Keeping Students off Academic Probation

This past year, the percentage of Michigan State University first-time freshmen placed on academic probation at the end of the fall semester dropped from 10 percent to 8 percent – which accounts for roughly 200 first-time freshmen. However, these percentages change significantly with seemingly minor improvements in student performance. For example, 30 percent of the students with first semester GPA's between 2.0 and 2.5 graduated in four years and 64 percent graduated in six years. <u>READ MORE.</u>

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Twenty-three High School Seniors Receive Full Scholarships




Traverse City Native and MSU Grad Lands Page Position at NBCUniversal
