#### **Methods**

#### WHAT WE DID


- Timeframe: Completed April, 2021
- **Method**: Desk review of documents and websites + e-mail/short calls with lead organizations or individuals when possible to verify information
- Created a **snapshot** of trends not a deep dive and **directory** focused on:
  - Year launched or stage of development (in process, launched, 2.0)
  - Funding sources
  - Type of backbone organization
  - Strategies used to develop the plan

#### **CRITERIA WE USED**


- **Scale**: state level or multistate (not city or county)
- **Scope**: systems-based and cross-sector a holistic treatment of the entire food system (not assessments or strategic plans that focus on single sector issues, such as local food procurement, farm to school, etc.)
- **Approach**: participatory engaging multiple stakeholders across the state in numerous ways (e.g., summits, working groups, etc.) to crowdsource ideas and build broad commitment
- The title didn't matter: We include "visions", "charters", "strategic plans", "roadmaps", "frameworks", "food strategies", "action plans", etc.

# State food system plans launched starting 2005; many still in development

California was the first to develop a statewide plan as early as 2005,
 The New Mainstream Food and Farming System: A Vivid Picture of California's Food System in 2030.




#### Map showing statewide and regional food system plans




Universities and partnerships are leading development of most food system plans

- Organizations leading the development of statewide and regional food systems plans are often referred to as "backbone organizations."
- They have tended to be either a collaboration of many partners, or a university entity.
- State government agencies and nonprofits have also led some of this work.



More than half of state food plans are funded by foundations and state government

State and regional food systems plans **draw on multiple sources of funding simultaneously.** Over the last 15 years, foundations have supported more than a third, and state governments one-fifth, while universities, national government grants, individual donors and local governments have also contributed.
