

Program Highlights

NUTRITION EDUCATION: ALWAYS LISTENING

Third grade students from North Elementary School located in Iron Mountain, MI. Jessica Corn has been programming with these particular students since they were in first grade.

Jessica has been implementing the SNAP-Ed Program for 4 years now to some of the same students. This gives her the opportunity to build children's ideas and knowledge about nutrition and physical activity as they enter new grades. This particular 3rd grade class contained students that have been programmed with in 1st and 2nd grade, and are now going to be taught nutrition information as 3rd graders. For example, when I entered the room, ready to implement my first of 6 sessions with them, a boy raised his hand and let me know that he remembers that a person is not only supposed to eat only one kind of fruit but that you should be eating all different kinds of fruit to get a variety of vitamins. Then another child raised their hand excitedly and couldn't wait to tell me that she remembered that I taught her that we need to eat food because that is what fuels our body to give us energy. Then another child informed me that she remembered me telling her that foods made with a lot of sugar or fat are "sometimes" foods and that we shouldn't eat them as often as the food in the 5 food groups. One after another, the students began raising their hands to tell me about all of the things they had learned about nutrition from previous years. Moments like that, help me to realize that children really are listening to what we are saying and teaching them. This magnified the importance of teaching them how to properly take care of themselves.







Program Highlights

SERVSAFE

Beth Waitrovich conducted a ServSafe class for Dickinson County in March. There were 14 participants.

Michigan State University Extension offers ServSafe, a national certification program for those working in food service, specifically managers and other leaders.

ServSafe teaches about foodborne illness, how to prevent it and how to train employees about the latest food safety issues. The ServSafe Manager course uses proven techniques, provides new Food & Drug Administration food code rules and content related to the food industry.

Topics include: providing safe food, forms of contamination, the safe food handler, the flow of food, food safety management systems, safe facilities & pest management, cleaning & sanitizing.

This course provides participants education to successfully pass the ServSafe Food Protection Manager Certification exam.

HOME OWNERSHIP EDUCATION CLASSES

Home ownership education classes were held in January and April of 2020 with 46 participants.

This series was offered virtually in collaboration with other 4-H Program Coordinators from across the U.P. The program was a success as you can see by the parent quotes below.


