## TRAINING ONE TO TRAIN OTHERS: PROJECT SCHOLAR TRAINS 25 STUDENTS AND FACULTY ON DATA COLLECTION METHODS

On December 17-18, 2016, Wale Ogunleye, the first PhD student scholar to participate in the Nigeria Agricultural Policy Project training program at Michigan State University, facilitated a training seminar for 25 participants. The participants were enlisted as enumerators for data collection on a <u>Poultry Value Chain Study</u> in South West Nigeria.

One of the goals of the scholar program is to build Nigerian expertise by training trainers. Wale has been working with MSU professors on the Poultry value chain in Nigeria. He has learned how to design and use current methods of value chain analysis such as the stacked survey approach. This was some of the information Wale shared during the training.

Geared toward promoting capacity development and improving research quality among Nigerian researchers, participants were purposely selected to be comprised of five faculty at the Oyo State College of Agriculture and Technology Igbo-Ora, and 20 Master's and PhD students of the University of Ibadan (15 males and 10 females).

The participants were introduced to the stacked survey approach of value chain analysis and the importance of correct data collection protocol in the research process, starting with the generation of a correct sampling frame and the random selection of a sample. Following the formal training, participants engaged in a series of role plays which prepared them for actual field work and potential challenges. Since the training the participants have collected information on over 3000 actors in the poultry value chain in South West Nigeria including poultry farmers, feed mills, poultry retailers and maize farmers.
