Program Highlights

NUTRITION EDUCATION

The Munising Public Schools hoop house, fruit orchard, and outdoor garden has grown with the help of a Policy, Systems, and Environmental Initiative from Vicki Ballas Alger County Community Nutrition Instructor.

The first priority of the gardens is to provide the school with healthy produce for all of their food service programs, then any extra produce is shared with teachers, students, and the local pantries. Students work all aspects of the garden and even utilize growing racks in the classroom for seed starting. Vicki is currently working on a Produce Safety Policy for the gardens to ensure the safest growing, handling, and harvesting conditions.

Program Highlights

AGRICULTURE (Pre-pandemic Jan—Mar)

Beginning Farmer Webinar Series and webpage: The 2020 series included 13 new topics for beginning farmers. 263 people participated in 'live' on-line programs, with 22 U.P. residents included. All webinars were recorded and archived on the MSUE Beginning Farmer Webinar Series webpage for free access by all interested people A total of 109 webinars have been offered, recorded an archived since this program began in 2012.

Pesticide applicator training: Live review classes for new and re-certifying applicators were offered to help people gain state certification. Jim Isleib participated with a statewide team of MSU Extension staff to prepare a recorded review class for on-line access.

Personal contacts by phone, email and personal visit to assist farmers and others with crop, garden and plant-based issues, including soil testing services were and are continuing support in Alger County.

The annual 'Ag for Tomorrow' conference was organized and held on March 11, 2020 at Bay College in Escanaba with leadership from Alger County MSUE staff. 135 in attendance, including 15 from Alger County.

MSUE maintained involvement and support for recycling programs in Alger County. Jim Isleib serves as secretary for the Alger Community Recycling Committee. A new state grant-funded electronic recycling program was funded and planned, but the pandemic interrupted its development. It will be re-started when possible.

The "What's U.P. @ UPREC?" video series was initiated in May, 2020. 31 short (3-9 minute) videos were produced at the MSU U.P. Research and Extension Center in Chatham to keep the agricultural community and general public informed about activities there during the pandemic restrictions. All videos were posted on You Tube and Facebook with 2,298 views and 103.4 hours of view time on You Tube and 'liked' by over 300 people on Facebook with thousands of views.

AGRICULTURE (Pandemic Apr—Dec)

The monthly MSU Extension "U.P. Ag Connections" newsletter continued through the entire year, with approximately 1000 copies distributed monthly via mail and email, including 47 Alger County recipients. The newsletter is supported by commercial advertisers.

Jim Isleib continued involvement in state-wide corn nitrogen and soil health study, involving three Alger County farms.

State-wide programs:

Weekly 7-7:30am 'virtual breakfast' on-line programs during growing season. Feature MSU ag specialists on timely topics plus a weekly, state-wide ag weather report and forecast.

MSUE Grazing School. **Eight on-line sessions** for new livestock grazers offered October 6-29, 2020. Features several MSU presenters, including J Isleib on soil fertility.

NATURAL RESOURCES

Despite facing significant challenges due to the coronavirus pandemic, there were still some interesting and active outdoor/environmental education activities created for students (and their families) to get involved with. The goal was that even through all these challenges and changes to our normal routines, we can still find opportunities to engage with and learn from the outdoors.

Working in conjunction with several partners, educational videos were created on tree identification and orienteering (using a map and compass). Both of these programs provided the necessary instruction for a family to explore on their own, even if only in their backyard, and also included resources to use in the field.

A typical programming year in **Alger County** offers opportunities for local students to be able to get outside to learn and explore, as part of their curriculum. This year, a number of natural resource related programs were able to be presented virtually to the classrooms instead. Topics included wildlife and logging history.

Investing Alger County Youth with 4-H

According to research completed by the Institute for Applied Research in Youth Development at Tufts University, 4-H'ers are 4X more likely to make contributions to their communities, 2X more likely to be civically active, and 2X more likely to make healthier choices.



2020 was certainly a strange year for all things youth programming! The year started off strong with a Winter Adventure SPIN club which saw youth learn cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, winter hiking and ice climbing, and the Spa Relaxation Club which taught youth about lotions, body butters, face masks, and more. The 4-H program also brought mindfulness education into five different classrooms and reached 100 youth with the Walmart Healthy Habits grant. In March, when the schools shut down, Alger 4-H was on the forefront of pivoting to virtual learning, creating a program within two weeks of the shut down that had over 300 participants. This program was called "Home Alone Safely" and taught youth skills about first aid, home safety, what to do in an emergency, and more. Other virtual programs led by Alger County 4-H included: Virtual Slumber Party, Taming your Inner Dragon with Mindfulness, Photo Voice, and Teen Healthy Relationships. 65 youth and their families also participated in the Holidays Around the World take home kit project. Each week families received a story and craft about a different holiday tradition.

In total Alger County reached 750 youth in a unprecedented year through a combination of in person and virtual programs.
