Program Highlights

SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL HEALTH PROGRAMMING:

MSU Extension Health Educator, Tracie Abram, continues to provide **RELAX** and **Stress Less with Mindfulness** programming series to help participants improve stress management, problem solving attention and focus. Residents of Delta, Schoolcraft, Luce, Mackinac, Chippewa, Alger and Marquette Counties have had opportunities to participate in these program series. Abram has offered these series as community-based programming as well as to students in high school health classes, seniors and recently in 2020, at the Delta County Jail. Tracie has also provided work-site wellness programming or one-time presentations in 2019 to Community Action Agencies, Great Lake Industries, Girl Scouts, Senior Centers, and 4-H and Civic Groups. Seniors or adults aged 55+ can participate in **Stress Less with Mindfulness** for free due to grant. RELAX costs \$25 for the five-session series. Life of the Straits:

Offered for a second time Life of the Straits is a full day program taking place on Mackinac Island during the month of September in partnership with Michigan Sea Grant. The goal of this program is to bring education to families about an area that they call home. Families who attended this past year were provided tickets to the island, a morning snack, lunch, and admission to The Original Butterfly House. Pollinator education as well as education about the history of Mackinac Island were the educational points this year. The Mackinac Island Original Butterfly House provided a tour, 4-H Program Coordinators Leigh Ann Theunick and Kaelie Fessler lead monarch butterfly tagging, Elliot Nelson lead a age graph study, and Susan Kirkman gave a walking tour of the island cemeteries.
