Four of the Grant family's calves were asked to be part of the inaugural "Vows with the Cows" event, with several couples renewing their vows with calm animals standing nearby.



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







Youth Association: In Need of More Youth Members!

A Guest Article about Traveling to Japan with States' 4-H International Exchange

This summer, I spent four weeks out of the country, the furthest I have ever been from home, and the longest too. As anyone would be at the ripe age of fifteen, I was exceedingly nervous about the experience. Not that I had any reason to be. It was catered amazingly towards making the kids comfortable. For that, I thank 4-H and their partner organizations, LABO, and Lex. It was an amazing experience from start to finish, and I will share some of it.

When the delegates leave their homes, they fly to a gateway city. Mine was Seattle, where I was met with chaperones and fellow delegates immediately once on the ground. From there, we flew to Tokyo on a long flight, my first over an ocean. We landed in Tokyo a day later and at 2:00 in the afternoon. There is a thirteen-hour time difference between the Island of Japan and my home here in northwestern Michigan. After going through a couple of orientations overseas, we packed up and headed out to meet our host family. For me, that meant boarding a Bullet Train or Shinkansen and riding two hours to a city named Hamamatsu in the same prefecture where Mt. Fuji resides. When the train's doors opened, I was met with the smiling faces of my host family who gifted me with a hand-fan that had my name and a drawing of Mt. Fuji. This was the start of one of the most memorable and joyful experiences of my life.

Some of you may be wondering what I did while I was there. My response to that is, "Where do I even begin?" I did a range of things from having a demo of a private school (four days) to visiting one of the four biggest castles in the country. The other time was filled with swimming in waterfall basins and mountain biking. Most of the time I spent with my family which enabled me to have this good of a time overseas. My host uncle, despite not being directly part of the immediate family, did many things with me to improve my time. He happened to be a Japanese teacher at the school I went to and led the school's rock climbing club which he had me take part in. He also took me to places such as the castle and an Olympic-level cycling center. We spent many nights eating as a family in a variety of different places. The food in Japan is very different as you can imagine. It generally is healthier and consumed in larger quantities due to that fact. My host brother (who is 13 years old) ate an entire pizza and two desserts, and it was normal! It was difficult for me to keep up but the food was delicious.

I would also attend LABO parties, essentially the club meetings for LABO. LABO is an international youth programming/education organization similar to 4-H. 4-H tends to stay in the US and has distinct clubs and programs, but LABO is broken into small groups that are taught through fun activities such as books, skits, and songs. A lot of it is focused on the English language and eventually their exchange programs. I would introduce myself at these parties and explain a little about where I come from and what I do as an American. Along with my little introductions, I would answer questions from the youth and join them in their fun activities. Everyone in Japan was very welcoming so I soon became comfortable with public speaking. While there, I began to stop stressing over things that were coming up and instead took them in stride. I was certainly not the only one who felt more confident after the trip due to this.

Throughout the month, I did many memorable things. I want to talk about a few more. One such was visiting a flight museum at the active air base in Hamamatsu. There, my host brother joined me in piloting a full-flight simulator built into one of the actual fighter planes. We also went to a safari park at the base of Mt. Fuji where we were able to see hundreds of creatures of all shapes and sizes. Some of these included lions, bears, and my favorite, capybaras. We were able to drive through their enclosures and see them come right over to the cars. We also attended LABO camp in Kurohime, a mountain area, where the Americans and Japanese mixed. There were around 400 youths at the camp including around 10 Americans. We all put on a show of Boom Chicka Boom at the final night campfire and had a lot of fun with new friends. We also visited a cave one day and were able to see bats inside. Along with this, I did a lot of shopping, going for walks around my city, and trying to play sports when I could (one day I was able to play an hour of ping-pong).

I would highly recommend anyone who is interested in this program to seek out your local 4-H Program Coordinator and speak to them about attending or if you have questions. There are many more opportunities than just 4-weeks in Japan. There are also 8-week programs and other countries available. The staff are amazing as are the host families. Due to this program, I feel as if I have grown up a little and become a little more confident. - Be a lawful resident or citizen of the United States.

Leelanau Shooting Sports Are On Target!

Our NW MI 4-H Shooting Sports Club met regularly out at Myles Kimmerly this fall, and the 24 youth members, along with 4-H leaders Stephanie Steffens and Shelly Roots, were right on target! The two sessions met every Wednesday, and celebrated their final night with balloon and pinata targets, candy treats, 4-H giveaways, and getting their 4-H archery club t-shirts! This is a fantastic partnership with our county's Parks and Recreation Committee, as we use the old 4-H horse park space for this outdoor club, free of charge.

Our 4-H shooting sports archery leader Joe Blondia is continuing another year with our other archery club in Leelanau held at the Leelanau School: Thunderbirds on Target! The 17 members (many of them new to 4-H this year) in the club are all high school students, and chose to take part in this club as an "outdoor arts" experience, combining such experiences as hiking, fly-cast fishing, decoy-painting, and archery. Usually, the group has archery in the winter months, using their Leelanau 4-H archery backdrop curtain, their targets, and new archery equipment. Leelanau 4-H is working with Mr. Blondia to build the club up and support its other pursuits—fishing is the current focus for help with funding and supplies.

We are also working with a couple of new archery volunteers, Allison Marion and her daughter, Luella Marion, who is a 4-H teen leader. They just completed the archery certification training with MSU Extension, and can now start to plan their spring session of archery. We are very excited to support their club this coming year!









4-H Grows Here at our Five School Farm Markets!

We had an amazing school farm market season this fall, with five markets: Leland Public School, Glen Lake Community School, Suttons Bay Public School, St. Mary School, and Northport Public School. Many of our Leelanau County 4-H youth were able to take part in them, and even help with their club animals! MSU Extension/Leelanau 4-H partnered with Northwest Educational Services, the Northwest Michigan Horticulture Center, farm market vendors, and our five schools to hold these markets, some outdoors and some indoors (depending on the weather). We had two smoothie bikes, fresh farm produce tasting, a cider press with free apples, free 4-H giveaways and a petting zoo, STEM trivia games with prizes using our Apple iPads and the plinko game, and more!
