

We are excited to be back on MSU's campus this June for Exploration Days!

Registration is open and is being done on a first come first served basis. The session listing has been posted on the website (under Participant Information). This is a great resource for families and youth serving organizations who might send youth. Please consider sharing the Exploration Days Facebook page post on your social media platforms for youth who may not 4-H members.

Key points on sessions:

- Sessions have different age requirements or are more advanced. Some sessions are duplicated (asterisks next to session title) and so youth can choose which time slot they want to attend that topic. It is important that youth consider those two items when making choices.
- There are also different maximum number of participants. While those maximums are not listed on the document, participants may want to have 2nd, 3rd and 4th choice in case a session they have interest in becomes full. If you register and it says "waitlisted" please e-mail Veronica at Bolhuisv@msu.edu with at least 3 other choices.
- Some sessions also have other considerations such as downloading an app or wearing long-sleeves or closed toed shoes. Reminders to youth will be sent through the registration system to those enrolled in those sessions, however, it is good to note that when looking at sessions, too.
- This is a great opportunity for youth to try something new! Michigan 4-H Exploration Days is an opportunity to gain new skills and perhaps challenge the comfort zone. This is a wonderful opportunity for youth to attend sessions that might help them experience a career path that might interest them or grow in their personal development.
- When registering pay only the \$50.00 deposit, balance will be due in May.
- The registration number is 1000 youth participants with volunteers, staff and other adults making up the remaining registration numbers, bringing us to the estimated total of 1500 total attendees on campus. There will be a waiting list for youth.

- 10% goes back to National 4-H Council.



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
Here is what you need to know:

Each county will need to identify 1 chaperone for every 8 youth per gender identity.

Counties will also need to also identify one person of each gender identity to be the Lead Chaperone.

This will be the person responsible for picking up county packets for check-in, turning in nightly bed checks, turning in county check-out paperwork, and serving as the main point of contact for the county.

<u>Dear 4-H poultry participants and</u> volunteers:

Avian Influenza (Bird Flu)

Since February 24, the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Veterinary Services Laboratories have confirmed the discovery of five positive cases of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) in Michigan. These include non-commercial flocks in Kalamazoo County, Livingston County, Macomb County and Menominee County, as well as domestic parrots at a residence in Washtenaw County. All five are believed to be isolated cases. HPAI has also been identified by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources in wild birds in Macomb, Monroe and St. Clair counties.

MSU Extension and its state partners are continuing to monitor the situation. <u>At this point, there has been no ban on poultry shows, exhibitions and swap meets in Michigan.</u> However, the increasing number of HPAI cases serve as an important reminder that poultry owners and caretakers should follow critical biosecurity measures to defend their birds and flocks.

Good biosecurity measures are especially vital to 4-H families bringing home new poultry projects or introducing new birds to their existing flocks this spring season. MSU Extension <u>encourages all livestock owners</u> to <u>quarantine animals</u> that are new to the facility or have traveled off property. This will reduce the risk of exposing the home herd or flock to any virus or diseases they may have contracted while away from home. In addition, MDARD recommends the following biosecurity measures to all bird caretakers and owners:

- Preventing contact between domestic poultry and wild birds by bringing poultry indoors to a barn/coop or ensuring their outdoor area is fully enclosed.
- Washing your hands before and after handling birds and/or their eggs as well as when moving between different coops.
- Disinfecting boots and other gear when moving between coops.
- Not sharing equipment or other supplies between coops or other farms.
- Cleaning and disinfecting equipment and other supplies between uses. If it cannot be disinfected, discard it.
- Using well or municipal water as drinking water for birds.
- Keeping poultry feed secure so there is no contact between the feed/feed ingredients and wild birds or rodents.
- Don't touch birds to your face.
- Keeping poultry away from areas where food or drink is prepared, served, or stored.
- Monitoring flock for unusual deaths, a drop in egg production, a significant decrease in water consumption, or an increase in sick birds.

If avian influenza is **suspected**, contact MDARD **immediately** at 800-292-3939 (daytime) or 517-373-0440 (after-hours).

MDARD also recommends remaining outdoors when cleaning any equipment associated with raising or caring for poultry, such as cages, feed, water containers and other materials. Then, store the cleaned equipment in an area where it cannot be accessed by wild birds or rodents before its next use.

To stay up-to-date with MDARD updates and alerts regarding the status of avian influenza in Michigan, 4-H families can subscribe to receive notifications from MDARD. Visit MDARD's website and click on the "Avian Influenza" link to enter a valid email address to receive notifications whenever there are new developments to report.

As a reminder, HPAI <u>does not present an immediate public health concern</u> and properly handled and cooked poultry products <u>remain safe to consume</u>. For additional information regarding HPAI, visit MSU Extension's avian influenza website.

Michigan 4-H Foundation opens 2022-23 grant cycle

Awarded annually, the Michigan 4-H Foundation recently opened their grant and award opportunities for the 2022-2023 season. Open to 4-H volunteer leaders, members and staff, the grants and awards support local 4-H clubs and county programs, as well as recognize members of the 4-H community. All applications are due Iune 1.

Opportunities include:

- ° Michigan 4-H Legacy Grants of \$1,000. These grants are awarded to support development of a new program or initiative or to strengthen, enhance or expand a current program that is making a difference.
- ° 4-H On-Target Grants of \$500. These grants support 4-H Shooting Sports programs to enhance existing programs, develop a new program or offer a special experience related to 4-H Shooting Sports.
- ° The Collins 4-H Youth Horticulture Grant of \$500. This grant is available only to 4-H youth clubs and supports advancement of club work in plant science and horticulture activities.
- ° 4-H Educational Garden Grants of \$1,000. These grants support the creation of local 4-H educational gardens in Michigan.
- ° Michigan Farm Bureau 4-H Excellence in Agriculture Award (includes \$1,000 grant). This award recognizes outstanding 4-H agricultural volunteers that have exhibited excellence in 4-H youth education and leadership development.

Tips for purchasing and bringing home livestock

Acquiring new stock is exciting whether you are building your herd or flock, or purchasing your annual 4-H project. These tips will help you manage their health and safety by making sure you know the questions to ask before purchasing and the preparations required to bring livestock home.

Assessing Animal Health and Treatment Documentation

When purchasing animals, you should know their history. Ask the following questions:

- ° When was the animal born?
- ° What specific vaccinations has the animal been given and when were they given?
- ° If necessary, was the animal properly castrated and what method was used?
- o Have any other treatments been administered to the animal? If so, what is the slaughter withdrawal for the drugs given?
- ° Have any of the animals on the farm been ill or shown symptoms of illness?
- ° If acquiring a market animal, what is the approximate weight?

Considerations as You Bring Animals Home

Transporting. Secure a trailer. If you do not own a trailer, make arrangements with someone who can transport animals for you. Be prepared to pay someone to provide transportation, as a courtesy.

Unloading. Make sure that your facility is ready to house your new animals before they arrive. Have a pen identified for new animals to go into with fresh water and appropriate feed. (Feed should be similar to their previous diet; changing to a new diet should be done over a period of time.) Have a clear and direct path to the animals' new pen from the trailer. Make sure that all gates are open or closed, as appropriate, and secured.

Settling in. Quarantine, or separate, new animals for a minimum of 21 days. At minimum, try to avoid nose-to-nose contact, and comingling feeding and watering. Minimize stress on new animals during the quarantine period. If after 21 days, the newly acquired animals have not shown any symptoms of illness, it should be safe to comingle them into your existing herd or flock.

Comingling. Since each species has a social hierarchy, observe animals during comingling and separate if there is risk of injury. Over the course of a day, the herd or flock should settle into a routine that includes the new animals.
