2018 4-H Exploration Days

June 20-22, 2018
Michigan State University

4-H Exploration Days is an annual state youth conference held on the campus of MSU that is open to all youth ages 11-19 by January 1. This event is meant to be a learning experience that will instill self-esteem, decision-making skills, independent thinking and leadership skills. The full time participant fee is \$165 which includes meals, lodging, and a t-shirt. 4-H Council will pay half the fee for full time registration. We also have a limited number of \$40 scholarships that are available, but youth have to fill out an application.

Registration begins on March 13 and sessions fill up very fast, so turn in your registration forms as soon as possible to the Extension office. A \$40 deposit is due at the time of registration.

Dairy Feeder Weigh-In

Saturday, March 10, 2018

8:30 a.m. - 11:30 a.m.

Isabella County Fairgrounds

Animals cannot weigh over 250 lbs. and must be:

- One of the following breeds: Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, or Jersey
- Castrated & Dehorned

Each member can either:


- Weigh in a maximum of two feeders or,
- Within immediate families of more than one exhibitor: each member may weigh in one feeder, and one "family alternate" can be weighed in for the family. Only one feeder per exhibitor can be brought to fair when a family alternate has been weighed in.

It's required that by Fair, every feeder must have a RFID tag (radio frequency identification) in their ear.

Small Animal News

- If you do not already have your small animal purchase arranged, you should do so now. For example, there are only a couple of rabbit shows before the May 1 deadline and if you haven't placed an order or made contact with someone, it may be too late to get the breed you would like to have. If you wait until April 15 or later, it will be very difficult to have your animal(s) by May.
- Reminder, if you live outside of Isabella County and plan to sell in the small animal auction, you will need approval from the Small Animal Association. Plan to attend their next meeting on Thursday, March 15 at 7:00 p.m. at the Isabella County Building. If you have already met with the Small Animal Association to sell in the auction and were approved, you do not have to do it again.
- Rabbit members: when shopping for your fair animal, it is beneficial to work with a reputable breeder; someone who guarantees their animals. We suggest you not purchase your rabbits from pet stores. Take your breed standard when you go shopping so you can have a guide for finding a good representation. For instance, make sure a Mini Rex doesn't have too long of ears; a Dutch doesn't have a split stop or cheek color into the mouth; any of the lop breeds need to have a correct crown; etc. You need to purchase a rabbit with a full pedigree. Only first year members are allowed to have a mixed breed rabbit, which does not mean a recognized breed with disqualifications.
- Poultry members: we have brand new showmanship guides. Copies will be available at the showmanship clinics this summer.
- In the April newsletter we will have the schedule of upcoming showmanship clinics. Dates will be set at our March meeting.

Shooting Sports Instructors Needed


We are looking for volunteer leaders to become certified as 4-H Shooting Sports instructors in archery, rifle, and shotgun.

As a community service coupled with a fundraiser for the Fair Board's Building Fund, we are asking the 4-H community ages 17 and over to consider donating blood on **June 2, from 9 am - 2 pm**, at the Veteran's Memorial Library Annex, 301 S University, in Mt. Pleasant. If you are 16 and have donated in the past or have parental consent, you may also participate. We will be working with the staff of Michigan Blood because **100%** of the blood donated is used for people in our communities -- it does not leave the state. They also run their drives on a set schedule, so everyone who agrees to participate will have a specific appointment, making it a better use of your time. If you have not already done so and would be willing to donate, please call the Extension Office and leave your contact information. Over the next few weeks, you will be contacted regarding your availability on June 2. For those of you who have already called in, THANK YOU, and we will also reach out to you very shortly. The building fund will receive \$10 per donation, but we must have at least 15 viable donors to qualify. Our initial goal is to get 30 appointments set by April 10.





4-H Exploration Days registration opening March 13



4-H Exploration Days participants partake in a variety of fun, educational sessions while at MSU.

4-H Exploration Days is Michigan 4-H's largest pre-college program and could be the highlight of your summer—maybe even change your life! Registration for this popular event will open March 13 and is open to any Michigan 4-H'er above the age of 11 as of Jan. 1.

4-H Exploration Days is designed to help youth build the skills they need to successfully transition to college and to life as an adult.

Michigan 4-H youth who participate have the opportunity to stay in MSU campus residence halls while attending classroom and field trip sessions throughout their stay.

With more than 200 session choices held on and off campus, there are topics for everyone including animal science, business and entrepreneurship, international language and culture, performing and visual arts, and science, engineering, and technology. During the 2017 4-H Exploration Days, nearly 2,000 youth attended and they gained important life skills like decision making, problem solving and communication.

Registration will be available beginning March 13 at 9 a.m. All registration information should be turned in to your county's Extension office, typically by the end of April. 4-H Great Lakes and Natural Resources Camp

From August 5 to 11, 4-H youth with an interest in the outdoors have the opportunity to engage in an amazing outdoor, hands-on learning experiences at the 4-H Great Lakes and Natural Resources Camp (GLNRC). Held annually at Camp Chickagami in Presque Isle, camp participants get to go charter fishing, snorkeling, sailing and hiking, while learning about Great Lakes ecology, natural resources and environmental education.

Declared one of the top eight 4-H science programs nationally in 2012, the goal of GLNRC is to help prepare, reinforce and enrich what youth have already learned in school and what they will learn in the future. This is achieved by allowing participants to spend one week learning from experts about coastal ecology, fisheries management, limnology, wildlife, invasive species and forestry. After attending the camp, participating youth will gain knowledge and skills in environmental science and related careers.

To attend, youth must be between the ages of 13 and 15 and apply online. Registrations are due by May 1, but space is limited to 70 campers, so early application is encouraged. For more information, visit www.canr.msu.edu/4_h_great_lakes_natural_resources_camp.

New Diddy Squat lessons available

TEACHING SCIENCE
...when you don't know diddy-squat

Why are animals' feet different?

Purpose:
The purpose is **not** to teach specific content, but to teach the process of science—asking questions and discovering answers. This activity encourages young people to try to figure things out for themselves rather than just read an answer on the internet or in a book. As a teacher, try not to express your opinions, but let the youth engage in arguments based on evidence.

Time required:
20 minutes or multiple days depending on the interest and questions the youth have.

Materials:

- 1 Balloon
- 1 Measuring or first aid tape
- 1 Ziploc bag
- 1 Paper or news tin (optional)
- 1 The scales or separator (as used in lab)
- 1 Materials for an obstacle course (the creative examples include a hoola-hoop to use as a balance beam, blocks or stacking stones, line or hula-hoop to step in and out of, steps to step over, etc.)
- 1 A safe place to walk forward.

Note: Before beginning, talk to the participants about safety. They should have fun while learning, but trying to run with unsure footing could lead to a fall or a twisted ankle.

SCIENCE PRACTICE: Asking questions and defining problems

Ask: Are animal feet different from human feet? How are they different? Do you think animals' feet give them any advantages or disadvantages as compared to human feet? How and why are chicken feet different from duck feet? How and why are horse feet different from cow feet?

SCIENCE PRACTICE: Developing and using models

1. Could you modify your own feet to make them more like animal feet? Place a balloon under each heel so you are walking more on your toes. (Mooves essentially walk on a single toe, similar to the balloon taped under the heel.) What will happen if you tape them together? (Cattle, pigs, sheep and goats also walk more on their hooves, but they have two hooves. Tape the participants' feet together in two groups. Then put a balloon under each heel.) Some animal feet are spaced apart more than ours are. Place two balloons taped upside down between each toe on both of your feet. How does that affect your walking? (Chickens and other birds have spaced toes. See with the toe spacer.) How might the flip-flop or flipper be more like animal feet? (Ducks have webbed feet like the flippers.) What will happen if you have a piece of cardboard larger than the flip-flop to the bottom of the flip-flop? (Some animals have hooves that walk in a groove or mold like rubber.) What are the limitations of these models? Is there anything you can do to make them more accurate to be more like an animal foot?

SCIENCE PRACTICE: Planning and carrying out investigations

1. Set up an obstacle course with various objects as described under "Materials." Participants go through the course with different types of feet and observe how it affects their balance, speed and coordination.

Three new lesson plans are now available in the "Teaching Science When You Don't Know Diddy-Squat" series. With a focus on sight, animal feet and math, the new lesson plans are not meant to teach specific content, but to teach the process of science.

Asking questions and discovering answers encourages 4-H'ers to figure things out for themselves.




