News and Views

One of the things I like about writing the "News and Views" piece, is that it allows me to offer opinion, not just science based info. We have been in a bit of a whirl wind in agriculture since Covid shutdowns started back in March of 2020. We saw markets act out of character with situations where livestock harvest facilities were shutdown to the point that they could not keep up with market ready livestock. At the same time, harvest numbers were down and product movement was limited to the point where we saw empty shelves in grocery stores. Supply and demand were all messed up. Farmers had no market outlet, while consumers could not get the food they wanted.

As we came out of lockdown, inflation ramped up. We went from using almost no fuel with low process to raging fuel prices. Still store shelves sat empty while goods sat on boats in the ocean for over a month waiting to be unloaded. Not enough trucks to move goods around the country.

During those times fertilizer and fuel prices close to doubled. National cost of agriculture production increased from 25-50%. Many commodity prices were already high or went that way soon. USDA data indicates that farm profitability as measured by net farm income was the highest ever in 2021 and 2022. That is expected to change as input prices refuse to lower. I suspect some of that profitability was from input pre-purchases. Buying fertilizer, seed, etc. to offset taxes before input prices started to inflate. That will not be the case in 2023. Input prices are already high. We will see where they go from here.

This is where my opinion starts to kick in. Depending on your news source, you may be getting varied predictions about our economic future regarding interest rates, inflation, disinflation, recession, and deflation. Some say we are in for a soft landing. I think a recession is coming. Along with that, probably deflation. From an input standpoint I certainly do hope we see deflation bring fertilizer, fuel, seed, and other inputs down. History would suggest that is going to be the case. I expect some commodity prices are going to have some downside pressure as consumer dollars get tighter.

I am in a quandary in my thoughts of what is going to happen with machinery costs. I can find historical data to support my belief that as we go through whatever economic cycle we go through that input prices will stabilize. I cannot find the same data to look at the machinery side of it. In the last 18 months, machinery and parts prices have increased from an index of 190 to 250. I cannot find that type of price increase going back to 1982. Consequently, I can not find data to indicate that those prices will lower back in line.

I went through those thoughts and opinions to talk about risk management. Not just commodity price risk but all prices. I do not have a good strategy for decreasing input costs, mostly because I still do not know if input prices have stabilized and are soon to go down or if inflation just took a break and is about to ramp up again. I do like to lock prices in, when possible, both buying and selling. But buying fertilizer last fall, only to see it drop prices by spring would make me pull my hair out. If you can project a profit at a certain price, lock it in.

What can I do with farm machinery? Buy now? Buy later? That's probably a cash flow, income tax, balance sheet question. If you have been regularly purchasing equipment, cash flow is working and the balance sheet is both solvent and liquid, keep buying equipment. If not, maybe look to extend the life of current machinery and hope supply and demand comes back into check. If you ever want to talk about risk management, please give me a call.

2023 U.P. Food Summit to be held March 27

The U.P. Food Exchange (UPFE) is pleased to announce that registration is open for the 2023 U.P. Food Summit. The Summit will be held on Monday, March 27, 2023 from 10am-4pm at the Northern Center, on the campus of Northern Michigan University.

This event celebrates local food, highlights projects from around the Upper Peninsula, and provides networking opportunities. The keynote speakers are Roger LaBine, Water Resource Technician for the Lac Vieux Desert Band of Lake Superior Chippewa, and Kathleen Smith, Manoomin Ganawandang or "She who takes care of the wild rice," for the Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission. Kathleen and Roger will present findings on the impact of climate change on wild rice in the Great Lakes area.

Other presentations planned for the day include an overview of the U.P. wide Prescription for Health and farm-based cold storage grant program that was launched in 2022, training for food producers on schools as markets, and results of a food aggregation and distribution hub feasibility study. The day will include more than presentations – it is also built around opportunities to participate in interactive demonstrations, discussions, and local food story telling.

"Our local food system is something to be celebrated. This event gives people from different parts of the food system a chance to connect with each other. We want to think collectively about where we are now with local food in the UP, and what the future could look like," says Rachael Pressley, Regional Planner at the Western Upper Peninsula Planning and Development Region (WUPPDR) and member of the UPFE Food Summit Planning Team.

This event, which includes lunch and refreshments, is free thanks to generous funding from the USDA Regional Food Systems Partnership Grant, or Food SPICE, Food Systems Partners Investing in Communities and Entrepreneurs, and MSU Center for Regional Food Systems. MDARD In-Person Core Testing and Core Review

MDARD PPPMD and MSU Pesticide Safety Education Program are offering an in-person Core Manual review class followed by Core pesticide applicator certification testing. Fumigation and Aerial Standard tests will also be available.

PRIVATE CORE, FUMIGATION STANDARD, AERIAL STANDARD AND COMMERCIAL CORE TESTS ONLY. NO COMMERCIAL CATEGORY TESTS.

ATTENDANCE FOR THE CORE REVIEW IS MANDATORY TO PARTICIPATE IN THE IN-PERSON TESTING.

The 4-hour review covers all of the chapters of the National Pesticide Applicators Certification Core Manual. The review is held in the morning and the MDARD exams are given that afternoon. We recommend participants read and study the Core Manual before attending the review. Copies may be ordered from: https://npsecstore.com/pages/michigan. County Extension may also have copies available. Please call ahead for availability.

Check-in for the program is 7:30 to 8 a.m. The Core review class is from 8 a.m. to noon. MDARD will begin the testing session at approximately 12:30 p.m.

FEES and PAYMENT:

Fee for the Core review class is \$25.00. Payment is to Michigan State University. You can pay by credit card when checking out here, mail payment to the address on the confirmation/invoice, or bring payment with you to the session. Making payment at the session - checks are made payable to Michigan State University or MSU. Cash payment at the session is also accepted. Receipts will be sent to the email address provided with the registration.

Fee for applicator certification is paid to the STATE OF MICHIGAN. Commercial Applicator certification fee is \$75.00, Private Applicator fee is \$50.00 and Registered Applicator fee is \$45.00. Military Veterans - Private applicator certification fees are waived if a copy of their DD214 is provided. A check payable to "State of Michigan" is the only payment accepted for the applicator certification fee. Postage paid envelopes to send certification payment to MDARD are provided at the session. Cash or credit card payments are not accepted.
