The 4-H Council is the main decision-making body for the county 4-H program. It is responsible for working with the paid staff to support county 4-H program planning, administration and policy making. ## **Volunteer Annual Compliance**

Beginning on July 1, MSU Extension will be changing the annual compliance process for all volunteers. Moving forward, a background check authorization will not be required beyond the initial authorization submitted at the time of application. Furthermore, background checks will be conducted during a volunteer's birth month. A courtesy email will be sent to the volunteer at least two weeks prior to the date of the background check. If a volunteer plans to remain active, no action is required until their Volunteer Code of Conduct is due. If the volunteer would like to resign or has already left the program, the volunteer can respond asking MSU Extension to change their activity status and not conduct the background check.

It is recommended that volunteers review and complete the Volunteer Code of Conduct and Media/ Medical Waiver annually to ensure emergency medical information is up-to-date. On occasion, MSU Extension will make updates to the Volunteer Code of Conduct. When this happens, volunteers will be notified and provided with a timeframe in which they must login to Volunteer Central and update their Volunteer Code of Conduct and Media/Medical Waiver.

#### 2022 Michigan 4-H State Award winners announced



The <u>Michigan 4-H State Awards</u> Program recognized outstanding 4-H members during the opening session of 4-H Exploration Days on June 22. At the event, honorees had the opportunity to celebrate their accomplishments with their fellow 4-H Exploration Days participants.

A Michigan 4-H State Award is the highest honor bestowed on Michigan 4-H members and recognizes a level of excellence in learning, leadership and service. In total, 20 4-H members from 16 counties submitted applications to take part is this year's program.

"With tens of thousands of 4-H'ers across the state, the youth honored with 4-H State Awards are some of our most accomplished 4-H'ers," said Julie Chapin, 4-H state leader of Michigan 4-H and director of MSU Extension's children and youth programs. "Their commitment to bettering themselves

and their communities through service and extensive 4-H work make them true leaders in their clubs, counties and across our state."

Michigan 4-H State Awards were presented in 13 of the 19 available award categories that showcase the diverse array of 4-H knowledge, skills, and experience. Recipients of the 2022 awards are:

- Rabbit and Cavy Science: Noah Hecht of Saginaw County (junior division) and Alexis Fisher of Monroe County (senior division)
- Sheep Science: Jadyn Herzog of Allegan County (junior division) and Jaycie Brown of Livingston County (senior division).
- Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM): Brandon Fisher of Monroe County (junior division) and Blake Towne of Van Buren County (senior division)
- · Visual, Performing and Expressive Arts: Corinna Aulph of Monroe County (junior division)

The Michigan 4-H State Awards Program is open to 4-H members who are 13-19 years old with three or more years of 4-H experience. To qualify for the award, 4-H'ers must submit a written application that showcases the learning experiences, knowledge and skills they've acquired through their participation in 4-H, as well as their contributions to their local 4-H programs, clubs and communities. Submissions are reviewed by the Michigan 4-H State Awards selection committee. This group of volunteers, staff members and industry experts determine which members are selected as award finalists. All applicants receive written feedback from selection committees.

Senior delegates (ages 16-19) and groups then complete an interview using video conference technology. Completing a video interview provides an opportunity for 4-H members to practice real-world skills that are trending in the workforce.

In addition to a plaque, each 4-H State Award winner in the senior division will also receive a \$200 cash award; junior winners receive \$50 cash awards. These awards are made possible by generous donations to the Michigan 4-H Foundation.

## Raise a Leader Dog Puppy and Continue a 4-H Legacy

You have probably seen one, an adorable dog wearing a blue "Future Leader Dog" bandana and wondered how you can learn to train a dog to behave so well. There's only one way to learn the Leader Dogs for the Blind (LDB) method—raise a puppy for the organization.

LEADER DOGS

Did you know that the first LDB volunteer puppy raisers in 1958 were members of the Oakland County K-9 4-H Club? In fact, 4-H members have had a big impact at Leader Dog.

Long-time LDB Employee and Volunteer Puppy Raiser Pat Boyd, who personally raised 29 LDB puppies, learned about LDB as the leader of the 4-H club her five children belonged to decades ago. Three of her children raised 24 LDB puppies while also participating in other 4-H projects, "It would be easier to list what they didn't do," said Pat. Recently, one of Pat's granddaughters continued the tradition by raising three LDB puppies while in high school.

"I liked the kids being involved with puppy raising," said Pat, "it taught them responsibility in two ways. First, by caring for the dog for a year, and then the important responsibility of reaching out and helping people in need. While it is hard to give the dog back after a year, you are doing this for a person who really needs that dog to live their life to its fullest."

Other LDB employees initially learned about LDB through 4-H. Bev Ferguson, manager of canine development, raised LDB puppies as part of her 4-H experience. Laura Fisher, puppy development coordinator, handled horses during 4-H, but now raises LDB puppies alongside her husband and three sons.

As a volunteer puppy raiser, you get to spend a year with a cute canine as you both learn the skills needed for the puppy to be ready for its formal guide dog training. With the help of an experienced LDB puppy counselor, you'll learn the proper way to teach the common skills of sit, stay, settling calmly on a mat and walking nicely on a leash. But you'll also learn unique skills needed by working Leader Dogs like ignoring distractions, moving confidently through busy environments and properly greeting people.

This opportunity is open to 4-H members and their families (applications must be filled out by someone 18 years or older). Whether you've been a "dog family" for years or have never had a dog, you'll learn a lot during your year as Leader Dog puppy raisers.

Other benefits of this volunteer position include helping people who are blind become more independent and confident in their travel, meeting like-minded people and feeling good about giving back to your community.
