4-H Member Spotlight: Elliana Mackenzie



Name: Elliana MacKenzie Age: 17 Current 4-H Club: Pen Pals How many years have you been in 4-H?: 13 years

1. What do you like the most about 4-H and/or why have you continued to participate?

GTC 4-H in the Community: Long Lake Elementary School 4-H Jr. Master Gardener Program

4-H learning opportunities reached a new audience this spring thanks to the Grand Traverse County program being awarded a Michigan 4-H Foundation grant focused on gardening education. 4th graders at Long Lake Elementary School took part in a 6-week Jr. Master Gardener program, taught by two MSU Extension Master Gardener volunteers, Joan Longton and Braun Campbell. Both 4th grade classrooms spent an hour every Tuesday learning plant and soil science lessons and increased their knowledge on how to start seedlings and maintain a garden space until the end of the school year. The hoop house space available at the Long Lake Culinary Campus next door helped the students have a devoted area for watching plant development and growth. Students planted and harvested radishes and lettuce, which were then served at the school's cafeteria for everyone to enjoy. Students also helped to transplant marigolds and sunflowers to the front of the school prior to the last week of classes. The school hopes to keep the opportunity available for all 4th grade classes in the coming school year!

Every year, counties across Michigan offer 4-H youth, ages 11 and 12, the opportunity to participate in Michigan 4-H State Awards' 4-H Mark of Excellence essay contest. The essay theme is "Because of 4-H, I can..." and the youth referred to a variety of memorable experiences in their time as 4-H'ers.

Tips for purchasing and bringing home livestock

Acquiring new stock is exciting whether you are building your herd or flock or purchasing your annual 4-H project. These tips will help manage their health and safety by making sure you know what to ask before purchasing and how to prepare to bring livestock home.

Assessing Animal Health and Treatment Documentation

When purchasing animals, you should know their history. Ask the following questions:

- 1. When was the animal born?
- 2. What specific vaccinations has the animal been given and when were they given?
- 3. If necessary, was the animal properly castrated and what method was used?
- 4. Have any other treatments been administered to the animal? If so, what is the slaughter withdrawal for the drugs given?
- 5. Have any of the animals on the farm been ill or shown symptoms of illness?
- 6. If acquiring a market animal, what is the approximate weight?

Considerations as You Bring Animals Home

Transporting. Secure a trailer. If you do not own a trailer, make arrangements with someone who can transport animals for you. Be prepared to pay someone to provide transportation, as a courtesy.

Unloading. Make sure that your facility is ready to house your new animals before they arrive. Have a pen identified for new animals to go into with fresh water and appropriate feed. (Feed should be similar to their previous diet; changing to a new diet should be done over a period of time.) Have a clear and direct path to the animals' new pen from the trailer. Make sure that all gates are open or closed, as appropriate, and secured.

Settling in. Quarantine, or separate, new animals for a minimum of 21 days. At minimum, try to avoid nose-to-nose contact, and comingling feeding and watering. Minimize stress on new animals during the quarantine period. If after 21 days, the newly acquired animals have not shown any symptoms of illness, it should be safe to comingle them into your existing herd or flock.

Comingling. Since each species has a social hierarchy, observe animals during comingling and separate if there is risk of injury. Over the course of a day, the herd or flock should settle into a routine that includes the new animals.
