MASTER GARDENER IDEA BED - DESIGN CONTEST WINNER

Congratulations to Catherine Coulson, winner of the 2020 Judith and George Mynsberge Master Gardener Idea Bed Design Contest! Catherine's design was chosen based upon it's aesthetics, unique and suitable plant material combinations, and ease of maintenance.

Cathy received her Extension Master Gardener certification in 2018, but has many years of gardening experience. Cathy is a member of the Livingston County Master Gardener Association (LCMGA) and has served as the board secretary and currently is the president and secretary of the LCMGA Board of Directors.

She currently works at a garden center, is an independent softscape design architect and diagnostician and helps her family members and friends with their gardening needs. She's designed, created and planted beds in Eaton Rapids, Howell and Ann Arbor. She is also the Coordinator for the Demonstration Garden at the MSU Extension office in Livingston County.

Cathy's Rainbow Peace Garden design for the Master Gardener Idea Bed features blue grasses, perennials and succulents as requested by the donors combined with hardy, sun-loving perennials and bulbs in color-coordinated sections. Contained within the garden are natives, pollinators, butterfly attractors and many drought-tolerant and long-blooming species. Early, middle and late-blooming perennials provide interest all season. Daylilies with 6" or larger blooms abound in every section of the garden and bloom from the early to mid-late season and includes various rebloomers. The 3' wide pathways are designed to be the Peace Sign in aerial view and provide ease of viewing and maintenance.

Update on IDM

Question: Is impatiens downy mildew still an issue? Can I plant impatiens in my garden again?

-Bill T. From Muskegon

Answer: Yes, unfortunately Impatiens downy mildew can still be a problem for some gardeners. Impatiens downy mildew (IDM) is the fungal pathogen Plasmopara obducens that specifically impacts Impatiens walleriana. After the initial outbreak starting in 2011, many gardeners were instructed to stop planting Impatiens walleriana until a solution was found. Once your garden is infected, the pathogen can overwinter in the soil and re-infect next year's plants. If you continue to plant Impatiens walleriana after your soil is infected, you are providing a host for the pathogen, increasing the potential for re-infection, causing the production of more spores and re-inoculating the soil for years to come.

Although they are generally much more expensive, you can still get that "Impatiens look" by planting New Guinea Impatiens or any of the impatiens hybrids that are currently (continued on next page)

However, good news is on the horizon! A couple plant breeding companies are working on introducing varieties of Impatiens walleriana that are highly resistant to IDM! We evaluated a handful of these new resistant varieties in our 2019 MSU Trial Garden and found them to hold up all summer without developing the disease (which we know is present in our soil). The Imara XDR series from Syngenta and Beacon series from PanAmerican Seed will both be available in 2020.

Moldy Potting Mix

Question: I just potted a plant using some potting mix I store in a plastic container in my garage. As I was scooping it out, I noticed some mold on the wall of the container. Can I use it, or should I throw it away?

-Charlene P. from Spring Arbor

Answer: I would go ahead and use it! We go through hundreds of bags of potting mix each year. Technically the potting mix is supposed to be sterile, but we often find sheets of moss, mold, mycelium, and sometimes large mushrooms inside the bags. We have never had a problem with any kind of disease transferring from the potting mix to our plants. For the potting mix to actually be sterile, it would have to be heated up to kill off any insects, spores, bacteria, etc. The minute you expose the potting mix to air, or have it come in contact with your plant material, it's no longer sterile anyhow.

Also note that potting mix is not the same thing as soil. Potting mix is usually a soil-free mixture of peat moss and perlite. Sometimes it can contain bark, coconut fiber, sand, or fertilizer granules. If you use actual soil or compost to pot up plants (which I do not recommend), there will definitely be a much higher chance of passing along undesirable pests and diseases.
