




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Brief History

Identify goals and objectives of an exchange at the start or the planning process.

- Increase understanding and appreciation of own and other cultures.
- Gain experience and increase skills in interacting with people outside your communities.
- Identify differences and similarities between 4-H clubs and other parts of the state or country.
- Contribute to a community service project.

Planning Process

- Start planning early About a year in advance
- Who is interested in planning?
 Use newsletter, blast, email, council include youth and adults
- Consider

 Who will be a part? (criteria for participation)
- Pick a state and confirm
 Facebook and online resources
 Asking other Mi counties

- How do locations select host families?
- What about deadlines?
- Think about responsibilities of each location
- Two-way exchange over two years?



Create and sign Memorandum of Understanding



 and venues (such as museums, zoos, historical sites, amusement parks, entertainment sites and
 sports teams and arenas or stadiums)?
- What are the major businesses and industries and how do they influence the state's culture?
- What are the leading agricultural industries and commodities in the state? State data is available from the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service (https://bit.ly/2RxzLWI).
- What colleges or universities are located in the state (these could be public or private; small, medium, or large; well-known or not)?
