INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS AND RELATED ACTIVITIES

Foreign Educational Services and Professional Experiences of Members of Department of Agricultural Economics, Michigan State University both Before and After Joining M.S.U. Staff

Introduction

One of the interesting facets in the history of the work in agricultural economics at Michigan State University is the involvement of staff members in study and in teaching, research and extension activities in other countries. After a modest beginning in the 1930s, the major involvement started in about 1950 and has greatly increased in importance since that period. This involvement has ranged from short study tours and attendance at international conferences on one hand to long-term residence programs on the other.

With a modest beginning in the '30s by Hill, Berg and Ulrey, staff member involvement in research and educational programs has continued to increase in scope and time until the middle '60s when in 1964, sixteen staff members spent a total of 94 months in such activities.

The major reasons for departmental involvement in agricultural programs in foreign countries has been primarily to help increase the food supply and general welfare of such countries by the export of our technical skills and know-how. Such participation has been made possible. (1) by requests for such services by foreign countries, (2) by a recognition on the part of the administration of Michigan State University of our responsibilities to aid

other countries and (3) by the availability of funds for such purposes provided by the many sponsors listed in Table 5 of this report. The major sponsors being US/AID, Ford Foundation, Kellogg Foundation, U. S. Army, U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Department of State and foreign governments, universities and institutes.

Agricultural Economics staff members, a study was outlined and its initial phases completed in 1965. A total of 64 persons were included in the study. Included were 45 persons who were staff members as of October 1965 and 19 who had discontinued services during the period 7/1/59 to 6/30/65. Six of the 19 had had foreign experience or service. Few of the other earlier, pre 1959, former members of the Department had studied or served abroad professionally. The USDA group stationed at MSU was not included. A few others, at MSU for brief periods, may have been missed.

Total Years of Service Abroad

Twenty four of the 45 present members with foreign experience have spent a total of 47½ years abroad, see Tables 1 and 7. Six had spent a total of almost 11 years abroad before joining Michigan State.

The total foreign experience of present and former staff members is somewhat greater. For example, Perkins and Witt had full time foreign service jobs for a total of around 19 years before joining MSU. Only 100 months of service abroad between 7/1/1959 and 12/31/1965 are included in Table 1 for Perkins and Witt.

Proportion of Time in Fereign Service

The 22 staff members with services abroad while with MSU have spent 101 percent of their time abroad, Table 2.

More time than shown in the table has been devoted to foreign projects. For example, Hathaway, Riley, Stevens, Ulrey, Witt, Wright and perhaps others devoted time while in their offices at MSU to foreign research and development projects.

Continents of Foreign Service

Almost 70 percent of the foreign experience of the agricultural economists at MSU was in Asia and Latin America, Table 3. Three staff members were in each of the four areas: Johnson, Ulrey and Witt

The eight who served abroad before joining MSU spent 94 of their 180 months in Asia. This group included: Boyne, Hendry, Kaechele, Perkins, Stevens, Sturt, Wheeler and Witt.

Types of Foreign Experiences

Around 90 percent of the time spent abroad by 28 present and former staff members, while with MSU has been spent on various types of professional services and research projects, Table 4. Many research projects

were assisted by the staff members whose primary purpose was classified as professional services. Many staff members undoubtedly found time for a bit of extra travel and education while on professional service trips. For example, Ulrey had an extra five months of educational travel while on two professional service projects. Special trips to attend conferences of the International Association of Agricultural Economists were included under education and travel.

Sponsors and Financing

A total of 19 or more sponsors and financial arrangements provided for the 510 months abroad by 28 present and former members of the Department of Agricultural Economics, Table 5. US/AID and the Ford Foundation provided funds for 55 percent of the experiences abroad. Around 25 months, or five percent of the total, was financed by 11 staff members who did not obtain assistance for all or part of the trips.

Foreign Service by Years and Decades

The months of foreign service and travel by staff members while with MSU, by decades, were: thirties - 25; forties - none; fifties - 141; and sixties through 1965 - 344 months, or 2/3 of all foreign service in the sixties, Table 6.
