Fourteen Area Youth Earned Their 4-H Tractor Safety Certificates





Our 14 youth all successfully passed their tractor safety driving and written tests earlier in June, after taking part in our in-person offering of the course. Three class sessions focused on the Purdue Extension Gearing Up for Safety curriculum were held on Sunday afternoons, taught by our lead instructor Mark Miezio, and assisted by 4-H volunteer/instructor, Clint Warren, on the driving day, and then all of the youth signed up for testing slots out at the Northwest Michigan Horticulture Research Center here in Leelanau County. All of the teens were offered the chance to hop on a tractor on all of the days prior to the testing day, to get some practice in, and everyone also got the chance to look at a tractor up close to see how it worked, what to do to safely start and stop it, and so on. The test day was a mild and beautiful day in June, and I spent much of the time being extremely impressed with these 14- and 15-year-old youth and their willingness to learn new skills and demonstrate what they have learned. A few of the teens had never been on a tractor before, but they did so well! And, this course would not be a success without the use of the Horticulture Research Center—they lent us two John Deere tractors, equipment, and the use of their beautiful meeting room for our class meetings and written test time. This is a great partnership that we have had for a very long time. Thank you again to Mark and Clint for their excellent teaching!






Make Our Way Started Up a D&D/Orienteering Session in June




















It's Almost Time for Fair 2023!

Reminders.....

Tanner Building **4-H Independent Judged Projects** are due (online) with the fair's new registration system by July 14th! We have several more sub-classes that you can register your projects under. An exhibitor may display more than one entry per class. Please note the new sub-classes for this year. Example: Class 7: Expressive Arts Subclass a: Photography. Be sure to fill out and turn in the online NWMF registration form for your projects (page 75) at the online link given in the Fair Premium Book! Due July 14th! Exhibitors must attach their entry tag(s) from the fair office to each project if they are to be judged. Each class (and subclasses) will have four age groups to be judged, at four different booths in the barn: cloverbud (ages 5-7) will not be judged--they will receive a cloverbud ribbon and feedback, youth ages 8-11, youth ages 12-15, and youth ages 16-19. 4-H project entries are to be the work of the exhibitor and current year project (September 1st, 2022 until the start of fair.) The classes are listed on pages 67-68 in the Fair Premium Book. 4-H projects will be judged on Saturday from 2-6 **pm**. Items may be put in club booth displays after they are judged, or they may be left in the booths throughout the week of fair. Ribbons for 1st, 2nd, 3rd place will be awarded for each subclass, for each age group.

If your club is putting up a club **booth display**: Set up will be Thursday & Friday August 3rd & 4th from noon to 9 pm and Saturday, August 5th from 9:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

*ALL displays and independent projects need to be completed and in place by 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, August 5th.

The **4-H Clover Award** applications are due Wednesday, August 2nd to either the Grand Traverse 4-H office or the Leelanau 4-H office. For all youth ages 10+. The top three candidates will be interviewed the Monday of Fair for the chance to win the award (including a large ribbon, certificate, and \$100 VISA card.) These candidates will be contacted by 4-H staff prior to Monday to arrange an interview appointment.

4-H Interview and Demonstrations in the Tanner: 4-H Interviews are available for any 4-H members interested, including cloverbuds. 4-H Exhibit interviews will be held on Monday from 11 am – 3 pm in the Tanner Building. Ribbons for 1st, 2nd, 3rd place will be awarded for interviews in the following age groups: 8-11, 12-15,16-19. Cloverbuds (ages 5-7) are encouraged to participate in the interviews, and will receive participation ribbons. Demonstrations must be no longer than 15 minutes in length.

Cloverbud Activities: Cloverbud activities will be held again this year in the Tanner Building Monday-Friday from 10-11 am and again from 2-4 pm. Join 4-H youth leaders and volunteers with youth ages 5-7 to make and take crafts. Our Cloverbud Games will be under the DA Tent on Saturday the 12th at 4:00 pm! Join the Michigan State Fair 4-H & Youth Virtual Showcase!

MSU Extension is thrilled to partner again in 2023 with the Michigan State Fair on an exciting program for Michigan youth: the Michigan State Fair 4-H & Youth Virtual Showcase. This statewide showcase provides a virtual platform for youth across Michigan to exhibit their work in all project areas and apply for up to \$10,000 in scholarships. Any Michigan youth ages 5-19 is encouraged to participate; 4-H membership is not required.

Registration for this event is now open! The diverse array of <u>classes</u> celebrate all the projects and programs in which youth have developed skill and mastery. This includes livestock and animal showmanship classes, as well as still exhibits, educational projects and more.



There is no cost to participate and youth may engage in as many classes as they wish by <u>submitting project photos and videos</u>. Be sure to submit your entries by the registration deadline of August 1. Project evaluation will occur before the start of the Michigan State Fair so that winners can be announced at the event which occurs August 31 – September 4.

In addition to the opportunity to showcase their skills, recognize their accomplishments and receive constructive feedback for growth and development, participants in the Michigan State Fair 4-H & Youth Virtual Showcase will also have the opportunity to apply for \$10,000 in scholarships. Going home: Biosecurity tips for animals that went to the county fair

<u>Michigan State University Extension</u> offers these biosecurity steps exhibitors can take to protect their show animals and those that were left at home after the fair has ended.

- Keep animals that were at the fair separate from animals that were not for 28 30 days. If at all possible, do not allow nose-to-nose contact and provide as much distance between animals.
- Disinfect all buckets, feeders, tools and footwear that was at the fair.
- Throw away any feed or hay that was at the fair.
- Always wear clean clothes and footwear. Boot coverings may be helpful when caring for animals.
- Take care of animals that stayed home from the show first, and animals that were at the show second. Do not go back and forth between animals as this increases the risk of cross-contamination.
- Do not eat or drink in the barn.
- Observe animals daily for signs and symptoms of illness, such as:
 - Obvious pain or discomfort
 - Decrease in appetite and water intake
 - Fever
 - Lethargy
 - · Diarrhea or changes in consistency in manure
 - Discharge from nasal cavity or eyes
 - Overall weakness

Care of animals after the fair is just as critical as their before-fair care. Exhibited animals were exposed to new animal populations and fair goers, and most likely experienced a lot of stress during their time away from the farm. By practicing these biosecurity steps, you can help keep all of your animals safe and healthy.
