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Campus Bus Service (It's Free!)

Michigan State University and CATA have partnered for the 2018–19 academic year to make on-campus bus service free to all students, staff and faculty. Go to cata.org for schedules and route maps, or to download the Transit trip-planning and real-time bus location information app.

Flu Shots

Get a flu shot and stay healthy! Standard-dose flu shots will be available for adult (age 18 and up) employees and their dependents, spouses and partners. High-dose flu shots will be available for those age 65 and up.

Just bring your Caremark or other prescription insurance card and fill out a short screening form. Claims will be processed onsite - most with no co-pay.

Vaccines are available until 30 minutes before the close of the Benefits Fair each day. That's from noon to 6:30 p.m. on October 16 and 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on October 17. (You'll need to wait in the concourse for 20 minutes after receiving the injection.)





The MSU Extension Awards Program

Michigan State University Extension presents a variety of awards at Fall Extension Conference each year. The awards honor outstanding MSU Extension staff members, programs and key partners. The selection committee for the MSU Extension administration awards is made up of Extension administrators who represent institutes, district coordinators and the MSU Extension Director's Office. Epsilon Sigma Phi chooses the Friend of Extension Award winners and the Michigan Council of Extension Associations chooses the John A. Hannah Award for Program Excellence winners.

Michigan Horse Council

According to a 2017 American Horse Council Foundation survey, there are nearly 190,000 horses in Michigan, about 30% of households include at least one horse enthusiast, and the annual statewide economic impact of the horse industry is estimated at \$1.6 billion. That survey was funded in part by the Michigan Horse Council (MHC) and is one example of how the organization has been instrumental for many years in MSU Extension efforts to expand our educational reach to the equine industry.

MHC has a strong commitment to MSU Extension education and has partnered with Extension staff in a variety of horse industry events, including the MSU and Michigan horse industry priorities meeting held during ANR Week every other year. MHC also supports the development of educational materials such as the new self-guided horse farm poster series. Members of the MSU Extension Equine Team serve on MHC committees and in summer 2018, participated in the MHC-sponsored Equine Legislative Day at the State Capitol.

MHC also values MSU Extension youth programs, and funds annual 4-H college scholarships and supports a variety of 4-H activities, including judging events and educational workshops.

Over the years, MHC has supported the Michigan horse industry with more than \$260,000 in grants and scholarships. The organization contributed \$80,000 to build the south barn at the MSU Pavilion for Agriculture and Livestock Education, which hosts many MSU Extension events. The MSU Pavilion also hosts the Michigan Horse Expo, the largest equine event in the state. There, MSU Extension Equine Team members meet horse enthusiasts from across Michigan and give presentations on equine management topics.

MHC has long supported the hiring of MSU Extension faculty. Currently, MHC has committed \$50,000 to help fund a startup package for an equine reproductive physiologist in the MSU Department of Animal Science. It is also working with the MSU Department of Large Animal Clinical Sciences to fill the equine Extension veterinarian position.

The Friend of Extension Award recognizes individuals who have been true friends of MSU Extension and supported key programs. Epsilon Sigma Phi is pleased to honor the Michigan Horse Council for their long-standing partnership with MSU Extension in meeting the needs of the Michigan horse industry.

The Michigan State Fair, which is operated by the Michigan State Agricultural Society, left the Detroit State Fair Grounds in 2009. It was revived in 2012 at the Suburban Collection Showplace in Novi.

No matter its location, the fair promotes and celebrates achievements and advancements in Michigan rural and urban agriculture, business and industry.

Each year, the fair draws more than 140,000 diverse visitors during its five-day run over the Labor Day weekend. These visitor numbers make it a jackpot event for exposure for MSU Extension and the MSU College of Agriculture and Natural Resources (CANR).

The Michigan State Fair Outreach and Engagement Team, which includes people from the MSU College of Agriculture and Natural Resources, MSU AgBioResearch and MSU Extension, was formed to facilitate the partnership with the Michigan State Fair. The team recruits and organizes more than 80 staff and volunteers who offer fair-goers hands-on activities, educational resources and information about the programs, events and services offered by all four MSU Extension institutes and the CANR.

This team's partnership with the Michigan State Fair has increased the visibility of MSU, CANR and all areas of MSU Extension.

The John A. Hannah Award recognizes superior Extension programs that are developed and carried out by MSU Extension professional staff members. The efforts of the Michigan State Fair Outreach and Engagement team to increase the visibility of MSU, the college, AgBioResearch and all areas of MSU Extension through exhibiting at the Michigan State Fair certainly merits this award.

Diversity & Multiculturalism Award

Richard Pirog

As a community-based education organization, MSU Extension has an opportunity – and obligation – to help facilitate positive change in the areas of diversity, equity and inclusion. One setting in which we can make a significant impact is in community food systems. Enter Richard Pirog, director of the MSU Center for Regional Food Systems.

Under Richard's direction, diversity, equity and inclusion are central to the Center's efforts. He requires CRFS staff to include at least one professional development or programming item related to racial equity in their annual plans of work. Richard himself leads the annual update process for an annotated bibliography called *Structural Racism Present in the U.S. Food System*.

CRFS is a partner with the Michigan Good Food Fund and has secured significant funding for this \$30 million public-private loan fund. The fund provides financing to good food enterprises working to increase access to affordable, healthy food in low-income and underserved communities in Michigan.

Richard and CRFS also pushed for the development of the multistate Coming Together for Racial Understanding initiative that is supported by eXtension and funded by the W. K. Kellogg Foundation. Michigan is one of the lead states for "Coming Together," which is designed to help prepare Extension professionals to facilitate civil community discussions around issues of racism. It was Richard's personal goal to include staff members from all areas of MSU Extension in this training.

Nationally, Richard and CRFS lead the Undoing Inequity in the Food System workgroup within the Local, Regional and Community Food Systems eXtension Community of Practice. Earlier in 2018 the workgroup hosted a webinar on how to get started with racial equity in food systems work. The group plans to sponsor similar educational opportunities in the future.

The Diversity and Multiculturalism Award is presented to individuals and teams who have made exceptional efforts in promoting inclusion in MSU Extension program content or delivery. We are pleased to honor Richard Pirog with this award.



Innovative Technology Award

Integrated Pest Management Academy Online Course

In 2016, a number of agriculture-related stakeholder groups identified a significant need for integrated pest management (IPM) education. In response, several MSU Extension educators and specialists collaborated to develop the IPM Academy online course for farmers, pest scouts, commercial pesticide applicators, agri-chemical company representatives and college students.

The interactive, self-paced, web-based course is designed to provide a comprehensive and convenient online learning experience in pest management. The 11 modules cover topics such as IPM fundamentals, plant science, vegetable and field crops, pollinators, soils and using the Enviroweather system. Certified pesticide applicators who complete the course can earn continuing education pesticide credits through the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development.

Since September 2017, 64 of 100 enrollees have completed the final test. Data indicate that about 77,000 agricultural acres have been impacted by attendees of this course.

The online training has attracted more limited-resource, female and minority participants than similar face-to-face sessions have. It is also a convenient format for first-generation and other beginning farmers. Course participants have come from Michigan and other areas of the U.S., and from Costa Rica, Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, Nigeria, Qatar, Uganda and Ukraine.

This MSU Extension award recognizes individuals or teams – such as the IPM Academy developers – who have demonstrated creative use of technology in innovative program delivery and educational programming.

Facing the challenges of high staff turnover and limited numbers of programming partnerships, and recognizing that they weren't working effectively together, the Wayne County Nutrition and Physical Activity Team challenged themselves to rethink their programming policies, systems, and work environment. They became intentional about sharing information on potential partnerships and working collaboratively to more effectively deliver nutrition and physical activity education. Additionally, most of the group moved to the same worksite so that they could better coordinate their programming efforts.

Because of their dedication to growing as a team, this group became more effective at serving the people of Wayne County. After the revamp, in 2017, the team educated 25,000 people about making healthier food and activity choices. Programming data show that the team's audiences also became more diverse and the number of partnerships they developed in the community increased significantly. Team comradery was also strengthened.

The Institute Team Award recognizes an outstanding team contribution to MSU Extension. The Wayne County Nutrition and Physical Activity Team is a positive example of staff making needed changes to improve their overall effectiveness as a team and working collaboratively to make a difference in the nutrition and physical fitness choices of Michigan residents.

Livestock Transportation Accident Response Team

A crash scene involving large trucks, people and livestock can quickly turn chaotic if the local response team isn't prepared or trained to handle such an event. Following several livestock truck rollovers in Michigan and neighboring states, MSU Extension educators formed the Livestock Transportation Accident Response Team to train a network of first responders in how to handle such incidents.

The team brought together partners and industry experts to host a training and develop educational materials designed to help first responders prepare for livestock transportation accidents. Several organizations – including the Michigan Farm Bureau, the Michigan Pork Producers Association, the Michigan Department of Transportation, the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development, and the Michigan State Police – collaborated on organizing and funding the effort.

The two-day training drew 430 attendees, including first responders, truckers, veterinarians and representatives from large livestock producers, transportation companies and law enforcement agencies. Attendees heard from responders with firsthand livestock accident experience, participated in hands-on demonstrations and received a set of cards with advice on humane euthanasia techniques for several livestock species. The participants are now part of. a statewide network of advisors who can assist first responders and emergency response personnel during accidents involving livestock.

Because of their work to bring together partners and experts to train volunteers around a crucial need, the Livestock Transportation Accident Response Team has earned an MSU Extension Institute Team Award.

Cherry Marketing Institute

In fact, Michigan ranks first in the nation for tart cherry growth, largely thanks to the sandy soil and temperate weather conditions along the eastern shore of Lake Michigan.


Although cherry growing comes naturally in the state, that doesn't mean the crop isn't susceptible to pests, weather events and the complications that come with climate change. The Michigan cherry industry needs innovative research to continue leading the nation in cherry production.


Enter the Cherry Marketing Institute. CMI was formed in 1988 to increase the demand for Montmorency tart cherries through promotion, market expansion, product development and research. How do they fulfill their mission? By partnering with MSU Extension, of course!

CMI has worked determinedly on behalf of MSU Extension. They have lobbied for continued support and improved funding for the organization, supported and participated in hiring new faculty and educators, fostered connections and ongoing relationships with state and federal policymakers, and funded and supported critical research needs of Michigan growers, particularly in addressing threats from new invasive insect pests.

CMI has played a significant role in providing funding sources to support MSU Extension activities. The most recent endeavor has been helping to establish the Michigan Tree Fruit Commission, a program that collects funds from Michigan growers to support production research. These competitive funds have allowed MSU Extension staff to conduct timely research that addresses critical issues in Michigan cherry production.

The Key Partner Award recognizes those who have made significant contributions to supporting and promoting MSU Extension programs. We are pleased to honor the Cherry Marketing Institute with this award for their efforts to help MSU Extension respond to emerging issues affecting the Michigan cherry industry.

Forgotten Harvest Farms

The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that about 133 billion pounds of food is thrown away each year. That means between 30% and 40% of our food supply is going to waste! USDA also estimates that one in six people in the U.S. don't have access to enough of the nutritious, fresh foods they need to lead active, healthy lives.

Forgotten Harvest is a nonprofit "food rescue" organization based in Southeast Michigan that was founded in 1990 to fight two problems: hunger and food waste. The organization collects over 45 million pounds of food a year from grocery stores, fruit and vegetable markets, restaurants, caterers, dairies, farmers and wholesale food distributors and redistributes it to 250 emergency food providers in the Metro Detroit area.

One thing that sets Forgotten Harvest apart from similar organizations is that in 2013, it began growing its own produce on about 95 acres of donated land near Fenton, Michigan. MSU Extension educators helped design and bring the farm into production, and today sit on its advisory board.

Since it began operating, the farm has grown and harvested more than 2 million pounds of produce. In 2017 alone, the farm harvested and donated more than 842,000 pounds of fresh vegetables to its partner agencies.

But growing produce isn't all Forgotten Harvest Farms does. It also conducts a workforce development program that helps people with chronic unemployment issues learn technical skills and gain on-thejob training for agriculture-related and food business jobs and careers. The program is a partnership with MSU Extension, the MSU Vets to Ag program, the Veterans Administration and the MI! Works agency.

The farm hosts MSU Extension vegetable production research trials related to water conservation, deer control, fertility, cover cropping and variety selection for no-till production. The farm managers frequently present with MSU Extension staff on webinars and at grower meetings about the research going on at the farm. They have also hosted MSU Extension field days for vegetable cover cropping and hobby beekeepers, and our Cultivate Michigan community food systems tour for food producers.

Although the Forgotten Harvest service area covers only Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties, each year since 2016 the farm has grown a field of iron-rich kale and collards specifically for Flint food pantries to help mitigate the harmful effects of lead exposure.

MSU Extension greatly values the work of Forgotten Harvest Farms. Their contributions to Southeast Michigan communities and to MSU Extension make them Key Partners indeed.

Volunteers are crucial to MSU Extension's ability to serve Michigan residents. We depend on our network of more than 20,000 volunteers in 4-H Youth Development, with the MSU Extension Master Gardener Program and on our Extension councils to help us achieve our mission.

Doug Lewis probably spends more time volunteering for MSU Extension than doing anything else, including sleep. Doug is involved in all levels of volunteering – for everything from his 4-H club at the local level to telling the Extension story at the national level.

When a client showed up with a horse to pay for legal services, Doug accepted the horse and soon became an MSU Extension 4-H volunteer leader. It's been 15 years now and he's still going strong. Doug is passionate about arranging for at-risk young people to spend time around animals.

He serves on the advisory committee for MSU Extension District 12 (Hillsdale, Jackson, Lenawee, Livingston, Monroe and Washtenaw counties), as vice president of the Washtenaw County 4-H Council and on the State 4-H Horse Trail Ride Committee. Doug has also visited and built relationships with local, state and federal decision-makers as a Council for Agricultural Research, Extension and Teaching delegate for the MSU College of Agriculture and Natural Resources for more than 10 years.

Doug has been a Michigan 4-H Foundation trustee since 2007 and served as the board's president from 2016 to 2018. His term as president included a significant reorganization of the Foundation's structure and operations to align itself more closely with MSU Extension and the Office of University Advancement.

Michigan Department of Education

Michigan is home to almost 10 million people whose health needs are as diverse as they are. MSU Extension wants to be able to make a difference in the health of all Michigan residents, but we can't do it alone, and we know that we're more effective when we work with partners like the Michigan Department of Education's Office of Health and Nutrition Services.

Department staff members have partnered with MSU Extension for over 15 years on health and nutrition initiatives. With their help, we have secured funding for salaries and curriculum development, and for program-specific minigrants we have offered to the schools and daycare providers we work with.

The department has also helped MSU Extension respond to emerging issues across the state, such as the Flint water crisis. With their help we were able to increase staff capacity in Flint, host two Breakfast in the Market events, provide small kitchen and gardening equipment to participants in nutrition classes, and increase our programming reach and develop educational materials.

During the 2016–2017 programming year, the department provided minigrants to more than 80 schools to support MSU Extension community health training.

In the past four years, the department has provided over \$850,000 in support of MSU Extension nutrition programs, staff training and salaries, and has positively promoted MSU Extension as a statewide resource and partner. This support has helped MSU Extension reach more than 35,000 students, 70 childcare providers and hundreds of Flint residents.

For their unwavering partnership, financial and promotional support, we have chosen MDE as one of our 2018 key partners.



Ogemaw County Friends of Extension

In 2016, the Ogemaw County Board of Commissioners ended their direct budget support of MSU Extension operations in the county. They decided instead to ask voters to approve a countywide millage to fund the program.

County residents in turn formed the Ogemaw County Friends of Extension (FOX). The group members began advocating, fundraising and creating awareness of the value of MSU Extension programs in the county.

When two millage proposals failed in 2016, FOX raised enough money to keep the county MSU Extension program functioning until the next millage proposal went on the ballot in August 2018. Gordon Guyer Collaborative Programming Award

Shining a Light on Agricultural Solar Energy Development

Your phone rings: It's a solar energy project developer who wants to lease or buy your farmland. What might this deal entail and how do you decide whether it's right for your farm, your family and your community? In 2017, policy changes by the Michigan Public Service Commission made utilityscale solar projects more profitable. As a result, an increasing number of farmers contacted MSU Extension and Michigan Farm Bureau seeking help navigating lease agreements and tax issues.

In response, a multidisciplinary team of MSU Extension educators and specialists created "Shining a Light on Agricultural Solar Energy Development." The Michigan Energy Office, the Michigan Farm Bureau, and the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development provided funding and support for the program.

The team hosted seven half-day workshops and a two-part webinar series that attracted 430 participants, including farmers and other landowners, solar industry representatives, civic leaders and community members. Participants reported that the sessions increased their understanding of Michigan solar policy, community planning and zoning issues, land leasing agreements, tax issues and how to integrate solar power systems into existing agricultural systems.

The Gordon Guyer Award honors cross-institute teams that conduct high-quality, collaborative programming. The Shining a Light team has earned this award for their role in empowering Michigan residents to make informed decisions that affect their farms, their families and their futures, and for building strategic partnerships along the way.



Meritorious Service Awards

Educator

Jodi Schulz is a senior MSU Extension educator based in Bay County who has demonstrated that she has the vision and drive to overcome funding, staffing and any other obstacles that stand in her way.

Jodi is part of the leadership team that secured \$110,000 in funding to fully develop a grant proposal that would allow MSU Extension to offer the 4-H STEAM Corps program to underserved audiences. (STEAM stands for science, technology, engineering, art and mathematics.) Jodi worked on the successful grant proposal – which was approved for nearly \$450,000 – with a group of county 4-H program coordinators. The project will support full-time AmeriCorps members in up to 35 counties who will offer STEAM programming using either the 4-H SPIN (SPecial INterests) club model or 4-H Tech Wizards program model.

Jodi has built strong partnerships with schools and community organizations in Bay County such as Bay City Public Schools and the Bay County Juvenile Home. With the addition of the most recent grant, Jodi has brought in about \$600,000 in grants, donations and other funding.

Jodi has provided leadership for a variety of other statewide efforts, including 4-H SPIN clubs as a delivery model; the Heads In, Hearts In family enrichment program with schools with at-risk youth; family engagement programming; and life skills resource development. Jodi currently serves on the national 4-H Clover Buds Task Force and is frequently asked to present at national conferences. She also provides family engagement training and support to National 4-H Council mentoring grant recipients.

The Meritorious Service Award is given to educators who have shown continuing leadership and excellence in MSU Extension program planning, delivery and evaluation. Jodi's leadership in securing resources to expand MSU Extension's programming reach makes her well qualified for the award.



Program Coordinator

Debra Morgan

Debra (Debbie) Morgan is a program coordinator in Oakland County who works hard at creating and building partnerships and opportunities to bring MSU Extension to the attention of potential program participants.

When the Michigan State Fair moved to Novi in 2012, Debbie was instrumental in nurturing and improving our partnership with fair organizers. That first year, MSU Extension had a single table in the exhibit area, but since then, thanks in no small part to Debbie's efforts, our space has grown to fill a large activity area. This gives us a chance to showcase MSU Extension programs, services and educational resources for families and communities to more than 140,000 fair-goers a year.

Debbie also coordinates leadership programs and activities for the newly established State Fair Youth Council, whose creation she spearheaded. The council's mission is to foster communication, share wisdom and build bridges between young people who have been raised on traditional rural farms and their counterparts in Michigan cities.

Debbie's strong relationships with staff members at the Suburban Collection Showplace (where the State Fair is held) created an opportunity to add a 4-H presence at the three-day Novi Pet Expo. Deb worked with event organizers to set up a large 4-H youth activities area, with a petting area featuring ponies, sheep, goats and llamas, and a space with other games and activities, 4-H displays, and member, club, and volunteer recruitment information. MSU Extension was able to connect with more than 13,000 prospective 4-H'ers, their families and volunteers at the Pet Expo.

The Meritorious Service Award is given to program associates who have supported the mission, program and professional staff of MSU Extension in an outstanding manner. Debbie Morgan's efforts to build partnerships that bring us closer to the people we want to serve, and her passion for creating opportunities for young people, make her an excellent choice for this award.



Program Instructor

Mary Brooks

In the past 30 years, Mary Brooks, a nutrition program instructor, has helped more than 10,000 adults and children in Wayne and Oakland counties become healthier and more active by providing them with nutrition education services.

After 24 years of teaching adults about health and nutrition, Mary was asked to add teaching elementary school-aged kids to her repertoire. She accepted the challenge with a smile and started looking for the most effective ways to teach kids. Eventually she settled on using puppets, and today she routinely dazzles classrooms full of kids with her puppeteering skills while they also learn about health and nutrition. (One sign of Mary's dedication to supporting her colleagues is that she also trains others to use puppets in nutrition education programs.)

Many of Mary's partnerships with schools, job training programs and human services organizations (such as with Adult Well-Being Services and Goodwill Industries) have flourished for years. Such partnerships allow MSU Extension staff members to provide health and nutrition education to hundreds of adults with mental illnesses or who are in recovery from substance abuse.

Mary's persistence tends to pay off. Students at Allendale Elementary School had been identified as having a high need for nutrition education programs, but Mary's colleagues had struggled to establish a partnership with the school. About four years ago, Mary was finally able to build a relationship with Allendale staff, and MSU Extension nutrition programs now reach more than 900 students there each year.

Also about four years ago, the lack of resources available to help the many Detroit residents with mental illness was attracting increasing public and media attention. In response, Mary expanded MSU Extension's reach and involvement with this population by teaching nutrition classes to more than 250 adults with cognitive impairments.

The Meritorious Service Award is given to program instructors like Mary Brooks who have supported the mission, program and professional staff of MSU Extension in an outstanding manner. We could all learn a thing or two from Mary, her perseverance and her puppets.



Derrick Harrison

As a native Detroiter, Derrick Harrison takes pride in making his city healthier one participant and one new partnership at a time.

Derrick is an MSU Extension health and nutrition program instructor in Wayne County who is passionate about serving traditionally underserved people. Derrick recognized a need for expanded programming for adults and young people with cognitive impairments, so when Cooking Matters at the Store Tours funding became available, he jumped at the opportunity to become trained in the material, reach out to partner organizations for people with cognitive impairments and offer classes for adults with cognitive impairments who had never before had such a learning opportunity.

Building partnerships is in Derrick's blood. He has built a partnership with the Focus HOPE Food Center, which donates large amounts of food demonstration supplies to MSU Extension programs. He also partners closely with the Detroit Public Schools Community District and is expanding MSU Extension's presence there. He is building partnerships all the time, including with teens transitioning out of foster care, with teens who have cognitive impairments, and with senior organizations and men's rehabilitation centers.

In the past five years, Derrick has worked tirelessly to build MSU Extension's presence throughout Detroit as part of the Wayne County Nutrition and Physical Activity Team. He has reached more than 3,500 kids and over 700 underserved adults through a series of classes in about 10 Detroit public schools and 30 community sites, such as adult rehabilitation, mental health, and senior centers, and low-income housing sites.

Derrick was chosen to receive the Meritorious Service Award because of his outstanding attitude, his passion for helping people improve their lives, and his skill at building partnerships.

What are the advantages of technology use for MSU Extension? Among other things, it allows us to reach more Michigan residents and engage more easily with each other. Community Partnership Award

Impacts & Successes From First Impressions Tourism Assessments (FIT) 2017

Andy Northrop

The "Impacts and Successes From First Impressions Tourism (FIT) Assessments" program received the 2018 CNRDA Community Partnership Award. Andy Northrop, a regional educator in tourism and community economic development who is based in St. Clair County, led the effort. He successfully partnered with every county in District 6 (Clare, Gladwin, Isabella, Mecosta, Missaukee, Osceola and Wexford counties) to recruit participants to act as mystery shopper-type first-time visitors to conduct rigorous and comprehensive assessments of a community's strengths and weaknesses during unannounced visits.

FIT assessments involve developing a community leadership team, assessing the host community, sharing the results in a community forum open to all and providing suggestions for improvement.

The results of FIT can help spur local leaders to action, strengthen community vitality and form the basis for future economic and tourism development.

Eleven MSU Extension professionals worked with Andy on the project, including campus faculty, representatives from the Children and Youth and the Greening Michigan Institutes, and from Sea Grant. Andy trained the participants who had been recruited for the program, MSU Extension educators, campus faculty and external partners on how to conduct FIT assessments. Two MSU Extension tourism educators, Bonnie Wichtner-Zoia and Garrett Ziegler, wrote reports about the site visits and sharing the results.

Congratulations to Andy Northrop for developing excellent community partnerships and for winning the CNRDA Community Partnership Award.



Get Engaged! A Guide to Getting Involved in Your Community

In a recent Michigan Public Policy Survey, which is conducted by the Center for Local, State and Urban Policy at the University of Michigan, most local leaders in Michigan indicated that their jurisdictions offer "a great deal" of opportunities for citizen engagement. Unfortunately, they also reported low and declining levels of civic engagement among their residents.

A team of MSU Extension educators seeking to reverse the decline in civic engagement has developed *Get Engaged! A Guide to Getting Involved in Your Community.* The team piloted the guide in Grand Traverse County in October 2017.

The guide takes an innovative approach to educating residents about local government, government finance structures and processes, citizen rights and responsibilities, public issues, communication and engagement in the decision-making processes, all of which made this program our award winner. A post-test survey conducted as part of the pilot process indicated that 88% of participants reported increased knowledge of how local government works (compared with 39% in the pretest survey); 94% gained confidence in knowing and exercising their rights and responsibilities as citizens (compared to 64% before the program); and 100% indicated that they were confident they could make a difference in their community.

The teams' focus on educating community members on how to engage in local decision-making processes gave participants a foundational knowledge of how local governments function, thus empowering them to work collaboratively on complex issues in their communities. Such collaborations help promote civic stability, strong neighborhoods and safe communities.
