Hi 4-H Family,

I want to start out this week's email digest by discussing the issue of systemic racism and our commitment to equity across MSU Extension by sharing this message from our leadership team:

We are saddened and outraged by the continued societal tolerance of racism, violence and traumatization of Black people and communities of color. We know our feelings do not match the intensity of the pain and trauma of our colleagues and communities of color.

It is impossible to make sense of the deaths of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery, and the unconscionable deaths that have taken place for centuries. Similar unnecessary deaths are too common. Through structural inequalities at the intersection of race and socioeconomic status, COVID-19 continues its toll. The racism, violence and traumatization of Black people and communities of color run squarely in opposition to MSU Extension's commitment to equity and inclusion. On behalf of MSU Extension, we stand in solidarity with our colleagues and communities of color.

To mitigate the impacts of racism and to be better supporters and allies to communities of color, in the coming weeks, we are committing to the following action steps and engagement opportunities:

- 1. **Teach-ins for staff and volunteers**. Dr. Amy Bonomi (in collaboration with Children and Youth Institute colleagues and informed by our colleagues of color) will hold teach-ins with a focus on racial inequity, equity, justice, White privilege and White fragility. The purpose of the teach-ins is to engage White colleagues and volunteers in discussions of supports, protections and advocacy for colleagues and communities of color. Teach-ins are educational forums on challenging social justice issues; they are practical, participatory, and oriented toward action (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Teach-in). The teach-ins will engage supplemental readings, such as Melanie Morrison's "Becoming Trustworthy White Allies" (https://reflections.yale.edu/article/future-race/becoming-trustworthy-white-allies). We will be sending a registration link from MSU Extension Events.
- 2. Additional opportunities for staff and volunteers to engage in DEI learning. This includes professional development offered through Dr. Quentin Tyler's Summer Seminar Series facilitated through the CANR Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. The upcoming Summer Seminar Series is in

collaboration with MSU and the CIC forum (https://www.canr.msu.edu/diversity/). Sessions include:

- 3. **Mental health support for youth and adults.** We will bolster resources to expand mental health support for Black and Latinx youth by increasing access to mental health sessions. *Information is forthcoming.*
- 4. **Social media.** Children and Youth Institute colleagues will organize and oversee a social media competition among youth across Michigan to raise further awareness of, and reimagine strategies for mitigating, the impacts of racism and structural inequalities. *Information is forthcoming.*
