PRESENTATION SKILLS Oral Interpretation/Dramatic Reading/Storytelling

Oral interpretation is the art of bringing good literature to life. The presenter uses voice, eyes, posture, and gestures to recreate the words and feelings of the selection. May be from a script or from memory. Use of props, costuming, and movement is encouraged. You must begin with an introduction that includes the author and title of the selection. If poetry, use two or more poems that are related by theme or are by the same author.

Guidelines

- Selections should be five to 20 minutes long
- Selections maybe read from a neatly prepared script or memorized EXCEPT storytelling, which is NOT reading
- Selections may come from published plays, sort stories, novels, or poems. If using poetry, the selection should have two or more poems, related by theme or the same writer. Use a short transition or explanation between poems.
- \lesssim Start with an introduction (preferably memorized), which should include the title of the selection and a brief explanation.
- Some use of props, costumes and movement is acceptable
