Poultry Show Rules for 2021

- 1. All poultry exhibitors are encouraged to participate in showmanship
- 2. Showmanship classes will be broken down the following way:
 - a. Pee Wee (5-7 year old's)
 - b. Junior (8-11 year old's)
 - c. Intermediate (12-14 year old's)
 - d. Senior (15 -19 year old's)
- 3. Pee Wee's will be able to participate in showmanship only, however, you may bring your own pen of poultry or you may use another exhibitor's bird
- 4. Exhibitors allowed to participate between the ages of 5-19
- 5. Exhibitors may register / show up to 3 entries
 - a. Example: 2 pens of poultry (not in the same class) and 1 dozen of eggs
- 6. Exhibitors must be pre-registered for classes by June 20th
 - a. Register at https://isabellacofair.wixsite.com/2021/sign-up
- 7. Exhibitors must be pre-registered for the Small Animal Auction by June 20th
 - a. Register at https://isabellacofair.wixsite.com/2021/sign-up
 - b. Each exhibitor is allowed only 1 entry in the auction (example: you show 1 goat, 1 rabbit and 1 pen of poultry you can only sell 1 of the 3 items)
- 8. Poultry will be entered on Sunday, July 25 from 4:00 6:00 pm
 - a. Poultry not obtained from a pullorum free hatchery will be tested at entry at a cost of \$.50 per bird
 - b. Poultry with lice or lice eggs will be sent home
 - c. Poultry showing any signs of disease will be sent home
- 9. Show day will be on Monday, July 26 and will begin at 10:00 am
- 10. Eggs will be entered on Monday, July 26 from 8:30 9:30 am (bring your eggs in an egg carton in a cooler labeled with your name)
- 11. No feed records this year
- 12. There will be no open class entries allowed
- 13. Showmanship rosettes will be given in every class for top 10 the day of show
- 14. Trophies will be awarded and given out the day of show
- 15. Champion & Reserve Champion pens must be sold in the auction
- 16. All pens registered for the auction must stay on the fairgrounds through the auction
- 17. Exhibitors are required to care for their animals
 - a. They must clean the tray, feed and water their animals daily by 10:00 a.m. and again by 7:00 p.m.
 - b. Food containers and poultry feed will be provided
 - c. Exhibitors are responsible for providing an appropriate water container for their poultry
- 18. All poultry needs to be dusted for lice 6 weeks, 4 weeks, and 2 weeks prior to fair
- 19. All poultry exhibited at fair needs to bathed 24 hours prior to entry
- 20. Pens NOT registered for the auction will be released on Monday, July 26 approximately between 7-8 pm (time subject to change)
- 21. Required show dress attire is long sleeved white shirt with long dark pants and closed toed shoes
- 22. State / Local Health Department face mask guidelines will be applicable

Goat Show Rules for 2021

- 1. All Goat exhibitors are encouraged to participate in showmanship
- 2. Showmanship classes will be broken down the following way:
 - a. Pee Wee (5-7 year old's)
 - b. Junior (8-11 year old's)
 - c. Intermediate (12-14 year old's)
 - d. Senior (15 19 year old's)
- 3. Exhibitors may register / show up to 4 entries.
- 4. Exhibitors must be pre-registered by June 20th.
- 5. Exhibitors must be pre-registered for the Small Animal Auction by June 20th
 - a. Each exhibitor is allowed only 1 entry in the auction (example: you show 1 goat, 1 rabbit and 1 pen of poultry you can only sell 1 of the 3 items)
- 6. Show day will be on Wednesday, July 28 at 9:30am registration is 8am-9am
 - a. Vet check is \$.50 per goat
 - b. Goats with lice, lice eggs or lumps or bumps will be sent home
 - c. Goats showing any signs of disease will be sent home
 - d. Any wethers that do not have a scrapie tag will not be able to show or sell.
- 7. Feed records are NOT required this year
- 8. There will be no open class entries allowed this year
- 9. Showmanship rosettes will be given in every class for top 10 the day of show
- 10. Trophies will be awarded and given out the day of show
- 11. Champion & Reserve Champion market doe's and wethers must be sold in the auction
- 12. All goats registered for the auction must stay on the fairgrounds through the auction. All others go home after the show.
- 13. Exhibitors are required to care for their animals
 - a. They must clean the pens, feed and water their animals daily by 10:00 a.m. and again by 7:00 p.m.
- 14. Exhibitors are responsible for providing an appropriate water and food containers for their goats no hay on the ground.
- 15. State / Local Health Department face make guidelines will be applicable

2021 Isabella County Rabbit Youth Show Rules

Pre-show day:

- Youth ages 5-19 can register to show
- Register at https://isabellacofair.wixsite.com/2021/sign-up
- Exhibitors may show up to 3 entries (a market pen counts as 1 entry); any combination of classes (i.e. 2 senior bucks, 1 junior doe)
- Rabbits must be free of disease & must have an identification permanent tattoo in their left ear
- Must be registered by Sunday, June 20 (this deadline also applies to all other small animals and the auction)

Show day rules:

- Show day is Tuesday, July 27
- Check in is 7:30-8am; Show begins at 8:30am
- Must be checked in by 8am to compete in showmanship
- Pedigree for rabbits being sold in the auction must be turned in on show day
- Showmanship is optional but strongly encouraged as this is not a 4-H show
- Exhibitors who participate in showmanship should wear closed-toe shoes, dark pants and a long sleeve white shirt.
- There will be no open class; this is only a youth show
- There will be no feed records
- There will be no mixed breed class; all breeds will show and be judged according to the American Rabbit Breeders Association's Standard of Perfection.
- All animals must be brought in an all-day/show-length appropriate container. Contact show superintendents if this is a problem. No rabbits will be staying on the fairgrounds after the show. Rabbits being sold in the auction will be brought back to the fairgrounds on Wednesday evening.
- Showmanship classes will be broken down by age: Pre-Junior (5-7), Junior (8-11), Intermediate (12-14), Senior (15-19)
- Awards for showmanship: Rosettes for top 10 in every class, trophies for the Grand & Reserve Champion of each age group.
- Awards for breed class: A, B, C ribbons awarded to each animal exhibited. Based on the number of entries, top 6 breeds shown receive both Best of Breed and Best Opposite of Breed trophies. The next down 3-4 breeds will receive Best of Breed trophy. All other breeds will receive Best of Breed rosettes.

Pocket Pet Show Rules for 2021

- Show day will be on Thursday, July 29. Animals will be entered from 2:00-2:30 pm on that day, with the show following immediately at 2:30 pm. Animals will be taken home immediately following the show.
- 2. Exhibitors must be pre-registered by June 20th
- 3. Exhibitors may register / show up to 3 entries
- 4. Classes will be broken down the following way:
 - a. Pee Wee (5-7 years old)
 - b. Junior (8-11 years old)
 - c. Intermediate (12-14 years old)
 - d. Senior (15 -19 years old)
- 5. This is a youth only show; there will be no adult open class entries allowed this year.
- 6. Feed records are NOT required this year
- 7. Participation ribbons will be awarded to all the Pee Wee exhibitors.
- 8. A Grand Champion award will be presented to the top exhibitor.

- Auction is Wednesday, July 28 at 6:30pm in the Large Animal Pavilion
- Register at https://isabellacofair.wixsite.com/2021/sign-up
- Must be registered by Sunday, June 20
- Exhibitors selling rabbits turn in the pedigree on show day (we may ask for proof of pedigree before show day)
- All exhibitors are strongly encouraged to personally invite buyers to the auction
- Animals must be shown in their appropriate show (Poultry on Monday, Rabbits on Tuesday, Goats on Wednesday) in order to sell
- Exhibitors may only sell one animal (unless multiple grand/reserve awards are won)
- We are encouraging buyers to take home purchased animals on auction night. We'll be checking out animals until 11pm.
- Grand Champions and Reserve Champions from the poultry, rabbit and goat shows
 must be sold in the auction. These animals will be added to the sale after judging if they
 were not already registered for the sale. If an exhibitor wins in multiple species, they will
 sell multiple animals.
- Animals disqualified in any of the poultry, rabbit or goat shows will be removed from the auction.
- Exhibitors who sell will receive 90% of the highest bid for their animal. The remaining 10% will go back to the organization hosting the auction.

MSU Extension resumes limited 4-H face-to-face programming

Over the past several months, MSU Extension has been working diligently to chart a path toward resuming in-person programming during the current public health crisis. Thanks to the thoughtfully crafted guidelines created by MSU Extension professionals, we are excited to share that MSU Extension will resume hosting face-to-face programs and events that adhere to public health guidelines.

As of May 17, Michigan 4-H professionals and volunteers may submit a request to host an in-person event that follows specific guidelines and requirements. The health and safety of program participants and volunteers, as well as their families and our staff, remains the top priority. All guidelines outlined by MSU Extension are based on the <u>Centers for Disease</u> <u>Control and Prevention</u> (CDC), <u>Michigan Department of Health and Human Services</u> (MDHHS), and the <u>MSU Community Compact</u> and *must be followed closely*.

As we begin expanding our in-person offerings, communication, transparency and collaboration are essential for the safety and well-being of all parties. MSU Extension expectations regarding programming and events will remain fluid and subject to change at any time based on evolving guidance from the CDC, MDHHS and the MSU Community Compact. Groups should continue to provide options (including virtual) for participation to ensure all participants can remain involved given their individual circumstances.

Communicating through Conflict Training for Volunteers

As MSU Extension begins resuming limited in-person programming, volunteers who are interested in participating in face-to-face experiences are required to complete the volunteer specific Communicating through Conflict course. This course is a modified version of the course MSU Extension employees have completed and is designed to prepare volunteers for challenging situations that could arise as they enforce public health and MSU Extension requirements.

Volunteer Completion of the Training

There are three ways a volunteer can complete this training:

Option 1: Volunteer Central

The most efficient and interactive way to complete this training is via Volunteer Central. Volunteers can <u>login to</u> <u>their profile</u>. Once logged in, volunteers should select the "My Trainings" tab and locate "Communicating through Conflict." Next, they should click on the "Launch" button next to it to activate the course. See the screenshot below. The red boxes highlight the areas that the volunteer should be looking for.

Upon completion, the training will be marked as "Completed" and staff will see this in eCoordinator. To confirm the training has been completed, login to eCoordinator, open the volunteer profile and go to the "Screening" tab. You will find "Communicating through Conflict" in the "Training" section of the tab and status will say "Completed." Below is a screenshot of what you will see in eCoordinator.

Option 2: Group Training

MSU Extension professionals can utilize <u>this link to access a video version</u> of the training to show it to a group of volunteers via Zoom. Staff are encouraged to view the video prior to the Zoom to prepare for the session. The group training option can be as interactive as the Volunteer Central version if the staff member pauses the video after scenarios are presented and engages the group in conversation to determine which answer to select before restarting the video.

Following a group training, the staff member will need to document the completion of training for each volunteer in eCoordinator. To do this in eCoordinator, open the volunteer profile and select the "Screening" tab. Find "Communicating through Conflict" under Trainings and change the status to "Completed". Press "Apply" to save this change. Next, click on "Add Note" and document the training. For example, "Volunteer attended group Zoom training on 4/1/21." See the screenshot below. Click "Apply" to save the changes. This will also be visible in the Notes and History tab of the volunteer's profile.

Option 3: Training Packet

When a volunteer does not have access to the technology needed for option one or two, staff can utilize the training packet option. With this option, staff will email the file or print the <u>slides and script</u> for each volunteer and mail them the training packet. At the end of the training packet, volunteers are directed to inform staff that the training has been completed. Once staff receives the communication that the training is complete, the staff member will need to document the completion of the training in eCoordinator. To do this, open the volunteer profile and select the "Screening" tab. Find "Communicating through Conflict" under Trainings and change the status to "Completed." Next, click on "Add Note" and document the training. For example, "Volunteer was provided with a print version of the training. On April 1, 2021 the volunteer called and reported that they completed reviewing the information." See the screenshot below. Click "Apply" to save the changes. This will also be visible in the Notes and History tab of the volunteer's profile.

Dear Kristi Schreiber & Isabella 4-H Community,
