Mortality Management After a Rollover Event

A guide to mortality management options after an unexpected situation

Bodies of Dead Animals Act Information:

The Bodies of Dead Animals Act (BODA) outlines those options that are acceptable for mortality disposal in the state of Michigan (https://www.michigan.gov/mdard/0,4610,7-125-48096_48404---,00.html). These options include landfill, rendering, composting, burial, and incineration.

Landfill:

- a. Must be a Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) licensed landfill
 - i. List of EGLE landfills in the state of Michigan: https://www.michigan.gov/egle/0,9429,7-135-3312 4123-9894--,00.html
 - ii. Call ahead to see if landfill accepts dead animals

Rendering:

- a. Must be a state licensed renderer

Composting:

- a. Can occur on your own property or other property with permission as long as you are following the below composting procedures:

- b. Can also occur at a registered composting facility

 - ii. Call ahead to make sure composting facility accepts dead animals

Burial:

- a. Can potentially occur on your own property or other property with permission as long as following the below requirements:
 - i. Sites must not have contact with surface or ground water
 - ii. Sites must be 200 feet from wells
 - iii. Individual and common graves are allowable (see the Bodies of Dead Animals Act page 3) https://dtmb.state.mi.us/ORRDocs/AdminCode/1564 2015-059AC AdminCode.pdf

Incineration:

- a. Must be permitted by the Air Quality Division of EGLE
 - i. Capacity could make this difficult if a large mortality event occurs
 - ii. No current online list of municipal waste incinerators

Other:

a. Other methods may be used with approval from the Director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development: https://www.michigan.gov/mdard/0,4610,7-125-1572 82358---,00.html
