Orchards & Vineyards

 The staff at the Northwest Michigan Horticultural Research Center (NWMHRC) has been partnering with the Grand Traverse Fruit Growers' Council for over 62 years, to host the annual Northwest Orchard and Vineyard Show. This show is region Michigan's northwest of premiere educational event and trade show for tree fruit and wine grape growers. Each year, these partners convene at the Grand Traverse Resort in mid-January for a two-day outreach program that provides cutting-edge information and research about tree fruit and wine grapes to Michigan fruit producers. These topics vary yearly based on

grower need and seasonal challenges.

• These past two years' proceeds from the Orchard and Vineyard Show were dedicated to the NWMHRC in support of a laboratory expansion. We broke ground on this new lab in February 2022.

- With the commitment of the Grand Traverse Fruit Growers' Council and other regional horticultural societies, these funds will be matched with other partners including the Michigan Tree Fruit Commission and MSU to complete this lab in time for the 2022 field season.
- The outreach for our growing community by the NWMHRC staff included the tree fruit webinar series, Integrated Pest Management updates for our northwest Michigan growers as well as weekly email communications on scheduled updates and other key growing considerations.
- In order to strengthen connections and partnerships with the Michigan grape and wine industry, as well as other higher education institutions, MSU Extension collaborated in 19 industry meetings and events, as well as 15 nationwide extension meetings hosted by other higher education institutions such as Cornel and Penn State Universities. MSU Extension's grape and wine Educator also manages the vineyards at the NWMHRC during the growing season to support timely research for the northwest MI grape and wine industry.

Hops

- MSU Annual Spring Hop Kickoff Meeting: MSU
 Extension hosts the annual online meeting with
 hop growers, researchers, specialists, and other
 stakeholders. The meeting includes important
 updates to the MSU Hop Management Guide,
 pest control options and recommendations,
 irrigation and fertility best practices, and updates
 from the Hop Growers of Michigan.
- MSU Hop Bine and Dine Webinar Series: MSU Extension hosts a bi-weekly online meeting that brings together hop producers, educators, scientists, and more to discuss current growing conditions, and best management practices.
- Michigan's Great Beer State Conference & Tradeshow: This premier Midwest brewer-grower event was held at the Grand Traverse Resort and hosted by the Michigan Brewers Guild, MSU Extension, and the Master Brewers Association of the Americas-District Michigan.

Home Horticulture

 A Master Gardener Training class was held in 2021, certifying 15 new Grand Traverse County Extension Master Gardeners. Other horticulture education programs included Composting and Biochar, Organic Pest Management for Vegetables, and Tree Fruits for Northern Michigan.

MSU Product Center

 The MSU Product Center conducts educational programs in addition to one-on-one business counseling. In August 2021, the Product Center collaborated with Crosshatch and Leelanau, Grand Traverse and Benzie Conservation Districts to host a "Hazelnuts in Agroforestry Twilight Tour" in Mud Lake. 32 attendees from across Northwest Michigan attended to learn of the ecological and business potential of hazelnuts.

Year-end tax estimate meetings provided farmers with the opportunity to save over \$95,000, resulting in more resources being available for purchases by these farmers in their communities.

Farm Business Management

- MSU Extension Educator Stan Moore worked with multiple northern Michigan farmers to ensure a successful farm transfer to the next generation. Many of these farmers are using resources through the "Legacy of the Land" farm stress project, funded by both MDARD (Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development) and federal grant dollars.
- 12 individuals completed the Artisan Cheese class in 2021, including several northern Michigan farms. Stan provided education on the "business of cheese making." Individuals who have completed this class are moving forward with new cheese-making enterprises on their farms.
- Stan Moore served as one of the educators for MSU's Hay Production 101 on-line program. 46 out of 60 respondents indicated that they improved their knowledge as part of this program, and 50 out of 60 indicated that they intended to make changes based on their involvement in the course.
- Over 190 individuals attended one of two Agriculture Labor sessions, coordinated by Stan Moore, at the Great Lakes Fruit, Vegetable and

- Farm Market Expo held December 2021. Stan also provided multiple labor education meetings to farmers, including two virtual presentations, and two out of state programs for dairy farmers and fruit/vegetable farmers. These out of state meetings attracted over 700 farmers including some from northern Michigan.
- Over 100 elementary school students attended an agriculture awareness session provided by Stan Moore through a summer program provided by Traverse City Heights Elementary School in July of 2021. Students learned about the importance of agriculture in northern Michigan and how farmers care for their farm animals.
- Stan Moore hosts a monthly "TelFarm User's Group" during the winter months. In 2021, five sessions were held with an average of six-seven MSU TelFarm program farmers. These sessions provide an opportunity for farmers to build the agenda, hear from the experts, and learn from one another. Although this is offered statewide, most participants have been from northern Michigan.

- Michigan State Fair 4-H & Youth Virtual showcase: This statewide showcase provided a virtual platform for youth across Michigan to exhibit their work in all project areas and apply for up to \$10,000 in scholarships.
- The Northwest Michigan 4-H Livestock Council held its 49th Annual 4-H Livestock Auction in August, 2021, in person again. Youth and volunteers were thrilled to be back in person and showcasing their skills and animal projects.

- Connecting Early Childcare to Nutritious Food: MSU Extension established a partnership with the Father Fred Foundation to create an innovative program designed to connect families in need to nutritious food boxes. Meal boxes are provided to targeted childcare settings twice per month and include food to create a nutritious and family friendly meal and visual recipes. Children at the participating sites also receive nutrition education and garden support.
- New Partner Allows for Expanded Reach: Through the development of a new partnership with Interlochen Public Library, MSU Extension has offered education designed to increase knowledge and confidence in the area of shopping and preparing for healthy and safe food choices on a budget. The Cooking Matters curriculum allows participants to practice cooking skills by taking home groceries following classes. Cooking Matters for Adults is a hands-on nutrition program
- where participants will learn how to plan and budget for healthy, affordable, and delicious meals. The program consists of six lessons. lasting approximately two hours each. Each week, participants receive take-home groceries practice their new cooking skills with a recipe learned in class.
- Healthy Eating Adds Up is an interactive nutrition program geared toward adults with cognitive impairments and/or developmental disabilities. Eight 6-class series were taught virtually to Northwest Education Services students aged 16-26 in the Adult Community Experience (ACE) program and at the Life Skills Center. Through the series, students learned general nutrition focused on MyPlate, the benefits of vegetables, food safety, and hands-on cooking skills.

Over \$73,000 in grants received through partnership with United Dairy Industry of MI to 6 participating TCAPS schools, reaching 1,860 students

- A Prescription for Good Health: The Fruit and Vegetable Prescription Program is designed to help patients with chronic disease create healthy eating habits and increase access to fresh produce. In 2021, virtual education was provided to enrolled participants who received up to \$100 in tokens to redeem fresh produce and/or seedings at the Sara Hardy Farmers Market. MSU Extension partners with Munson Healthcare to deliver the program locally.
- Fuel Up to Play 60 Student Health and Wellness: MSU Extension partners with Grand Traverse County schools to facilitate the Fuel Up to Play 60 program. This free, in-school nutrition and physical activity program allows teams of students to make PSE changes that encourage other students, staff members, and administrators to lead healthier, active lives. The changes within our schools cause a ripple effect of positively impacting our communities as students

incorporate their leadership skills to motivate and encourage family and community members to properly fuel their body so they can be active every day. This partnership has resulted in increased access to healthy food options in schools, with student leaders playing a key role in making changes in the building and creating school wide healthy challenges.

• Helping Kids Stay Active through Play: Another component of Fuel Up to Play 60 is to promote being active for 60 minutes a day for our youth. The Fuel Up to Play 60 program in Grand Traverse County schools resulted in a partnership with Playworks, a national organization that helps schools and youth organizations create recess and play environments where every child can join in.

Michigan Sea Grant

- Michigan's Great Lakes coasts are not just beautiful, they are dynamic ecosystems home to many species of fish, birds, plants, and other wildlife in a wide variety of habitat types. A large boating community, commercial and recreational fisheries, and rapid development along Michigan's coasts all present opportunities and challenges for the ecosystem. Michigan Sea Grant works to keep balance in the Great Lakes by supporting research, education, and outreach. Topics this year included:
 - ~ Working with City of Traverse City on Great Lakes high water issues and marinas.
 - Presentation of "Rise & Fall of the Great Lakes" to 175 people at Freshwater Summit in October 2021 held at NMC Great Lakes Campus.
 - ~ Responds to homeowner questions on erosion on Old Mission Peninsula.

Government & Public Policy

 County delegates to Northern Michigan Counties Association celebrated their return to in-person meetings in 2021 with great participation and decided to try hybrid meetings for 2022. Participants share lessons learned in their counties, learn about topics currently impacting county government, and discuss the impacts of pending legislation on county government.

- A series of meetings from late 2021 through early 2022, explored both House and Senate bills aimed at solving problems with provision of Community Mental Health services. The goal of these discussions is to learn more about what is in the bills and to propose improvements to ensure higher quality services with less negative impact on counties.
- In September-October 2021, member regions of the Michigan Association of Regions (MAR) and MSU Extension hosted local and tribal government officials to explore American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund spending opportunities in a regional context. The workshop content was based on the U.S. Department of Treasury's May 17, 2021 Interim Final Rule for the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds. The 14 workshops, including an in-person in Traverse City, covered:
 - ~ ARPA Local Fiscal Recovery Fund Basic Rules
 - ~ Best Practices & Early Examples of ARPA Spending
 - ~ Practical Considerations for Contracts, Accounting, and Project Management
 - ~ Group Discussions Related to Regional Collaboration
 - ~ Leveraging Other State & Federal Funding and Priorities
