Michigan Forage Council Summer 2021 Forage and Farm Tours

Wednesday, August 25, 6:30 pm Tom & Diane Cook

11454 Parks Rd., Pewamo MI 48873

(Farm is located on the west side of Clintonia Rd., just before it curves into and becomes Hubbardston Rd.)

Tom & Diane Cook and their family have a 300 cow dairy on 600 acres. This is a combination of rotationally grazed pasture as well as conventional crops harvested for feed forage for the high production dairy herd. This herd is seasonally calved, to take advantage of good weather and grazing production, as well as having good labor efficiency for calf and young stock raising. This farm tour will focus on double-cropping Sorghum Sudan after wheat, as well as double-cropping Triticale after corn silage harvest, as well as excellent grass rotational grazing. Neighbors Leroy and Steph Schafer will show and talk about Triticale baleage they are producing. Dairy producer Nathan Brearley will show and talk about the double-cropped triticale he has been feeding to his high production cow herd this summer to replace some of the alfalfa previously fed.

Monday, August 30th, 6:00 pm Rodney Oates, RW Oates, LLC

12580 Meridean Rd, Waldron MI 49288 (The farm is located on US-127, just north of the state line.)
Light dinner included.

This tour features Alfalfa seedings established both last fall and this spring as well as frost seeded cover crop clover into wheat, to be harvested early September for beef cattle dry forage. Discussion of equipment used on the farm for seeding and forage harvest. Commercial hay and straw production. Alfalfa and Alfalfa-Timothy mixed hay harvested and baled in big squares. Beef herd of 50 Limousin-cross cows, rotationally grazed. Interseed pastures with timothy, ryegrass, or what ever is left in the drill. Farm has seed cleaner so they produce and clean seed for bulk seed sales, as well as retail oat seed sales.

Tuesday, September 14, 5:00 pm Gary Carmichael

13247 60th Ave., Evart MI 49631 (The farm is located just west of M-66, north of Evart.) (supper provided)

Gary has been a successful commercial hay producer for 20 years and has made many modifications in soil fertility to increase production. This farm tour will focus on soil fertility with take home fertilization recommendations for participants to guide good alfalfa-grass hay production. Gary's neighbor will give a personal account of his hay production success while following these fertility guidelines. This forage tour will also include a demo/discussion on alfalfa stem size variability. Also, Gary has developed a comprehensive irrigation system, using farm constructed hydraulic driven pivots and miles of underground pipe to effectively double his hay production when water is limiting. This was a huge benefit to his first cutting production during our spring drought.
