2022 CANR Camden Endowed Teaching Award Dan Buskirk, Ph.D.

Buskirk has been an associate professor and beef Extension specialist in the <u>MSU</u> <u>Department of Animal Science</u> for the past 26 years. He has a strong passion for agriculture education and scholarship, both in the classroom and on the farm.

In his current position, he provides statewide leadership in beef cattle production and management. Buskirk serves as the faculty coordinator of the MSU Beef Center, MCA/MSU Bull Evaluation Program, Michigan Beef Quality Assurance Program and Michigan Livestock Industry Scholarship Foundation. He is the lead instructor for Introductory Beef Cattle Management, Advanced Beef Cattle Feedlot Management and the beef section of the Professional Internship in Animal Science. Additionally, he has provided invited lectures for 17 other courses in the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources and College of Veterinary Medicine. Buskirk was raised on a diversified livestock and grain farm in northeastern Indiana and earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from Purdue University in animal science and earned his Ph.D. from the University of Illinois in ruminant nutrition.

2022 CANR Excellence in Teaching - Established Teacher Award Dan McCole, Ph.D.

McCole is an associate professor in the <u>Department of Community</u> <u>Sustainability</u> where his scholarship focuses on the impacts of tourism on communities. His work combines the foundations and principles of business and management systems with a deep understanding of the role of leisure in peoples' lives. As a social scientist, McCole brings together business fields of study (marketing, human resources, organizational development, finance and operations) with other social sciences related to the field of leisure (e.g., psychology, sociology and economics).

McCole joined the MSU faculty in 2009 but has been teaching at the college level for over 20 years, getting his start at MSU in the 1990s as a recitation instructor while getting his master's in business administration. It was that experience that caused him to consider a career in higher education. McCole has a bachelor's degree from the University of Massachusetts and a Ph.D. from the University of Minnesota.







2022 CANR Excellence in Teaching - New Teacher Award Linda Nubani, Ph.D.

Nubani is an assistant professor in interior design and the founder of the Crime Prevention through Environmental Design Program. She teaches various undergraduate and graduate courses in the <u>School of Planning, Design, and Construction</u> and a multidisciplinary course Introduction to Crime and Built Environment. She provides multicultural education with over 20 years of industry experience that she brings into her classrooms. She is known for her use of innovative technology in the classroom, such as virtual reality as well as community engagement techniques. Her current research focuses on the use of space syntax and isovist-based analysis to understand human behavior in different contexts (buildings and urban environments); use of virtual reality in environment-behavior studies; and crime prevention through environmental design. She is also the co-creator of the Mile in My Shoes virtual reality app that aims to help individuals recognize unconscious bias through different real-world situations.

Since she joined MSU in 2016, she received the 2021 Chief of Police Award of Excellence from the Lansing Police Department, the 2021 CANR You Belong Here DEI Champion Award, the 2021 IDEC Best Service Award from the Interior Design Educators Council and the 2019 IDEC Community Service Award from Interior Design Educators Council.





2022 CANR Graduate Student Teaching Award William Poulos

Poulos is a Ph.D. student in the <u>Department of Animal Science</u>. He has also served as a teaching assistant since 2019, instructing over 800 students in several courses on cell and molecular biology, anatomy and physiology, reproduction and genetics.

As an instructor, Poulos wants his students to succeed, and he is always willing to go the extra mile to ensure that they do. One of his greatest compliments was when a student approached him after a class session and said that no other instructor had ever cared so much about their success in a course. He believes a crucial part of ensuring that all students feel motivated to succeed is obtaining feedback on their experience during a course and adjusting accordingly. With as many different learning styles as students, finding strategies that work in practice is an invaluable part of successful teaching. Learning is an active process and finding ways to engage students is almost as important as the content itself.

Poulos' own research focuses on the genetics of cloning, and he is currently working to identify novel mechanisms of reprogramming and cell dedifferentiation using zebrafish somatic cell nuclear transfer. He has a published paper in "Scientific Reports" and a published book chapter in *Vertebrate Embryogenesis*.

The H. Paul Roberts Award for Distinguished Service in Education recognizes faculty and staff who give their time and creativity to the development and implementation of education abroad programs, as well as those who work behind the scenes to support the students who participate in education abroad.

Kaneene was an academic advisor in the <u>Department of Community Sustainability</u> for over 30 years <u>until her retirement and death in 2020</u>. During that time, she helped thousands of students build their confidence, reach their potential and achieve their dreams — and a major part of that was encouraging them to study abroad. Her own background and experiences — being born and raised in Uganda, living in Paris, and traveling to dozens of countries — demonstrated to Kaneene how important an international study experience could be for students. She strongly believed that studying abroad would give students a greater understanding of and appreciation for the world we live in.

Kaneene was a go-to person for CANR education abroad. She could always be counted on to review courses from overseas institutions, determine MSU equivalencies and figure out how to make credits transfer and count in a student's major. She would do everything within her power to make it happen for a student.

The <u>CANR Outstanding Academic Advisor Award</u> honors academic advisors for their commitment and excellence in supporting students to set and reach their academic and professional goals.

Tucker advises undergraduate and graduate students majoring in or exploring degrees in MSU's School of Packaging. Tucker began his journey as the School of Packaging's academic advising specialist in summer 2018.

Academic advisors are known for their accessibility and availability for students. However, according to Matt Daum, Ph.D., School of Packaging director and professor, Tucker consistently takes his academic advisor responsibilities to new levels. Tucker puts forth extra effort to meet with students and make himself available to counsel and advise students. For example, during the COVID workfrom-home period, Tucker seamlessly moved all his advising to Zoom and increased his availability throughout weekday evenings and weekends. Open houses, webinars and other student communications were offered at multiple time slots to accommodate the highest percentage of our students.

In addition, Tucker established the Packaging Help Room, providing free tutoring for STEM admission coursework, served as the inaugural chair of the School of Packaging's committee on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, and is a key member of the School of Packaging Scholarship Committee.

2022 CANR Staff Dean's Award of Distinction Linda Gallagher

Exemplary only begins to describe Linda. Faculty, students, staff, colleagues and administrators describe Linda as "the cornerstone," "the steady presence" and "the glue" that holds the department together. Academic programs do not become renowned for research alone. One nominator shared that "multiple senior faculty in our department owe their careers' funding success to the support from Linda and her office, both for developing proposals and keeping them on track after they were awarded."

Linda is a critical link among people, the department, colleges, the university and beyond. In addition to her direct department leadership, Linda is also sought out by others in similar roles in other CANR departments and colleges because of her vast understanding and institutional knowledge. Colleagues in Entomology, other departments and administrators within CANR and the University shared that Linda is "one of the best" at Michigan State University.

Recently, Linda has used her understanding of department budget and structure to formalize support and accounting for diversity and inclusion initiatives undertaken by faculty, staff and students. Having a mechanism to fund these goals is a significant step towards their sustainability.

In 2018, Marie Garcia joined MSU Extension's Health and Nutrition Institute (HNI) as the executive assistant to the director and associate director. When Marie started, she systematically met with HNI leadership and program leaders to learn existing workflows and structures. She immediately identified processes needing to be simplified. It is this initiative to improve processes and services that led Marie to be nominated for the CANR Staff Innovation Award.

Marie has been described as a "self-taught technology wizard," utilizing tools such as One Drive, TEAMS and Qualtrics to streamline processes for MSUE staff around the state. For example, Marie built a Qualtrics based technology order form, which gathers valuable information and has built-in Fiscal Officer approval to reduce email traffic and keep accurate records for computer purchases.

Marie also provides support to HNI's grant processes and equips herself with the intricate details of all grants. As an example, Marie worked with MSU Technologies to file Memorandums of Agreement related to copyrighted program materials – and has assisted in the completion of 23 agreements with other land grant universities. Marie created several novel uses of Qualtrics to simplify information collection across work functions. She frequently anticipates upcoming deadlines and prepares documents and templates to assist HNI leadership in navigating complex timelines and reporting requirements.

Serving as the 4-H program coordinator in Charlevoix County for the last 11 years, Leah LaVanway expertly runs one of the largest 4-H programs in District 14. However, she was nominated for the CANR Staff Service Award because of her service to the 4-H mission, her colleagues and her contributions outside of her normal job duties. Leah is the "go-to" resource for many of her colleagues in the district and beyond.

As one nominator wrote, "When I think of the one staff member who all 4-H coordinators in the district have mentioned as someone they go to for technical advice or mentorship, it is Leah. I regularly receive many positive comments from 4-H volunteers, other 4-H program coordinators about how helpful she has been to them."

Within the community, Leah works alongside external stakeholders, including county commissioners, service organizations and the fair board. She is frequently sought out to be a part of collaborations and projects because of her professional reputation. It is not uncommon for her to be a part of at least two statewide committees or task forces at a time; working on everything from curriculum development to developing language placed in the Memorandums of Agreement that Extension District Directors present to county commissions each fall to secure Extension funding. Through her actions and programming, Leah represents the College and Michigan State University at the highest level.

2022 Global Scholar representing Research Abigail Bennett, Ph.D.

Abigail Bennett, Ph.D., is an assistant professor of global inland fisheries ecology and governance in the <u>Department of Fisheries and Wildlife</u>. She studies the role of fisheries in livelihoods and food security around the world. Her research examines how processes, such as governance and trade, shape the connections between fisheries and human well-being. Empirically, she employs innovative approaches to confront the challenges of inadequate data, given that substantial global fish catch is unreported and post-harvest activities are often undocumented. To bring fisheries to the forefront in policy dialogues on sustainable development goals, such as reducing poverty and addressing global hunger, she works closely with organizations such as the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization and other international organizations in the design, implementation and dissemination of research.





2022 Global Scholar representing Research Eric Mark Benbow, Ph.D.

Eric Mark Benbow, Ph.D., is an assistant professor in the Department of Entomology. Benbow is a community ecologist, studying how complex communities (e.g., aquatic or carrion insects or microbes) contribute to ecological systems and how understanding these communities can be used in various applications in medicine, disease and environmental management. The research programs in his lab center on the applied ecology of insect-microbial interactions within three systems: carrion decomposition (and forensics), aquatic ecological networks and disease systems. Benbow is actively engaged in collaborative research programs with scientists in Africa, Asia and Latin America.









2022 Global Scholar representing Research **Wei Liao, Ph.D.**

A registered professional engineer (PE), <u>Wei Liao, Ph.D.</u>, is professor and director of the <u>Anaerobic Digestion Research and Education Center</u> (<u>ADREC</u>) in the <u>Department of Biosystems & Agricultural Engineering</u> (<u>BAE</u>). Liao is leading an active research program on developing integrated systems to utilize organic residues for energy and chemical production. He has been extensively involved in international research and education activities on renewable energy and environmental sustainability. His group is carrying out research projects in Latin America, Europe and Asia. He is currently organizing an American Society of Agricultural and Biological Engineers (ASABE) global engagement conference to be held in Costa Rica this year.





2022 Global Scholar representing Research Saweda Liverpool-Tasie, Ph.D.

Saweda Liverpool-Tasie, Ph.D., is an associate professor in the Department of Agricultural, Food, and Resource Economics. Her work focuses on reducing poverty and increasing access to nutritious food through improving smallholder productivity and welfare within the changing markets of sub-Saharan Africa and alongside poorly functioning markets in the region. Liverpool-Tasie was recently appointed to the Board for International Food and Agricultural Development (BIFAD) by President Biden. She has won numerous awards for her work, including the John K. Hudzik Emerging Leader award, the MSU Teacher Scholar Award and, in collaboration, the 2017 AAEA Bruce Gardner Memorial Prize for applied policy analysis.









2022 Global Scholar representing Research Lisa Tiemann, Ph.D.

Lisa Tiemann, Ph.D., is an assistant professor of soil biology in the Department of Plant, Soil and Microbial Sciences. With a doctorate in ecology and evolutionary biology from the University of Kansas, she takes an agroecological approach to research, which is critical for developing innovative approaches to agriculture that simultaneously increase system productivity, resilience and sustainability. This is particularly important in the low-input, small-holder farms of sub-Saharan Africa. Tiemann began working in western Africa in 2013 as a National Science Foundation, Science, Engineering and Education for Sustainability Fellow. Her work in Uganda explored social and economic drivers of management that alter soil organic matter stocks with consequences for soil fertility, soil health and crop productivity. Tiemann continues to work in western Africa, Malawi and Kenya, across multiple disciplines to promote understanding of the importance of managing soil microbes and soil organic matter for healthy, fertile soils.

2022 Global Scholar in Education Daniel Chitwood, Ph.D.

Daniel Chitwood, Ph.D., is an assistant professor in the Department of Horticulture and a member of Computational Mathematics, Science and Engineering (CMSE) at MSU. Together, with Dr. Bob Van Buren at MSU and Dr. Alejandra Rougon-Cardoso from the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México, Escuela Nacional de Estudios Superiores Unidad León, Chitwood has developed Plants & Python, an interdisciplinary, bilingual curriculum that teaches coding principles in Python using plant examples that are relevant to agriculture. As a Global Scholar, Chitwood has developed and offered a graduate online course on Foundations in Computational and Plant Sciences for MSU students in Mexico.









2022 Global Scholar in Education Kylie Clay, Ph.D.

Kylie Clay, Ph.D., is the associate director of the Forest Carbon and Climate Program in the <u>Department of Forestry</u>. She earned a doctorate in political science from the University of Washington and a master's degree in political economy from the London School of Economics. Her expertise is in the political economy of forest use decision-making and governance, forest carbon and commodity markets and natural resource property rights regimes. Her current projects explore the carbon storage and substitution potential of harvested wood products, social and environmental safeguards for carbon interventions, and institutional determinants of forest use in sub-Saharan Africa.





2022 Global Scholar in Education **Cedric Gondro, Ph.D.**

Cedric Gondro, Ph.D., is a professor of computational and quantitative genomics in the Department of Animal Science. His research focuses on the development of computational methods — particularly artificial intelligence — for optimization of biological problems and genomic prediction using high throughput genomic data, and its applications for livestock production. His applied work focuses on genetics of beef quality with a particular interest in the genetics of marbling. Current research projects include use of artificial intelligence methods for feature selection applied to genomic prediction, use of climate variables to increase accuracy of phenotypic prediction in livestock systems, supply chain data integration between farmers and consumers, applications of portable sequencing devices for livestock production and understanding epistasis in the context of linear models. As a Global Scholar, Gondro is developing a special online course for graduate and senior undergraduate students at MSU and internationally on "Precision Livestock Production: Big Data Programming and Artificial Intelligence Methods" applied to Animal Production.

Ramjee P. Ghimire, Ph.D.

Ramjee P. Ghimire, Ph.D., is an academic specialist in the <u>College of Agriculture and Natural</u> <u>Resources</u>. He has been involved in multidisciplinary research, training and outreach focusing on food safety, animal health, community empowerment and sustainable agricultural development in Asia, Africa and the U.S. As a Global Scholar, Ghimire has successfully designed and offered an international short course, "Zoonotic Diseases" in collaboration with several national and international organizations. Ghimire served as a member of the Departmental Diversity Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Committee. He earned his Ph.D. degree from Michigan State University with a focus on international agricultural development and agricultural extension. He serves as general secretary of the Association of Nepalese Agricultural Professionals of Americas (NAPA).







2022 Global Scholar in Education Krista Issacs, Ph.D.

<u>Krista Isaacs, Ph.D.</u>, is an agroecologist with specializations in international seed systems, gender and agriculture, and crop ecology in the <u>Department</u> of Plant, Soil and Microbial Sciences. She works with plant breeders, farmers and practitioners to improve the availability of preferred, quality seed in Africa and India. With a Ph.D. in crop and soil sciences from Michigan State University and a bachelor's degree in environmental sociology, her transdisciplinary research and outreach are focused on participatory processes with farmers that considers the environmental, social and economic constraints and opportunities to farmer adoption of new varieties and practices. Isaacs uses qualitative research methods and participatory engagement in combination with field trials to support farmers in improving their livelihoods.





2022 Global Scholar in Education **Brent Ross, Ph.D.**

Brent Ross, Ph.D., is an associate professor in the <u>Department of Agricultural</u>, Food, and Resource Economics. Ross seeks to understand and improve how food and agri-business firms manage and create sustainable value in a globally competitive environment. His scholarly research activities in this area have focused on the strategies employed by entrepreneurial agri-food ventures as well as the emergence of new business models and organizational innovations in nascent agri-food systems. As an award-winning instructor, he uses active learning strategies (case studies and simulation, in particular) in his teaching approach and he is regularly invited, both nationally and globally, to develop and deliver food and agribusiness management curriculum and programming. As a Global Scholar, Ross is developing an agribusiness certificate program focusing on Global Food Systems Innovations and Entrepreneurship.









2022 Global Scholar in Education Cholani Weebadde, Ph.D.

Cholani Weebadde, Ph.D., is an assistant professor in the <u>Department of Plant, Soil</u> <u>and Microbial Sciences.</u> As the plant breeder for International Programs, Weebadde interacts closely with MSU plant breeders to help expand their programs by reaching out to the global plant breeding community through initiating collaborative research and capacity building programs. She is currently on a 100% academic year teaching appointment at MSU where she instructs plant breeding and biotechnology courses, as well as biology courses to non-biology majors. During the summer months, she continues to work on strawberry breeding to train graduate and undergraduate students. She also serves as the director for Plant Breeding 2 Fight Hunger, a new MSU initiative where, as a Global Scholar, she offers an online certificate program to professional plant breeders globally, to fulfill her mission of training the next generation of plant breeders as hunger fighters. She is currently working on developing an online master's program in plant breeding and crop improvement.

2022 Global Scholar in Extension **C. Andrew Northrop**

C. Andrew Northrop is an MSU Extension educator for the Community, Food, and Environment Institute (CFEI) with a focus on statewide government and community vitality and sustainable tourism. He brings extensive international development experience to his role with CANR's Global Scholars. His state, national and growing international work focuses on building community capacity to leverage agricultural, cultural and ecological assets to sustain and grow small-scale rural tourism economies. His Global Scholars focus is applying the well-respected First Impressions Tourism (FIT) assessment program in developing nations. Overall, his previous global experiences coupled with his role at MSU, both support the community transformations necessary to attract and retain residents, visitors, investors and resources.









2022 Global Scholar in Extension Paola Bacigalupo Sangueja

Paola Bacigalupo Sanguesa is an MSU Extension dairy educator for central Michigan. She was trained as a veterinarian in her home country and is currently working on her Ph.D. Her work focuses on helping farms to improve milking and parlor efficiencies, assisting farms with strategies to improve and maintain good milk quality and providing education and training to dairy employees. For her Global Scholar project, she will develop a course and hands-on training on milking and parlor efficiency for veterinarians and Extension staff in Chile.





2022 Global Scholar in Extension Martin J. Carrasquillo Mangual

Martin J. Carrasquillo Mangual is an MSU Extension dairy educator delivering programs for dairy producers and agriculture professionals on the west side of Michigan. His focus is workforce development, feed management and milk quality on dairy farms. With his Global Scholars initiative, he intends to expand some of the impactful resources developed by MSU Extension to other outreach professionals in Latin America. The goal is to increase the capacity of outreach agents to better serve their local industries. Mangual grew up on a family farm in Puerto Rico and earned a bachelor's degree in biology from the University of Puerto Rico. Later he earned a master's degree in animal science with a concentration in dairy nutrition from Michigan State University.









2022 Global Scholar in Extension Lauren Jescovitch, Ph.D.

Lauren Jescovitch, Ph.D., is an MSU Extension <u>Sea Grant</u> educator located in Houghton, Michigan. With a background in aquaculture (also called fish farming or fish culture), she works with aquaculture farmers, commercial fishers, and seafood processors around the state and throughout the Great Lakes region. Her Global Scholars project, *Aquaculture Education: Swimming from Great Lakes to Great Seas*, will develop collaborations and key relationships with global networks in the aquaculture community. This project will introduce a partnership with Indonesia that could provide an inside look to high production aquaculture systems and an aquaculture literate society with opportunities to share examples of U.S. sustainable practices and seafood consumer safety programs to expand markets.

Brian Wibby is an MSU Extension educator for the Children and Youth Institute (CYI) in Alger County where he serves on the Leadership, Civic, and Cultural Engagement (LCCE) work team. Wibby leads educational programs for youth, and adults who support youth, focused primarily on the development of youth leadership, community engagement and global citizenship knowledge and skills. He is a co-founder and co-director of the World Food Prize Michigan Youth Institute, which is an MSU pre-college program that engages youth from across Michigan in envisioning solutions to some of the most critical global challenges our planet faces related to food, health, poverty and sustainability. Wibby holds a master's degree in social administration from the Mandel School of Applied Social Sciences at Case Western Reserve University and a bachelor's in advertising from the MSU College of Communication Arts and Sciences.
