EXPLORATION DAYS 2020

This fun MSU pre-college program could be the highlight of your summer - it could even change your life! About 2,500 youth (ages 11-19) and chaperones from across Michigan attend annually.

4-H Exploration Days registration goes from mid-March through April with session assignments made on a first-come, first-served basis. As you select your session choices, be sure to watch for age restrictions! **Age requirements for sessions are based on your age as of January 1.** Visit https://www.canr.msu.edu/4_h_exploration_days/ for online registration book and forms. Hard copies are also available now in the 4-H Office.

- There'll be more than 200 session choices held on and off campus. You'll choose one or two for your three-day stay.
- You'll live in a Michigan State University dorm and eat in the cafeteria—just like MSU students do.
- Sessions are taught by people who know their stuff, including MSU faculty members, 4-H volunteers and staff members and other experts.
- It's not all sessions! There's plenty of time for fun, including the Planetarium, skating, souvenir shopping, exploring, the Dairy Store, tour of the MSU Horse Barn, basketball—even a great dance Thursday night
- **The 2020 cost is \$220.00.** There is an additional \$20 4-H participation fee for youth not yet enrolled in 4-H. The fee includes meals, a shared room in a dorm, sessions and a t-shirt. Local scholarships are available by contacting the 4-H Office.
- **Registration opens Tuesday, March 10, 2019 at 9:00am.** Registration books that show all of the sessions and details on everything happening during Exploration Days is available online and from county Extension offices.

Registrations are entered by the county staff in the order received. The sooner you get your registration in to the 4-H Office, the better chance you will have of getting your first selections. Several have already been turned in so get them in now. The popular sessions fill up quickly.

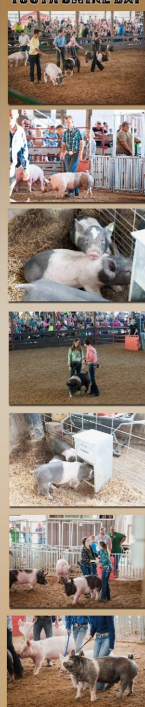

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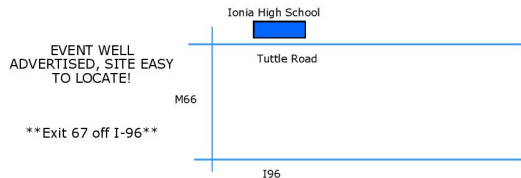

2020 SOUTHWEST MICHIGAN 4-H CAT FUN MATCH RULES

ENTRY FEES - \$2.00 per class

1. An exhibitor may show ANY cat (owned or borrowed). The cat must be groomed for the show by the exhibitor. An exhibitor can show up to two cats/kittens but may not have more than one entry per class. Family members may exhibit the same cat in the showmanship class, but not the breed classes. The Parent/Over Age 19 class is for parents/adults/ youth over age 19 that want to exhibit. Cats shown in the currently adoptable foster care class should be housed in a foster facility and be currently available for adoption.
2. Showmanship class is highly recommended. The purpose of showmanship is for the exhibitor to demonstrate to the judge their general knowledge of cats. This includes physically showing the cat's features, as well as a possible question/answer session concerning cat diet, health, anatomy, physiology, and general care. Scoring will be based on the 4-H Companion Animals guidelines, email Noble for full manual.
3. An exhibitor's attire should be neat and clean. The show dress code includes a light colored long-sleeved shirt and dark colored pants or jeans. Flat shoes are required, no sandals. Long hair should be tied back.
4. Harnesses with identification tags are mandatory; collars are appropriate but cat must also be on harness. Leashes are required. All cats to be kept on harness and leash or crated except when in the show ring. All cats should have a carrier available at all times during the show; cardboard boxes are not acceptable. Exhibitors should provide a carpet sample for exhibiting the cat during breed class.
5. Kittens should be between 4 and 12 months on the day of show; adults are one year or older on the day of show. Household class is considered mixed breed. Purebred class should conform to the standard of the breed, but registration papers are not required. The top two placing cats in each class will be considered for Grand and Reserve Grand Champion cat.
6. Female cats in season, nursing cats, or cats that are obviously pregnant may not participate in the show. A substitute cat will be accepted during show registration without forfeiting pre-entry registration money.
7. All cats shown **MUST** have a certificate showing that they have had the following inoculations - rabies and distemper, calicivirus, and rhinotracheitis (Feline 3 in 1). The rabies must be from a certified veterinarian; the 3 in 1 shot may be done personally but proof of vaccination must be shown (receipt, package, etc.). It is highly recommended that cats also have the feline leukemia and pneumonic inoculations. Cats showing sign of disease such as sneezing, coughing, runny eyes, lice, fleas, ticks, or ear mites will automatically be marked down or removed from the show. No feline leukemia positive cats will be allowed entry.
8. All cats should have their nails clipped or be declawed for the protection of judge and exhibitors. NOTE: This is a youth event - do not have your cat declawed if you plan to enter other shows as it will be a disqualification at some cat shows. Nail clipping is all that is required for this show.
9. Any cat or exhibitor showing excessive aggression, determined by the show officials, shall be removed from show area and shall not exhibit.
10. Cat product will be judged on creativity, originality, workmanship, and exhibitor's product design created by them. Scoring occurs in the following categories: Creativity, Originality, Workmanship, Exhibitor Participation, Business Plan, Financials, Promotion, Interview, and Age Consideration.
11. For cage decorations, exhibitors will use their own carriers and the decorated carrier must fit on the table provided. Cage decorations will be judged on creativity, originality, and youth's description of how decorations and/or costumes were personally designed and created.
12. Cat product is a feline game of skill designed specifically for cat behaviors. Scoring will be based on the Cat product rules, email Noble for full description and scoring.
13. Exhibitors may enter any class as a Differently Abled participant (please indicate same on your entry form). Exhibitor may show regular or differently abled, but not both. Caregiver should remain in the show area at all times to assist child if necessary.
14. Cats should remain in carriers as much as possible and out only for grooming/showing reasons. No cats should roam through the building/show area. No cats should be loose and off harness/leash at any time unless showing.

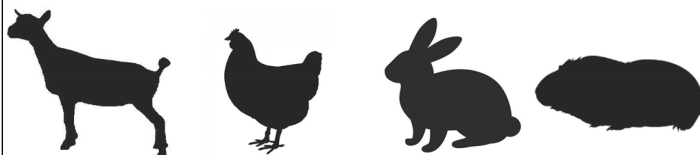

What's the camp schedule?

A tentative daily schedule follows:

7 a.m. - Wake-up

(optional early morning activities include fishing and polar bear swim)

8 a.m. - Breakfast

9 a.m. - Great Lakes ecology exploration sessions (attend a different session each day)

1. Charter Fishing & Fisheries - Live, act and smell like a fish! First-time campers will go charter fishing on Lake Huron in pursuit of trout and salmon while learning fishing tips and tricks. Later, all the anglers will process their catch and discover more about this outstanding Great Lakes fishery. A great fish dinner is also included! Returning campers will get wet exploring aquatic systems using scientific methods and tools to investigate fish habitat and other organisms.

2. Watersheds and Lakes - Get your hands dirty while exploring aquatic ecosystems! Make lake observations from a boat while collecting lake bottom samples to identify what is there, how it got there and what it does. Conduct chemical experiments on the water to determine if it is safe for fish and people.

3. Forestry & Wildlife - We depend on trees and forests for so much - food, shelter and many products you may not have considered. Trees and forests also help the environment with healthy soil, clean air and clean water. Wildlife also depends on a healthy forest. Explore forest communities with foresters to learn forestry practices and techniques while gaining an appreciation of how forests are managed for timber production, wildlife and recreation.



4. Environmental Stewardship - When we hear "throw it away," where is "away"? Campers will engage in real-life simulations that take a challenging look at lifestyles and choices and their effects on the environment. Discover where waste goes and strategies to eliminate it. See how society makes it easy not to think about tomorrow and long-term effects. Identify ways you can become a better environmental steward and create a plan to use when you return home.

5. Coastal Wetlands - Explore the shoreline of Lake Huron. Discover the unique life forms of wetlands and the reasons they are so important to our Great Lakes ecosystems and watersheds. Learn hands-on using tablets and GPS technology for mapping plants and animals of coastal habitats for science research.

1:30 p.m. - Recreation learning options

You'll attend five different options. For first-time campers, these include filleting fish caught during charter fishing. Other possibilities are archery, air rifle shooting, canoeing, outdoor survival, GPS EarthCache hike, photography, sea lamprey research, quarry field trip, lighthouse tour, national marine sanctuary tour, forest fire prevention, crafts, and swimming enhancement for those who can't swim well or at all. Strong swimmers will also have the chance to go kayaking, sailing and snorkeling.

When and where is camp?



4-H Great Lakes and Natural Resources Camp will be held August 5-11, 2018. Lodging, meals and programming will take place at Camp Chickagami, near the shore of Lake Huron between Alpena and Rogers City. The state-licensed camp has dormitory-style cabins, a dining hall, and toilet and shower facilities.



MSU precollege scholarship opportunity

Campers who will enter eighth, ninth or tenth grades following their involvement are eligible for nomination to apply for a \$2,000 MSU Precollege Achievement Scholarship. Campers will be invited to apply on the basis of criteria such as attitude, behavior and active participation. The funds will be applied toward the first year at MSU as a degree-seeking student. How much does camp cost?

The fee is \$375. (Those who are not 4-H members pay an additional \$20.) The fee includes meals and snacks, lodging, a T-shirt, and program and activity fees. Donors to the Michigan 4-H Foundation, Michigan Sea Grant Extension and MSU Extension generously offset about 25 percent of the real \$450 per camper cost. A limited number of state scholarships are offered for teens with financial need. Contact your county MSU Extension office to see if local scholarships may also be available.

Who should attend?

You can apply to attend if you'll be ages 13 to 15 during camp. (**Note:** You may still apply if you'll be 12 during camp but entering eighth grade in the fall.) You don't need to be a 4-H member to attend. So that each camper can have the best experience possible, you must be able to fully participate in grade-level-appropriate small-group science learning sessions as well as very active large-group recreation. It's an action-packed week of fun and learning! (Campers who are unable to meet these expectations will be dismissed from camp at the parent/guardian's expense.)

How do I apply and get selected?

Camp applications are due by May 1, but space is limited to 70 campers, so early application is encouraged.

Beginning June 5, wait-listed applicants will be offered spaces forfeited by campers who failed to meet the deadline.
