#### VIRTUAL FARM RESOURCES

Monica Jean, District 8 Field Crops Educator, and the MSU Extension field crops team have developed several online programs. Farmers and agribusiness across Michigan listen in to these programs which include the Field Crops Webinar series, Virtual Breakfast and "In the Weeds" podcast. The webinar typically has 90 attendees and offers nine different topics. In 2019, 50% of attendees reported changing an aspect of their farm, which affected 14,000 acres and saved farmers in Michigan \$99,000 by managing risk and improving production efficiency. In 2019, 921 people participated in the Virtual breakfast, a live presentation with specialists during the growing season. The "In the Weeds" podcast began in late 2019 and currently has 12 posted podcasts played 1,300 times.

#### **SWINE EDUCATION**

MSU Extension educator, Casey Zangaro, served Gratiot County and pork producers throughout the state with her expertise. Through an agreement with High Lean LLC, Casey assessed over 70 grow-finish swine barns. Taking into consideration barn conditions and swine health, Casey was able to assist farmers prepare to send pigs to most U.S. slaughter plants. Casey worked with youth who have an interest in raising and showing pigs. Topics such as biosecurity, health and overall nutrition were just some of the areas covered by her programs. Casey was able to reach over 280 youth and adult participants in Gratiot and surrounding counties. Casey's programing is critical to both novice and commercial pig enthusiasts.

## **BRENDA LONG**

In 2019, Step Forward Michigan or lenders approved 34 distressed homeowners in Ionia, Montcalm and Gratiot Counties who received nearly \$144,000 in delinquent mortgage and property taxes assistance, thus keeping their homes. MSU Senior Extension Educator, Brenda Long, works on a daily basis with those who are hardest hit. In Gratiot County, she provided critical information for struggling home owners and residents who sought money management information. She also took calls from Gratiot county residents to discuss the potential loss of a home or to redirect struggling homeowners to needed resources. Brenda has helped Veteran's, single parents and many vulnerable members of our community with this timely information.

#### 4-H EXCHANGE PROGRAMS

Michigan 4-H offers youth and their families an opportunity to think globally, grow in their cultural awareness, and gain knowledge about the world through international exchange programs that include both hosting and traveling abroad. This year Gratiot County 4-H had members participate in both the 4-H International States Exchanges and the Gratiot 4-H Teen Exchange Club. Three Gratiot Families hosted International 4-H exchange members from Japan and South Korea for one month. This cultural exchange program offers 4-H members an opportunity to experience an immersive cultural experience. The members live with a host family to experience real life in a new culture

#### 4-H CLOVERBUD DAY

The Gratiot County 4-H program once again held their annual 4-H Cloverbud Day in 2019. This annual event is a day of fun, science, and health for youth aged 5-8. This years event was a special opportunity for Gratiot County Teen Leaders to work together with a group of fourteen 4-H members from the 4-H Exchange Club from Somerset County, New Jersey who were visiting for the week. The teens learned to work together to help make this event a success for the younger 4-H members. This years special treat was meeting Dr. Pol! Dr. Pol was the speaker at the Gratiot 4-H Cloverbud Day where he spoke to the youth about being a veterinarian, weird and exotic animals he has worked with and answered questions about animal health.

## **AMERICORPS**

Lance Fowler, the 4-H AmeriCorps STEAM Coordinator partnered with the Alma Library to host the 4-H Winter STEAM Family Extravaganza. Sixty families attended the event with twelve different activities led by teen volunteers from local National Honor Socity chapters, FFA chapters, and 4-H Clubs. Each activity had some type of focus on the Winter Season, Arctic Animals, the Science of Winter Sports, or other winter-themed topics with a corresponding library book on display. Upcoming SPIN (Special Interest) clubs were promoted and projects completed from other SPIN clubs were on display for families to see as they came into the event.

## GOVERNMENT AND COMMUNITY VITALITY

In 2019, the Gratiot MSUE office welcomed David Rowley to its team. David is an educator with the MSUE Government and Community Vitality team which provides educational programs for local officials and citizens. One program is the Citizen Planner, which describes the roles, responsibilities and best practices for planning and zoning. MSUE also partnered with the Michigan Department of Treasury to provide a Fiscally Ready Communities course providing best practices for fiscal and operational budgeting. Other programs that David will be offering to Gratiot County residents are, Land Division, Solar on Agricultural Land Development, Opportunity Zones, and more. #### **ENTREPRENEURSHIP**

Alma will be the host of the 2021 Connecting Entrepreneurial Communities conference. This program was created by MSU Extension in 2007 as a way to increase local community knowledge and support for entrepreneurship growth throughout Michigan. Diane Longanbach, MSUE Product Center Counselor, invited Gratiot communities to attend the 2019 conference held in Ludington, and a 5 member team from Alma joined her. CEC uses a unique approach that embeds the conference in the local community. Breakout sessions will be held right in the local businesses led by experienced entrepreneurs or persons working in economic and community development. This format allows participants to learn and more importantly, see, feel and taste what works in any sized community.

## **OVER THE COUNTER**

Many residents like the personal touch or for other reasons come visit with us at the office. Many 4-H youth, volunteers and parents attend meetings or drop off information, fees, or just to say hello. Many local residents would like a plant or insect identified. Gardeners and farmers often stop by to pick up soil test kits. In fact, in 2019 Gratiot County residents used 41 soil test kits. When someone visits the local office, the local support staff are the link to many MSU Extension services. Whether it is by appointment, by phone, or by walk-in, our local office is here to serve the needs of Gratiot County.



MSU Extension offers training on planning and zoning, policy options, land use and environmental issues. All services are available to Michigan's 1,858 municipalities, 14 multicounty regions, 12 federally recognized tribal nations.

## **Featured County Story**



Gratiot County MSU Extension Educator, Erica Rogers, visits farms, does research, meets with decision makers, writes articles, and hosts meetings of producers, consumers, environmentalists, government officials and many others in the Gratiot County farming community as well as state wide. Erica provides education related to animal processing, manure spreading, and other farming practices that affect the environment. The goal is to provide research-based information that helps inform decisions made by producers, consumers and regulators. Applying the latest research and information can help the farming economy grow while protecting Michigan's natural resources.

#### **Research Informs Decisions**

"Some small poultry processors wanted to land apply the wastewater from their processing facilities. These facilities were told by EGLE that a groundwater permit would be required (annual cost of \$1,500), which is an economic hardship for many of these types of facilities. Along with other interested parties, we developed a research project to help determine the actual constituent concentrations and volumes and explored an exemption from the groundwater permit. There were notable differences observed between samples due to different practices and set ups of facilities and we deemed that more research was warranted. However, we also learned valuable lessons including the need for other industries to become more active in wastewater issues. Environmental issues related to permitting can have a great impact on small and large food producers. MSU Extension is in the field to provide research and direction to help navigate these critical areas."
