- Irrigated and Non-irrigated practices, conventional and organic
- Providing Yield, Revenue or Revenue Protection with Harvest Price Exclusion
- Contract Pricing is only available for Organic Practices
- Coverage for Winter Malting types are not currently available anywhere in Michigan
  - Spring Barley grown for Malting may be insured as Spring type in the counties listed above



- What if I don't grow Spring Barley in one of the counties listed?
  - Written Agreements (WA) are the best way to get coverage for producers that grow a different type or grow in a different county.
    - A TP Type Written Agreement could provide coverage for Winter Barley or Winter Malting Barley in the counties that only offer coverage for Spring Barley.
    - An XC Type Written Agreement could provide coverage for all types of Barley in counties that do not offer any coverage for Barley
  - Written Agreements provide each producer with an individual insurance offer based on actuarial data from a reference type or county



## Written Agreements

- How to request WA
  - Submit a completed Request for Actuarial Change through your crop insurance agent by the applicable deadline
    - For the initial year of coverage:
      - TP Type: Acreage Reporting Date
      - XC Type: Cancellation Date
    - For subsequent years of coverage: Sales Closing Date

## Written Agreements

- What information is needed on my request?
  - APH/ Verifiable production records
    - Production records are needed for the 3 most recent crop years (similar crop may apply)
    - If the crop wasn't previously insured, verifiable records must accompany the APH
  - Evidence of Adaptability
  - The legal description of the land being requested
    - Section, Township and Range, if available
  - The FSA FN, Tract and Field numbers
  - Aerial photograph or map the clearly delineates field boundaries
    - · Must include information that allows us to identify the location of the land
  - Normal planting and harvesting dates
  - Evidence of a viable marketing outlet
    - Include name, location of and approximate distance to the place the crop will be sold or used
  - Signed certification statement if the producer has never planted the requested crop

NOTE: Information required with the request may vary depending on request type. This is a general guideline for both TP and XC types. Ask your Crop Insurance Agent for specific information needed for the type of written agreement that applies to you.



- What we can offer through WA
  - We can insure malting type barley through written agreement using a reference county
    - This excludes Spring Malting in the counties that currently have a program.
  - Using a reference county allows us to bring actuarial data for the malting type into an individual offer
    - We can change the actuarial data to fit a specific county or area
      - Dates, rates, t-yields and more can be changed to fit a specific area or producer
  - Provide coverage for malting barley at a contracted price



- What's needed to receive coverage at a contracted price?
  - Signed production contract with the following information must be supplied to RMA
    - Identifies the grower and the buyer
      - Outlines what the grower agrees to plant, grow and deliver
      - The buyer agreement to accept the crop delivered
    - Specifies the amount of production contracted
      - Acres
      - Production
    - The purchase price and method to determine the price
      - Price limits exist

- Whole Farm Revenue Protection (WFRP)
  - Comprehensive Policy that insures a level of total farm income rather than a specific crop
  - Allows you to insure all commodities on your farm under one policy
    - Barley is an approved crop for WFRP.
- Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP)
  - This is a program administered by the USDA Farm Service Agency(FSA) and is available when a Multi-Peril Crop Insurance Policy is not available for the crop in the county.
  - Provides financial assistance to producers of non-insurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory, or prevented planting occur due to natural disasters.

- RMA may expand Malting Barley coverage into more Michigan Counties
  - Adding Malting Type in counties that already have Spring Barley
  - Doing a full expansion of multiple barley types into counties that don't currently have a program



- Where do we start?
  - Provide malting barley coverage on an individual basis, including the contract price through Written Agreements
    - WAs are an indicator of where there is interest in crop insurance
    - Will provide experience to support expansion and build actuarial data
  - Gather information for expansion request
    - Grower Interest
    - Agronomic suitability and data
    - Production Experience
    - Available Markets



- Expansion Request Info and Considerations
  - 1. Identify grower interest in insurance coverage
  - 2. Determine economic significance of the crop
  - 3. Review Actuarial data
  - 4. Verify that the Risk Profile is acceptable
  - 5. Consider Administrative and Budgetary costs

- What data do we need?
  - Estimate of producers growing the crop by county if possible
  - Acreage, yield and crop value
  - Planted and harvested acres
  - Agronomic Info to determine suitability, establish program parameters
  - Available markets
  - Other significant risks
- Where to expand
  - Based on demand for WA, where crop is being grown, industry trends, market location

- How long will it take?
  - Malt Barley Expansion in Ohio:
    - Approached by Stakeholders and Extension in Fall of 2017
    - Held meetings with growers and other stakeholders in Spring of 2018
    - Issued WA's for Malt Barley for 2018 and 2019 crop years
    - Collected data from malters, growers, extension and industry stakeholders during this time.
    - Submitted Expansion Packet for 34 Ohio Counties in Spring 2019
    - Expansion Packet approved and effectively expanded barley for 2020 crop year.
- Where do we want to end up?
  - Coverage for Malt Barley that works for Michigan Growers
    - It is important that we are putting the program in the right counties, with the right types and practices and setting accurate T-yields, dates and premiums
  - Ultimately Adding the Malting Barley Endorsement
    - Providing coverage when quality standards are not met



- Process for expanding endorsement?
  - What is the endorsement?
    - A privately owned product (508H) that is controlled by a private submitter
    - Expansion of the endorsement must be requested by the submitter, not RMA
- Info needed for expansion to be considered
  - Experience to show quality malting barley can be grown in the counties being requested
- Who makes the final decision?
  - The FCIC Board approves request submitted by product owner



- Provide malting barley coverage on an individual basis, including the contract price thru Written Agreements
  - WFRP is also an option
  - NAP may be available
  - Consider Expanding Malt Barley Coverage
- Gather malting barley data
- Expanding Malting Barley Coverage
  - Putting the program in the right counties, with the right types and practices and setting accurate T-yields, dates, and premiums
- Add the Malting Barley Endorsement
  - Provides coverage when quality standards are not met



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
