### CONSTRUCTION SEASON

We are getting excited for the construction of our Safe Passage sidewalk to begin May 20, 2019! This sidewalk will connect our building to the 4H Children's Garden so that our 14,000+ children that visit us each year will have a dedicated walkway (instead of walking through two active parking lots!). Unfortunately, this construction will make it difficult to enter the gardens from the Entrance Pavilion. Please look for signage when you visit on how to enter our gardens. The construction contractors have assured us they will do their best to keep a portion of parking lot 54 (right next to the Children's Gardens) open as much as possible. The construction is scheduled to be finished by August 2, 2019 so that our 2019 Garden Day should not be hampered.

# **TOP ANNUAL PICKS**

We are gearing up for our spring plant sale and excited to bring you some fun new varieties. Here are a few annual varieties to keep an eye out for. We can't wait to see you at our sale in May!

# Novelty Geraniums 'Mint Julep' and 'Bullseye' series

Geranium 'Mint Julep' is a fancy-leafed geranium with highly variegated white and green foliage and bright red flowers (pictured right on top). This plant sports ivy-geranium leaves, but with a more upright zonal-geranium plant habit. The eye-catching foliage of the Geranium 'Bullseye' series is chocolate brown with green edges (pictured right on bottom). Create contrast in your garden with rich foliage and bright flowers.

### **Coleus 'Premium Sun' Series**

Coleus is a workhorse in our gardens. The Premium Sun series (pictured right) is particularly versatile because it can be grown in the sun or the shade and comes in a nice range of color and patterns. They are great massed in a bed on their own or mixed with other annuals. They are a good bang for your buck because they are great at filling space. Each plant grows 18-30" tall and 18-24" wide.

### **Snapdragon 'Antiquity' Series**

Snapdragon 'Antiquity' (pictured right) is an openfaced snapdragon that is both cute and unique. It was a huge hit in last year's plant sale and will likely sell out again this year. This well-branched variety creates a nice colorful mound in your garden beds.

Some of my favorite vegetable and herbs will be available for purchase at our Spring Plant Sale. Including:

### **Blue Beech Tomato**

Blue Beech Tomato (pictured below, left) is an elongated paste type on an indeterminate (needs staking) plant. Besides canning and sauces, it is excellent for eating fresh. It's better adapted to cold temps, but it takes a long season to ripen. The name? The seed first came from Blue Beech Farm in Vermont.

### **Goldie Ground Cherry**

Goldie Ground Cherry (pictured below, middle) is one of my favorite garden plants. It's a smallish plant in the tomato family whose yellowish sweet fruit develop in a papery husk, and when ripe, drop to the ground. They're delicious as long as you can stay ahead of the chipmunks. Besides eating them as you find them, they can be canned, jammed, and made into pies.

### **Biquinho Pepper**

Biquinho Pepper (pictured below, right) translated from its native Brazil means "little beak"-which it does resemble a bird's head with beak. It's a slightly tart pepper with a small amount of heat. It can be eaten raw, cooked, or as in Brazil, pickled.

### **Desert Blush Cilantro**

This Cilantro (not pictured) is slow bolting and high yielding and this cilantro has darker leaves and reddish stems compared to other cultivars. It does, however, have the same delightful flavor for my salsa and pico de gallo.

## A FEW OF MY FAVORITE THINGS

### BETHANY TROY, PERENNIAL GARDEN MANAGER

It's the most wonderful time of the year – the sun is shining more often, plants are growing wild in our greenhouses, and our spring plant sale is just around the corner! Wondering what perennials you MUST have this year? Have a look at a few of my favorite perennials we are selling this year, and keep an eye out for our inventory on our website.

### Asclepias incarnata 'Cinderella'

This beautiful milkweed boasts large clusters of vanilla scented, rose pink blooms that last for months in the garden. Perfect for the pollinator-friendly gardener, as they attract everything from hummingbirds, to butterflies, to bees, and other beneficial insect friends. Native to North America, this is a musthave for a full-sun, hassle free perennial – and it's deer resistant!

### Astilbe chinensis 'Purple Candles'

Looking to pack a punch with some Astilbe this year? Look no further than 'Purple Candles' – a perennial that is sure to shock your neighbors with oohs and aahs as they yell out "Just how DID you grow that?" from across the street. This large (up to 42 inches in height), midsummer blooming perennial can tolerate some drought, although it prefers mainly moist soils. Great for texture, height, and color in the shade garden.



### A FEW OF MY FAVORITE THINGS - CONTINUED

### Buddleia 'Grand Cascade'

Make a statement with the prettiest Buddleia of all. 'Grand Cascade' sports cascading panicles of large flowers, arguably as large as a human head, reaching up to 14 inches in length and 4 inches wide. And of course, it does all the things a normal buddleia does – it attracts hummingbirds, bees, and butterflies, and they have honey-scented blooms that'll make you stop and smell the flowers. Add this beauty to your garden this year by grabbing one at our sale!



# Knautia macedonica 'Thunder and Lightning'

Imagine: you awake early enough before work with enough time to drink a cup of coffee while admiring your garden. Outside, Knautia 'Thunder and Lightning' is waiting for you with its creamy-yellow variegated foliage sporting deep maroon, round flowers atop wiry stems. You approach the plant as the sun is providing beautiful lighting, accentuating the morning dew droplets. You notice a bumble bee that fell asleep on the flowers overnight. You can't help but pet the bee, enamored by its cuteness, as you say to yourself, "I'm really glad I picked up this plant at the MSU Horticulture Gardens plant sale."

# Pardon our Dust



When you come to visit the 4-H Children's Gardens this summer, you will have to deal with some construction. We are doing everything we can to get these projects done quickly and in a way that has minimum impact on our visitors. Please be patient and follow the signs.

The construction projects will provide two big improvements that are long overdue:

- A new safe passageway from the building to the 4-H Children's Gardens and
- Parking lot resurfacing.

We are very excited about both of these projects and are sure they will be worth any temporary inconvenience. The safe passage will provide a safe, separated walkway that goes from the Plant and Soil Sciences Building to the 4-H Children's Gardens. This is a really big deal when we are hosting hundreds of kids each day and moving between garden and building multiple times during the day.

Resurfacing the parking lot has been a need for several years. This work will get rid of the potholes and provide a smooth parking surface. We are sure this will make your visit more pleasant.

Once you have navigated the construction or enjoyed the new parking lot and walkway, have some fun with our StoryWalk®, a joint project with the Capital Area District Libraries (CADL). Follow the StoryWalk® book through the garden to both read a book and enjoy the activities (talking, skipping, singing and playing) between stations. This is a great way to enjoy the 4-H Children's Gardens even more!

We look forward to seeing you in the 4-H Children's Gardens this summer! Make plans to visit many times. We will be here. Our plants will be putting on their best show, just for you!
