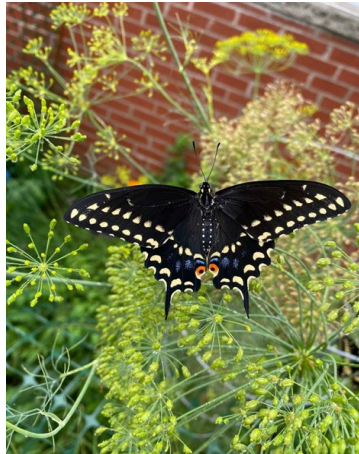

I would like to express my heartfelt gratitude to you for presenting the Preservation Equipment Road Show at Tecumseh District Library (TDL) on Thursday (January 19th) evening. During your thought-provoking lecture, I learned that water bath canning is an inexpensive way to can high-acid foods, and all vegetables, meats, poultry and soups must be pressure canned in order to avoid Botulism. I also discovered that*

the dial gauge for your pressure canner should be checked annually, and if you drop it, you should have it tested.

It was an honor for TDL to partner with MSU Extension for this life-enriching learning opportunity. Thank you for sharing your passion for food preservation with the residents of Tecumseh and the surrounding townships this winter.

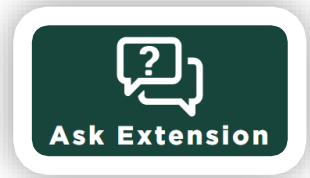
