To receive this award, a member should demonstrate a strong character; a concern for the rights and welfare of others; an appreciation of diversity; an understanding of the way government and community organizations work; service to their communities to address problems and help others; the skills, knowledge, and commitment to influence decision making and public policy; an awareness and understanding of public issues, how they are connected across local, national, and global levels, and how one affects and is affected by them. Examples: be a teen member on the county 4-H Council, attend Capitol Experience, Citizenship Washington Focus, national 4-H Congress and develop projects that put their knowledge into action.
