### **INTRODUCTION**

Our society has developed important social institutions, which enable us to pursue personal fulfillment. One of these institutions is loosely identified as leisure services. This course is designed to orient students majoring in Park, Recreation and Tourism Resources to the conceptual foundations, constellation of services, and management issues associated with the profession. It is also designed for people undecided about a career or in another career path to better understand the field of parks, recreation and tourism and the importance of leisure service to them and society. Primary focal points for this course include:

- a) historical and philosophical foundations of the parks and recreation field
- b) the demand for resources and services
- c) the types of resources and services and how they are managed
- d) career and professional opportunities
- e) significance of recreation and leisure in your life.

# **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

This course is designed to enable you to:

- explore the rudiments of historical and current views of recreation, leisure, play and work;
- formulate personal working definitions for the above mentioned concepts and begin developing a professional philosophy;
- become aware of professional responsibilities and resources;
- understand the basic motivations for recreation participation for various segments of society;
- examine the recreation resource and delivery systems in the public and private sectors;
- investigate the various aspects of the field including tourism, commercial recreation, natural resource based recreation, visitor information services, programming, planning, research, and therapeutic recreation.
- interview a park and recreation professional to discuss park, recreation or tourism resource management regarding a preferred recreation activity.

#### ASSIGNMENTS

<u>ASSIGNMENT #1</u> (two sections) **PERSONAL DEFINITION OF RECREATION - Due: February 15** 2-3 typed single spaced pages not including title page or reference page. (70 points)

- A. State clearly <u>your</u> definition of recreation. Describe the elements of this definition and why you believe that they are important. Present a definition of recreation from the literature and discuss why you selected this particular definition. Compare and contrast your definition with the definition from the literature. Then, use the <u>literature (your texts and other Park and Recreation literature not the dictionary)</u> to define "leisure," "play" and "tourism" and explain how these concepts relate to your definition of recreation. Also, discuss if recreation is the antithesis of work.
- B. Discuss how the following factors have affected your current participation in recreational activities:
  - MSU/Lansing area and one other place that you have lived;
  - current age;
  - current economic condition;
  - current personal mobility (physical and mechanical);
  - friends and family influence (and preferred social group);
  - experiences, training, opportunities as a child; and
  - other relevant factors (factors that have influenced your recreation behavior and are not included in the list above);

\* Note: Relating elements of your paper to readings concerning these factors from your text and class discussion is beneficial.

# ASSIGNMENT #2 MANAGEMENT OF LEISURE SERVICES (Group Paper) - Due: April 12

In a group of 3-5 students, select a recreation activity in which all participate or one in which all have a strong interest, even if not all have participated. Locate a recreation service organization that offers this activity. Make an appointment to interview an organizational manager responsible for the activity and gather the following information:

- A. Describe the activity and the history of each group members' involvement with that activity (participant, spectator, provider).
- B. Choose a site where the activity is offered and discuss the management of that site. In your discussion include:
  - mission of the organization and management objectives of the site or facility;
  - whether the personnel, facilities and/or natural resource(s) that directly support the activity are provided by the government or private sector;
  - whether the provision of the activity profit-oriented (if not profit-oriented, but fees are collected, where do the fees go?);
  - explanation of the annual operating budget for the site (or organization if the site cannot be separated from the organization budget). This includes the number of full-time and seasonal employees and the percentage and amount budgeted toward wages/benefits; contractual services, supplies and materials; vehicles and travel; and all other expenses.
  - the sources of funding for this budget <u>AND</u> the percentages each source comprises of the total operating budget;
  - description (demographic profile) of the users/participants at the site, accommodations for those with disabilities, and focus on special populations;
  - overview of the visitor information system/promotional efforts/marketing strategies used to reach clients/visitors/users.
  - C. In addition, from your interview *discuss* two challenges confronting the managers of the activity. If the person you interview suggests no challenges, your group needs to suggest two based on your observations, the interview and the literature. These challenges may be related only to your specific activity site or be common wherever the activity is provided. Cite an article in the park, recreation and tourism literature for each challenge you discuss.
  - D. To conclude the paper, **EACH** student is to describe his/her impressions of the organization and how it manages the selected activity. Also, **EACH** student shall state specifically how this investigation has affected his/her view of the activity of interest and recreation services in general.
  - E. Appendix: Provide the written questions used during your interview and the full name, title and address of the manager who was interviewed. Include a copy of the professional letter you jointly sent thanking the manager for his/her assistance.

In this paper document your knowledge through use of course notes and references to readings. Length: 4-5 pages single spaced, excluding title page, reference list, and appendix. (85 group points and 15 individual points).
