



Climate Ready Farm Assessments

Risk is not new to farming but the risks a variable climate brings are! How do you usually respond to risk? University professors and educators from the north central region have created this tool to help you determine your farm's vulnerability to the evolving climate. The Climate Ready tool was made using the current body of research around mitigation and adaptation to climate change in crop, dairy, tree fruit and swine production. This is a tool for inward reflection, only looking to help each unique farm find the best choices for their operation. Since each farming system has a built-in amount of risk, achieving a "no risk status" is nearly impossible. So, the goal is to move the bar towards less climate risk.


