## 2022 Kalamazoo County Youth Fair Camping Fees & Information

#### **CAMPING RESERVATIONS**

The Kalamazoo County Parks & Expo Center will be handling all the camping reservations again this year.

Beginning on May 2, 2022 you must call to make your reservation directly with the Expo Center.

Camping Fees: Weekly Rate - \$120.00 per week (8/8-8/14)

Reservations made after July 31 are \$150 per week

Advance Reservation Fee: One-time \$5.00 fee will be charged for all advance reservations

Vehicle Passes: Two vehicle passes are included per campsite. Only two vehicles are allowed per campsite, and

additional passes will not be sold.

Golf Carts: All golf carts must be pre-registered. Golf cart permits are \$25 each. After July 31 fee is \$100. You

must be 18 years of age, have a valid driver's license and provide proof of liability insurance to

operate a golf cart on the grounds.

## Call 269-383-8778 for Reservations! Deadline for Camping Registration July 31, 2022

Campground check-in will take place from 3-6pm on Monday, August 8 and from 9am-6pm on Tuesday, August 9.

No early arrivals.

**Camping Information:** Camping will be reserved by campground area at time of reservation (see map for campground areas) and specific site numbers will be emailed out approximately 1 week prior to arrival. We will try to accommodate special requests. All requests will be considered in order by date of reservation.

Campers may not switch from assigned site number upon arrival. All reservations must be paid by credit card at the time of reservation. There is a non-refundable \$5 reservation fee for each campsite reserved. Most sites offer water and electric hook-up.

A dump station with potable water is available on the grounds.

Showers and handicapped-accessible restrooms are available.

Cancellations will be accepted until July 31, 2022 for a full refund, less the \$5 reservation fee. No refunds are available for cancellations after July 31, 2022.

## 2022 Rules & Guidelines

**Introduction:** Following are the Kalamazoo County Fair Council (Fair Council) Rules and Guidelines which regulate the Kalamazoo County Youth Fair (Fair). The Fair Council shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as are authorized by the statutes and laws of the State of Michigan under Public Act 11 of 1929, as amended, and by the Kalamazoo County Board of Commissioners. The goal of the Fair Council is to provide a quality, family-oriented fair that supports the 4-H youth as well as promotes and encourages the agricultural and tourism industries in Kalamazoo County.

Regarding these Rules and Guidelines, the Kalamazoo County Fair Council reserves the final and absolute right to interpret said rules and regulations and to settle all matters, questions, and differences resulting from these Rules and Guidelines. The Kalamazoo County Fair Council further reserves the right to amend, or to add to, or delete from these rules as it finds necessary. Updated Rules and Guidelines will be published each year, for that year, in the Kalamazoo County Fair Book (Fair Book).

These Rules & Guidelines were approved by the Kalamazoo County Fair Council at its February 23, 2022 meeting.

#### Section 1 – General Exhibition Rules

- 1. If an exhibitor disregards any of the rules or guidelines in this document, he/she forfeits all rights, and privileges without remedy.
- 2. Exhibitors are not permitted to sell articles or exhibits or place "For Sale" signs on exhibits before the close of the Fair.
- 3. After the arrival of livestock and articles for exhibit on the fairgrounds, Fair management will use diligence and prudence to ensure the safety of livestock and articles entered for exhibition or display. However under no circumstances will Fair management be responsible for loss, injury or damage by fire, lightning, wind or by any other means, to livestock and articles on exhibition or display. Fair management shall be held harmless by the exhibitors against all legal or other proceedings.
- 4. Exhibitors must place all exhibits under the direction of the superintendent in charge of the department that the exhibit is registered and entered in.
- 5. All animal entries must meet the 2022 Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development exhibition requirements including proper identification of animals. All animals must be free from any contagious, infectious, or communicable diseases. Refer to MDARD Health Requirements on page 7 of this Fair Book.
- 6. The exhibitor must be the primary caregiver of the animal from possession date until the end of the Fair. If an exhibitor chooses to sell at auction (Grand and Reserve Champions must sell at the Livestock Auction sale,) the animal becomes the property of the buyer at the time the auctioneer recognizes the buyer. However, the exhibitor is responsible for the proper care of the animal until it is removed from the fairgrounds at the end of the Fair. For exceptions to this rule consult the individual species department rules listed under each department in the Fair Book.
- 7. Kalamazoo County Youth Fair prohibits market livestock exhibitors from entering the fair if the exhibitor enters the same individual animals at any other fair, prior to the Kalamazoo County Youth Fair, in the same calendar year. If an exhibitor violates this rule, the exhibitor will be prohibited from participating in the Kalamazoo County Youth Fair in the same calendar year.
- 8. In the event of conflict between these general rules and individual species department rules listed under each department in this Fair Book, the individual species department rules will take precedence.
- 9. The Kalamazoo County Youth Fair is the showplace for animal agriculture for the county. All animals and livestock shown, housed, or displayed shall receive care that is humane, healthful, and consistent with accepted practices. Professional veterinary care will be on call and available for consultation for any animal injury or illness. Any treatment will be at the expense of the animal owner. Exhibits shall reflect the care and concern that the State of Michigan, MSU Extension 4-H Program, and the Kalamazoo County Fair Council have for livestock, poultry, companion animals, and wildlife.

#### Section 2 – General Facility Rules

- 1. Golf carts are not allowed on the fairgrounds and will be limited to Fair business use only. Golf carts are allowed in the campgrounds and must be pre-registered. Refer to Camping Fees and Information on page 3 of this Fair Book.
- Dogs, except for leader dogs, are not permitted on the fairgrounds during Fair hours. Dogs are allowed inside the campgrounds, but must remain there throughout the duration of the Fair.
- 3. The Kalamazoo County Fair Council prohibits demonstrations, protests, unauthorized distribution of literature, and any other disruption of activities at the Fair. Violators will be removed from the fairgrounds.

#### Section 3-Entries

#### ALL STILL AND ANIMAL PROJECT EXHIBITS MUST BE PRE-REGISTERED IN FAIR ENTRY BY JULY 1, 2022.

- 1. Pre-registration for all entries in all departments must be made on the "Fair Entry" website. Registration information for all 4-H youth classes will be provided to each club leader by the MSU Extension office. All 4-H entries must be entered in the "Fair Entry" software by July 1, 2022. Entries will not be accepted after July 1.
- 2. All entries must be made in the name of the bona fide owner or the organization when not individually owned. Failure to observe this rule will disqualify the exhibit.
- 3. All animal entries must meet the 2022 Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development exhibition requirements including, but not limited to, (a) proper identification of animal exhibits; and (b) be free from any contagious, infectious, or communicable diseases. Refer to MDARD Health Requirements on page 7 of this Fair Book.
- 4. All equine entries (mini ponies, horses, and draft horses) must have an official current veterinary statement indicating a NEGATIVE COGGINS TEST as required by the State of Michigan. All equine exhibitors MUST turn in their Coggins report with their entry registration. Equine entries received without a negative Coggins test will not be accepted.
- 5. Superintendents will check the animals at the designated check-in times to verify that each animal has met all requirements. Cattle, pigs, and goats must have a required and approved tag in the ear. Market rabbits must have tattoo in their ear. All market livestock must have the approved livestock tag in its ear. Animals not in compliance with all the requirements will not be allowed to unload and will be sent home.
- 6. All exhibits must be of this season's growth or production, except as noted in some department classes listed in this Fair Book.
- 7. Only one entry per person per class is allowed. Some exceptions are made in some of the Livestock departments. Please consult the individual species department rules listed under each department in this Fair Book.
- 8. To exhibit in 4-H classes at the Fair, an exhibitor must be a registered 4-H club member and have completed all necessary club and project requirements.
- 9. **Exhibit Deadlines:** (a) 4-H non animal still exhibits must be delivered to the fairgrounds between 9:00am and 12:00pm on Saturday, August 6, 2022; and (b) all livestock need to be on the fairgrounds according to the species show schedule.
- 10. **Exhibit Pick-up:** Exhibitors must leave all identification of owner and animal in the stall until the animal has been removed. Exhibits are to be picked up at the completion of Fair. Removal of exhibits prior to established times will result in an exhibitor's forfeiture of ribbons. 4-H members are required to clean the stalls down to the ground. Stalls will be checked for cleanliness by each department superintendent. Fair Management and MSU Extension staff will not be responsible for articles left after release time.
- 11. The Fair administrative management reserves the right to reject any exhibit offered.
- 12. The Kalamazoo County Youth Fair Biosecurity Plan supersedes any of the rules and regulations found in this Fair book. The Biosecurity Plan will be separate from this Fair book, and is subject to change at any time. The Biosecurity Plan will be posted on the Fair's website and also available through the Fair Office.

#### Section 4 — Judging

- 1. No later than July 1 of the current year, the department superintendents will secure competent judges to judge all of said superintendent's department exhibits. Superintendents are not allowed to judge their own departments.
- 2. Failure to respond promptly to the superintendent's call to enter the show ring forfeits the exhibitor's right to compete in that Section or Class.
- 3. No person will be permitted to interfere with the judge while he/she is performing his/her duty of examination.
- 4. The decision of the judge is final on all placing.

#### Section 5 - Appeals and Complaints Prior to Fair

- 1. Any exhibitor or parent may file a complaint with the Fair Office regarding any of the following:
  - a. Conflict of interest of the judge
  - b. Disqualification of an exhibitor or exhibit
  - c. Exhibitor, group leader, or Superintendent behavior
  - d. Eligibility of an exhibit
- 2. The exhibitor or parent must contact the Fair Coordinator or 4-H Coordinator to file a complaint. The Fair Coordinator and the 4-H Coordinator will work to resolve the issue in a timely manner. If necessary the Coordinators will convene a

meeting of the 4-H/Fair Superintendent Committee or may refer complaints to the appropriate council which includes the Fair Council, Livestock Association, Leader's Council, Horse Council, Dog and Cat Councils, for resolution.

#### Section 6 - Appeals and Complaints Following Fair

- 1. Any exhibitor may file a complaint with the Fair Office regarding any of the following:
  - a. Conflict of interest of the judge
  - b. Disqualification of an exhibitor or exhibit
  - c. Exhibitor, group leader, or Superintendent behavior
  - d. Eligibility of an exhibit
- 2. An exhibitor must file a formal written complaint with the Kalamazoo County Youth Fair Office no later than ten days following the Fair, with a \$10.00 protest fee to be retained by Fair management if the protest is not upheld. Forms are available at both the Fair and 4-H Offices.
- 3. Fair management will refer all protest to the Kalamazoo County Fair Council.
- 4. The Fair Council will hold a hearing 30 days after the conclusion of the Fair to review the protest and give all parties involved an opportunity to submit evidence.
- 5. The Fair Council will provide a written ruling to all parties concerned within ten days following the hearing.
- 6. If the exhibitor is not satisfied with the outcome of the protest hearing, he or she may make an appeal to the Michigan Department of Agriculture (MDA) within 45 days of filing the initial complaint. MDA shall have 60 days after receipt of any appropriately filed appeal to investigate the complaint, and shall issue a finding of fact and notice of department action and any recommended actions for the council.

#### **ADA Policy**

The Kalamazoo County Youth Fair is ADA compliant. The Fair will make all reasonable efforts to accommodate special need exhibitors. Please contact the Kalamazoo County Youth Fair five working days in advance if special accommodations are requested. The Fair allows ADA compliant motorized and non-motorized mobility devices for reasonable and equitable access by persons with a disability who require use of such mobility devices.



## REVISED January 2016 (Replaces All Previous Editions)

Livestock means those species of animals used for human food and fiber or those species of animals used for service to humans. Livestock includes but is not limited to cattle, sheep, new world came/ids (llamas, alpacas, vicunas, and guanacos), goats, bison, privately owned cervids, ratites (cassowaries, kiwis, ostriches, and emus), swine, equine, poultry, aquaculture, and rabbits. Livestock does not include dogs and cats.

#### **GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL ANIMALS**

Exhibitors at state, county, and district fairs, along with other livestock exhibitions, expositions, and shows are required to comply with all of the statutory and regulatory provisions of the State of Michigan relating to animal health outlined in the Animal Industry Act, 1988 PA 466, MCL 287.701-287.747, and rules promulgated for the implementation and enforcement of the act.

- 1. A person who discovers, suspects, or has reason to believe an animal is either affected by a reportable disease or contaminated with a toxic substance shall immediately report the fact, suspicion, or belief to the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (daytime telephone: 800-292-3939; after hours: 517-373-0440).
- **2.** Livestock with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease shall be removed from the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show or by permission of the director, shall be isolated on the premises.
- **3.** A fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority shall have an accredited veterinarian on call whenever there are animals on the premises.
- **4.** All cattle, sheep, goats, swine and privately-owned cervids shall bear official USDA identification before they leave their home premises. Swine require official identification prior to being exhibited.
- **5.** Upon request, a person who exhibits livestock shall present for inspection all reports, test charts, and appropriate health certificates required to accompany the livestock.
- 6. A fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority shall do all of the following:
- a. Notify exhibitors of health tests and certificates required for importation and exhibition. b. Examine and approve required official animal identification, health certificates, reports, test charts, certificates, or other required documentation before commingling with other animals.
- c. Notify exhibitors whether or not poultry vaccinated against Infectious Laryngotracheitis (ILT) are allowed in the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority.
- d. Provide shipping arrangements for all swine exhibited that are to be removed from the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority facility for direct movement to slaughter or a livestock auction market as defined in Licensing Livestock Dealers, 1937 PA 284, MCL 287.121-287.131.

- 7. A fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority may require additional testing or vaccination of animals before entry and during the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show.
- 8. Whenever an official test is conducted or an official vaccination is administered, livestock shall, unless exempted by the director, be permanently identified in a manner approved by the director.
- 9. Unless otherwise approved by the director, a facility for exhibition of livestock shall be constructed to allow sufficient separation of each exhibitor's livestock. The facility shall be constructed of a material that can be adequately cleaned and disinfected.
- 10. An exhibition building or yarding facility shall be cleaned and disinfected with a United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) approved disinfectant used in accordance with label instructions before livestock are admitted by removing from the premises all manure, litter, hay, straw, and forage from pens, runways, and show rings; and thoroughly disinfecting walls, partitions, floors, mangers, awarding facilities, and runways in a manner approved by the director. For a complete list of disinfectants, please refer to www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo.

#### **General Rules for 4-H Youth Division**

Exhibitor Eligibility-Entry in the 4-H Division is open to all youth ages 5-19 by January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year who are duly enrolled members of an MSU Extension, Kalamazoo County 4-H Youth Development Program. 4-H youth members must enroll with the Michigan State University Extension Club Office, Kalamazoo, Michigan by April 1 of the current year. 4-H members must have completed all necessary club and project requirements to be eligible to participate in the Kalamazoo County Fair.

- 1. The 4-H Youth entries may not be made in a section unless the projects were completed during the past year. Winter and summer projects are eligible.
- 2. Market animals and exhibits are to be the personal property of the exhibitor's family and must have been raised or completed by the exhibitor.
- 3. Exhibitors may not place "For Sale" signs on any projects while exhibited at the fair.
- 4. Exhibitors are permitted to enter classes only once. (Some exceptions are made in the livestock areas. Please consult those departments). Ribbons will be awarded for all A, B, C classes listed unless otherwise specified.
- 5. All still exhibits are to be entered 9:00am-12:00pm Saturday, August 6 (including Livestock Notebooks and posters) in the Youth Exhibit Area.
- 6. Exhibits judged incomplete will not receive ribbons
- 7. Only members earning a blue ribbon will be eligible for a purple (outstanding) ribbon or a lavender (meritorious) ribbon.
- 8. All animals exhibited must comply with all State Health Regulations, including the Michigan Department of Agriculture, as set forth in the general regulation section.
- 9. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to check all animal entries in with the appropriate Fair Superintendents.
- 10. Any deviation from the check-in and check-out schedule needs to be approved by the appropriate Fair Superintendent.
- 11. 4-H sponsored trophies and awards are available to 4-H members only. All winners of 4-H awards, trophies, and members selling livestock must turn in completed "Thank You" notes to their appropriate superintendent on Saturday of the Fair.
- 12. 4-H Champion and Reserve Champion market animals must sell through the Kalamazoo County 4-H Livestock Auction and do not count toward the total of four sales that the youth are allowed to sell at the 4-H Livestock Auction.
- 14. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion carcass animals must be sold through the Kalamazoo County 4-H Livestock Auction. They must remain at Pease Packing, to complete the processing procedure, in order to be sold through the Kalamazoo County 4-H Livestock Auction.
- 15. Exhibitors are responsible for the proper care of their animals until it is removed from the fairground premises, following the close of the fair.
- 16. The Kalamazoo County Youth Fair prohibits market livestock animals from entering the Kalamazoo County Youth Fair if the exhibitor has entered the same individual animals at any other fair during the same calendar year. If an exhibitor violates this rule, the exhibitor will be prohibited from participating in the Kalamazoo County Youth Fair the following year.

#### **Emergency Medical Procedure**

A First Aid Station with State licensed emergency personnel will be available during scheduled times on the fairgrounds to evaluate any injury or illness as needed and to offer recommendation for treatment. In case of an emergency, you must follow these three steps:

- 1. Call 911
- 2. Call/contact 4-H Program Coordinator(s) and the Fair Coordinator.
- 3. Complete an MSU injury report within one hour, turn in completed form to the 4-H Program Coordinator immediately.

#### **Livestock Exhibitor Rules**

- 1. Exhibitors may enter the number of animals as specified in the respective sections or classes; no more than one herd, flock, or pen in any one class, unless stated otherwise in the Department Rules.
- 2. Livestock exhibitors are required to keep their exhibit areas neat and clean. Failure to do so could result in livestock being sent home and exclusion from selling in the 4-H Livestock Auction. All stalls must be cleaned before leaving at the conclusion of the Kalamazoo County Youth Fair.
- Animals cannot be entered in more than one class except for group classes. (Exception: See Youth Division-General Rules.)
- 4. A person who discovers, suspects, or has reason to believe that an animal is either affected by a reportable disease or contaminated with a toxic substance shall immediately report that fact, suspicion, or belief to the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (daytime phone number is 1-800-292-3939, after hours is 1-517-373-0440).
- 5. ANY ANIMAL ENTERED IN ANY CLASS AT THE FAIR MAY BE SUBJECTED TO DRUG TESTING at the discretion of the Fair Council, Livestock Superintendent, and/or judge. The Fair's veterinarian/authorized representative may collect urine, blood, hair, tissue, and/or other test samples as needed. Disqualification will result in voiding of the placing(s) of the animal(s) in question, forfeiture of any and all ribbons/trophies/special awards earned with the animal(s), voiding of the sale(s) if the animal(s) has already been sold in the 4-H market livestock sale and disbarment of the exhibitor from exhibiting in open or 4-H classes at the Kalamazoo County Youth Fair for a period of three years. Other animals will not be moved up in placing.

<sup>\*\*</sup>The cost of testing will be absorbed by the fair council unless the test produces a "positive result". The cost will then be paid by the owner and/or exhibitor.

Though the live animal shown must be the same species, it is not required to be the same class.

All carcass participants are required to take the written/oral educational evaluation portion for their respective species on Wednesday, August 3, 2022.

Goats are to be free of horns except where a registered goat's breed standards specify otherwise; scurs must be less than 2 inches. If a market goat's scurs exceed 2 inches you must check with the Superintendent before unloading your animal for show. No bucks will be allowed. Animals will be health checked before being allowed into the show area.

In compliance with the Michigan Department of Agriculture & Rural Development, all goats must be identified with official USDA scrapie program identification tag. The Kalamazoo County Youth Fair does not allow for microchips as sole identification. www.michigan.gov/-/media/Project/Websites/mdard/documents/animals/exhibitions/2022\_fairs\_and\_exhibitions\_requirements.pdf

The exhibitor must be on hand to show his/her goat. All goats must be legally owned or properly leased by the exhibitor and have been in his/her possession by May 1 and tagged or tattooed by May preceding the Fair. Kids born on the exhibitor's property after May 1, must be tagged or tattooed prior to fair check-in. Animals will be shown in the breed class which they most closely resemble. First-eighth place ribbons will be awarded.

All 4-H Goat Project youth exhibitors must enter the appropriate showmanship class for their age group. A goat science/educational exhibit is required for all first and second year youth, 8-19 years old. A goat science/educational exhibit is required for all first and second year youth 5-7 years old. A market journal is required for all youth entering a market goat or a goat carcass and a rate of gain journal is required for Rate of Gain Entries. ALL YOUTH ARE STRONGLY ENCOURAGED TO ENTER AT LEAST ONE SCIENCE/EDUCATIONAL EXHIBIT EVERY YEAR. Cloverbuds (5-7 years old by January 1 of the current year) will participate in non-competitive classes and may not sell their animal at auction. For complete details see Department 90, Cloverbuds, Section B, Class 7080 - 7089.

#### **Section C - Market Goats**

A "pen of market goats" consists of two goats that cannot be used as any individual market goat entry or part of another pen entry. Members who DO NOT wish to sell their animals MUST notify the superintendents PRIOR to the time of judging. Minimum weight for a market goat is 45 lbs. Goats not meeting this requirement will not be eligible to participate in the Kalamazoo County 4-H Livestock Auction. Market goats are to be 8 months old and younger. Champion and Reserve Champion must be sold through the Livestock Auction.

This project is open to all swine project exhibitors except Cloverbuds. Exhibitors may enter one hog. Carcass judging takes place on two days: attendance is mandatory on both Monday, August 1, 2022 at 6:00pm, and Wednesday, August 3, 2022 at 10:00am, in order to be considered for placing. The events on both days will take place at Pease Packing.

Animals entered in the carcass class are not required to be clipped or trained, but hogs must be free of mud. Any identification required for market hog projects is required for carcass entries. No day of show entries will be allowed.

Only the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion in each carcass class will be sold in the auction. Processing costs of other entries will be the responsibility of the exhibitor. Carcass cut sheets must be turned in or be on file at Pease Packing by Monday August 1, or the animals will not be unloaded. The Grand Champion and Reserve Champion carcasses will remain at Pease Packing until after their purchase at the auction.

All 4-H participants in this carcass class must also show at least one live animal in same species at the current year's fair. Exceptions to this rule of showing a live animal at the fair may be made for those exhibitors whose animals may cause safety problems at the fair, provided the exhibitor has met the carcass attendance requirements. Exhibitors must consult with and get approval for exceptions from both the live animal and carcass superintendents a week prior to the carcass contest.

All carcass participants are required to take the written/oral educational evaluation portion for their respective species on Wednesday, August 3, 2022.

Swine exhibitors must be 8 years of age by January 1 of the current year, who exhibited in the swine project at the previous Kalamazoo County Fair may be eligible to exhibit up to 4 individual market animals if space is available. Space will be determined by the superintendent and a lottery system will be used to decide which exhibitors may exhibit four market animals. This will be determined in July after the fair enrollment is complete. Please consider this when purchasing pigs in the spring. Quality assurance program requirements (YQCA) must be completed annually by every swine exhibitor.

The Kalamazoo County Fair swine department is a terminal show/sale. All swine entered are required to be slaughtered at Pease Packing or transferred to a resale facility approved by the Kalamazoo County Fair Council and Kalamazoo County 4-H Livestock Association. The Kalamazoo County Livestock Association will exclusively transport all swine entries at the conclusion of the fair to Pease Packing and the market facilities. After slaughter, processing can be completed per the choice of the buyer. The Kalamazoo County Fair may choose to ship swine to the predetermined locations on any date/time during the fair for public or animal health/safety reasons.

Each project animal exhibited must be in the possession of the exhibitor by May 1 of the current year. Each exhibitor may identify up to five (5) project animals. Each project animal identification must be on record with the swine superintendent or at the 4-H Office no later than May 31st. Tagging must be completed by May 31st. Animals may be market barrows or gilts. Gilts may be shown provided they are sold in the livestock sale. Any market hogs weighing less than 200 lbs. are ineligible to be shown and will be sold at the auction as roasters. Roaster auction sales are not eligible for resale. Shipment of all pigs will be handled exclusively by the Kalamazoo County 4-H Livestock Association. First-tenth place ribbons will be given. Two market animals count as one sale. All market hogs that come to the Kalamazoo County Fair must have been given the Swine Influenza vaccine plus booster prior to July 15th. Swine that have been fed Ractopamine (Paylean, Explode, XXL, etc) will NOT be allowed at the fair. Each exhibitor must verify their pigs have not been fed Ractopamine.

Exhibitors are required to sign up for a 2-hour barn duty shift during the mandatory meeting prior to the fair. Exhibitors who do not sign up by the end of weigh-in on Tuesday morning will be assigned a time. Barn duty will be from 10am-6pm Tuesday through Saturday of fair. Exhibitors also need to help clean-up the barn after the livestock auction on Friday. Each club that is represented in the swine barn will be assigned a night to bring shavings in from the trailer to the swine barn.

Barn tear-down will take place the Saturday night following the fair after all pigs are removed. Nothing may be removed from the barn prior to all swine being loaded out unless approved by the superintendent. All exhibitors or a household member must be present and stay until the barn is packed-up. If this does not take place, a fee of 10% of the 4-H participant's swine sale check will be taken out. This fee will be put into the 4-H swine project's account. All exhibitors or household members must check in and out with the swine superintendent. If you cannot tear down for religious reasons, you need to be excused by the superintendent by the last swine project meeting before the fair. They will give you an alternate assignment.

#### **Section B - Market Hogs**

Market hogs will be weighed on Tuesday from 9:00AM - 10:30AM to determine weight classes for judging and official weight for the 4-H Livestock Auction. Pigs must be clean for weigh-in. Muddy pigs will not be accepted. Market Hogs will be divided into weight classes for gilts and barrows except for hogs weighing less than 200 lbs.

All birds except waterfowl must have Pullorum testing before entering the show area. One entry per class is allowed. A mandatory pen fee of \$1.00 per show chicken, \$5 per market chicken pen, \$4.00 per turkey, and \$6.00 per waterfowl pen will be collected on check-in day to cover the cost of shavings and supplies. Heritage turkeys are sourced and purchased by the exhibitor. Youth exhibiting market birds must also do a market journal that will be turned on Still Project Day in the Youth Exhibit area. Breed rabbits must be in the exhibitor's possession by June 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year. Market rabbits must be in the exhibitor's possession at least 4 weeks prior to the fair.

The Fit & Show breed rabbit check in and Market rabbit check in are mandatory for all exhibitors to be able to participate in showing their rabbits during the fair. Each rabbit may only be shown in one class with the exception of Section E, Progeny.

All rabbits must be legibly and permanently tattooed in their left ear. Those showing signs of disease, sickness or ear/fur mites will be turned away at check in. 5-7 year olds (by January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year) will participate in non-competitive classes. See Department 90, Cloverbuds, Section B, classes 7110-7115. 5-7 year olds are not eligible to sell their animals in the 4-H Livestock Auction.

All youth must follow the same rules as the 4-H and the F.F.A.. Youth who plan to show in this division must be enrolled with the County Superintendent in addition to the Kalamazoo County MSU Extension 4-H Department by November 1<sup>st</sup> if they are a returning member and by April 1<sup>st</sup> if they are a new member. Project animals must be identified by May 1<sup>st</sup> along with up to 2 additional "back-up" animals, if available. Age of youth is as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year.

All horses and ponies must be vet-checked at the Lamont Street entrance and have proof of a negative Coggins test before entering the fairgrounds. Classes may be combined, or split, if necessary. 4-H Horse Leaders sponsor Championship trophies and thank-you notes should be addressed to them at c/o MSU Extension. First-tenth place ribbons will be given. Project rules are listed at www.canr.msu.edu/Kalamazoo4H.

Release time: If horse is removed from Fair before stated release time, rider will forfeit 4-H Special and State Horse Show Points. State 4-H Horse Show horses are exempt if going to State 4-H Show.

Showmanship is a mandatory class for all Kalamazoo County Youth Horse Project exhibitors. Exhibitors must choose between either English or Western for each of these 2 classes. In addition, youth must choose between English and Western disciplines for Trail, and between English riding pattern and Western riding patterns. Those entering a Novice class may only take novice classes (Equitation, Pleasure, Basic Riding and Trail).

Horse Leader approval is required for Buckaroo events. Cloverbuds (aka Buckaroo) must be 5-7 years of age as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year and sign up under the Cloverbud Section. Cloverbuds will participate in non-competitive classes, sharing a horse with another 4-H Horse Project member. Ages 8-19 participate as full members in the horse project with leader approval. Leader discretion for level of participation with animals occurs for all members.

Kalamazoo County Horse Leaders require approved headgear in all of the Gymkhana events as well as English classes, both flat and jumping and all bareback classes

The Top Showman will be chosen from the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> place winning 4-H members of the two Fitting and Showing Championship classes. All other horse class entry forms for the Kalamazoo County 4-H members are available from your Project Leaders.
