

D.	Accuracy, neatness and general appearance	10%







WHAT DOES YOUR HOG NEED?

(have an adult help you read the following & then circle those that your hog needs below)

All living creatures have certain needs in order to live such as; food, water and shelter which the farmer, and you, help to provide. Your swine needs you to supply it with the proper nutrients on a regular schedule to allow it to grow fast, and efficiently in a short time. Feedstuff usually includes; corn, soybean oil meal, vitamins & minerals. Water is the most important nutrient of them all. Your hog also needs housing and a pen. Housing should not allow water to run into it and should allow hogs shade during sunny days and warmth during cold periods. If your hog is not fed correctly and does not have proper shelter it may become sick. If this were to happen you may have to call a veterinarian to help it get well.
