Needlepoint Basics:

• **Never** use rippers. Pull stitches out one by one.

- Always count the string, not the holes
- Numbers on chart the odd numbers are always up, even numbers are down
- Mark canvas with hard lead pencil or needlepoint marking pen
- One or more colors can be used on each stitch
- **Never** have a knot on any work. Weave each end in 2".
- Use blunt end needlepoint needles, sometimes called tapestry needles
- Always put masking tape on sides of canvas.

9 – 11 year olds or beginners

- Quickpoint a form of needlepoint which is particularly suited to beginners. A
 larger mesh canvas is used (5 squares per inch), but the results are very
 satisfactory for the young needlepointer.
- A design, no larger than 10" by 10" is recommended
- For plastic canvas, suggested projects are: Christmas ornaments, key chains

12 – 14 year olds or juniors

- Transfer an easy design unto canvas and complete.
- For plastic canvas, suggested projects are: tissue holder (Kleenex box on plastic), box, wall hanging (quilt designs on plastic)

15 – 19 year olds or seniors

- · A complex or difficult design
- Additional activities can include using more novelty stitches, making own (original) pattern, and adapting patters and ideas to fit own needs.
- For plastic canvas, suggested projects are: game set such as checkers, holiday wall hanging, baby mobile, calendar

These are **only guidelines**. Member's project should be based on skill and experience. A more difficult project should be selected each year to continually grow skills.
