of Bailey includes an art restoration firm cleaning, repatinating, sealing, and waxing the bronze. This will protect the metal from further corrosion, give it better overall visual continuity, and make it much easier to maintain.



## NOTEWORTHY ANNUALS IN THE SPRING PLANT SALE

It has been two years since I've been able to do an article like this! We are excited to gear up for our first-ever online spring plant sale. We hope to raise some much-needed funding for the gardens while providing you with some fantastic plants in the process! Here are some of my favorite varieties on offer:

#### Impatiens walleriana 'Beacon' series

I generally don't get particularly excited about Impatiens, but the Beacon series is a game-changer! Prior to the spread of Impatiens Downy Mildew (IDM) around 2013, Impatiens walleriana (often referred to as seed impatiens) was a staple shade annual. In fact, they were once the third-highest value floriculture crop in the US, behind Petunia (#1) and Pansy/Viola (#2). However, once IDM reared its ugly head, both greenhouse growers and consumers shied away from seed impatiens. Since 2013, plant breeders have been

working behind the scenes, developing IDM-resistant cultivars. We know that our soil at the MSU Gardens still harbors the IDM pathogen. During the last two trial seasons, we evaluated two new series of IDM-resistant seed impatiens. When planted alongside older, pre-2013, varieties, the difference in survivability and performance was like night and day! If you've been itching to get seed impatiens back in your shade garden, the time has come!

#### **Ornamental Millet 'Jade Princess'**

Jade Princess is an annual ornamental millet variety with mounds of chartreuse foliage and flamboyant reddish-brown flower plumes. If you know me as a gardener, or have ever attended one of my talks on garden design, you know that I love chartreuse in the garden! It's a color that goes well with everything and can really brighten up bland combinations. I've also started to branch out more in my use of annual ornamental grasses during the last couple years. I used to stick to mostly Pennisetum varieties (like the highly popular purple fountain grass), but I have more recently found an appreciation for ornamental corn and ornamental millet, as well as some of the smaller annual grasses such as the many colorful and texturally diverse Carex varieties.

#### Caladium

Caladium provides a tropical look in your garden with their large showy leaves. Some are suntolerant, while others need a shady spot, so make sure you pick a variety that suits your location. We have only offered this plant a couple of times in the last 8 years, so make sure to get some of this specialty item while you can! Greenhouse-grade Caladium tubers must be ordered many months in advance and are usually cost-prohibitive for us to purchase. However, we were able to acquire some extra tubers from a researcher on campus and are happy to pass our good luck along to you!



If you are a Garden Member, you will receive an email on April 25 with early access to our inventory beginning on April 26! Not a Member yet?






There are 32 ways to filter items in our store. We know you will enjoy looking for and finding exactly what you want (and then some)!

## Description

Espalier is the practice of pruning and tying

branches to a frame or trellis, in formal or informal patterns, flat against a structure such as a wall, fence, or trellis. It is an ancient art that allows the skilled gardener to train shoots in various designs and angular patterns often creating symmetry and artistic value while concurrently providing fruit for the table. In espalier, a design is developed which provides a roadmap for branch growth, development, and training. The gardener then actively directs growth to adhere to a selected or created design. Fruit production is not as important as the visual creation. The intrinsic value of espalier is that designs are an expression of artistic creativity and skill in gardening. Drs. Perry and Getter provide experienced gardeners with the information needed to successfully create an espalier planting. Learn about espalier and tree fruit terminology, species selection and fruiting requirements, site establishment and preparation, proper planting and care practices, training, management, and pruning.

## BETHANY'S FAVORITE PERENNIALS

Our plant sale is back in full force this year, and we know you missed us! While my sale stock is a little more limited, I am still growing some amazing perennials that you absolutely want for your yard, or to gift to a fellow plant lover. Here are some you don't want to miss!

## Brunnera macrophylla 'Queen of Hearts'

Brunnera is essential in any shade garden, as it lightens up the garden floor with shades of silverygreen leaves with baby blue flowers in spring, while

providing unique textures. 'Queen of Hearts' is unique as these characteristics are even more pronounced, and you still get the joy of the baby blue flowers in spring.

#### **Origanum 'Drops of Jupiter'**

This stunning perennial incorporates ornamental aspects of oregano while still giving you that relaxing smell as you work around it in the garden. The foliage sports golden shades while the flowers pop above, attracting an array of pollinators. Flowers are long-lasting and violet, providing great contrast against the foliage. We can't wait to add this plant from Walter's Gardens into our collection!

## Penstemon digitalis 'Mystica'

I'm not sure why, but I never really gave Penstemon the time of day as a horticulturist. Something about it never really excited me, until one recent fall I looked behind my shoulder and saw a magnificent display of deep red that caught the attention of both myself and my student. We walked over and I realized what it was - Penstemon digitalis 'Mystica' (sometimes I can forget what I have planted - it helps to keep good notes!). The foliage holds on until deep fall, too, making it a long lasting, multi-seasonal perennial. The flowers are adored by bumble bees, making them fun to observe as they do their work!
