# 4-H Fresh Guacamole!



## **Ingredients**

- Two avocados
- One small Roma tomato
  - Garlic salt
  - One lime
  - Pinch of sugar
- 1. Make sure you cut the avocado all the way around the center, starting at the stem and circling until you reach the stem on the other side. Then, twist softly and pry apart.
- 2. Remove the pit and then slice the avocado vertically, horizontally then scoop it out and into a bowl.
- 3. Add the diced tomato, garlic salt, fresh juice from half a lime and a pinch of sugar.
- 4. Mash the ingredients together then, grab some chips, and dig in!



#### **OGEMAW COUNTY 4-H AT THE FAIR**

"The most important attitude that can be formed is that of desire to go on learning." – John Dewey

In Ogemaw County, more than 125 youth participated in a livestock club in the 2021-22 4-H season. From small animals to steers, youth took on a variety of project animals – some even took on more than one! Many of them will be showing and/or marketing at the upcoming 2022 Ogemaw County Fair!

When it comes to 4-H livestock projects, many only get see the final project – the show, the auction, and the ceremony at the fair. What we don't always see is the hard work in the barn, the passion in the early morning chores, and the learning of life skills and new techniques that has culminated in these precious moments in the ring. Through their 4-H projects, youth are contributing to their local food production, learning about farm management, animal husbandry, and leadership. Not only are the youth learning these livestock-specific skills, they are also learning crucial life skills – including problem solving, planning, communication, resiliency, and goal-setting. I want to extend a special thank you to the caring adults in our community – our 4-H volunteers, our parents and guardians, and our local leaders for their support of these youth in their projects. We couldn't do what we do without each and every one of you.

If words don't convince you of the value 4-H has in the lives of youth and their communities – try these numbers on for size! Let's say you have a 1300 lb. steer – after considering carcass weight and processing, you may be left with 580 lbs. of "take-home" beef. According to estimates by 4-H Canada, when you compare the cost of beef at the grocery store with the cost of a local 4-H steer, there is an average of \$1900 in savings when purchasing the 4-H animal. Not only do you feel the savings in your wallet, but you can also feel it in the smile of the youth you purchased the animal from, in the "thank you for your purchase" from the local meat processor and in the satisfaction you get from supporting your local community.

So, at the end of the day, you may ask yourself, what does buying an animal at the fair mean? It means that you are supporting a dream, a passion, a youth....and your community. Thank you, from the bottom of our hearts, for your support of the youth in the community – at the fair, and through the whole year!

## 2022 Michigan 4-H State Award winners announced



The Michigan 4-H State Awards Program recognized outstanding 4-H members during the opening session of 4-H Exploration Days on June 22. At the event, honorees had the opportunity to celebrate their accomplishments with their fellow 4-H Exploration Days participants.

A Michigan 4-H State Award is the highest honor bestowed on Michigan 4-H members and recognizes a level of excellence in learning, leadership and service. In total, 20 4-H members from 16 counties submitted applications to take part is this year's program.

"With tens of thousands of 4-H'ers across the state, the youth honored with 4-H State Awards are some of our most accomplished 4-H'ers," said Julie Chapin, 4-H state leader of Michigan 4-H and director of MSU Extension's children and youth programs. "Their commitment to bettering themselves

To qualify for the award, 4-H'ers must submit a written application that showcases the learning experiences, knowledge and skills they've acquired through their participation in 4-H, as well as their contributions to their local 4-H programs, clubs and communities. Submissions are reviewed by the Michigan 4-H State Awards selection committee. This group of volunteers, staff members and industry experts determine which members are selected as award finalists. All applicants receive written feedback from selection committees.

Senior delegates (ages 16-19) and groups then complete an interview using video conference technology. Completing a video interview provides an opportunity for 4-H members to practice real-world skills that are trending in the workforce.

In addition to a plaque, each 4-H State Award winner in the senior division will also receive a \$200 cash award; junior winners receive \$50 cash awards. These awards are made possible by generous donations to the Michigan 4-H Foundation.



# **BIOSECURITY TIPS FOR FAIR**

#### **FAIR & EVENT RESOURCES**



Protecting animal and human health is a main priority during Michigan fairs and exhibitions. With diseases such as avian influenza and swine influenza threatening animal and human populations in the past few years, it is imperative that tools and resources exist to support fair and exhibition planners in their efforts to protect both animal and human health. The website below serves as a primary information hub to assist in the planning for, responding to and recovery after a variety of animal health situations that may occur at a local fair or exhibition.

#### HOW YOU CAN REDUCE BIOSECURITY RISKS IN 4-H PROJECTS: WASH YOUR HANDS!

Animal barns at exhibits should have numerous hand and foot washing stations, instructions for proper washing of hands, and an appropriate animal population in the barn. Visitors to the barn should properly wash their hands upon entering the barn and then again upon exiting the barn in order to reduce the risk of spreading diseases from barn to barn. In addition to wearing separate clothes and shoes in animal areas, another everyday biosecurity practice is proper and frequent handwashing. Our hands have the ability to touch a million different surfaces in a variety of locations each day. Washing our hands properly with soap and water can help reduce the spread of pathogens from various locations to others, animals and ourselves.

Always remember to wash your hands before and immediately after handling your animals. If you have sick animals, remember to care for healthy animals first, wash your hands, and then care for any sick animals.

## **HOW YOU CAN REDUCE BIOSECURITY RISKS IN 4-H PROJECTS: CLEANING!**

An important biosecurity tip is regularly washing the equipment that you use within your facility. In this instance, equipment includes feeders, water tanks, buckets, feed pans, brushes, grooming stands or chutes, floor mats, trailers and many other specie specific items.

To clean your equipment, you can use an all-purpose sanitizer that is approved for use with animals, dish soap or bleach. For youth projects, it is strongly suggested to use dish soap because it is a safe and easy-to-use product.

When washing your equipment, it is important to remove all organic material from every surface of the item. Organic material could include manure, dirt, grass hair, and feed residue. Use a scrub brush to thoroughly scrub the item. When rinsing the item, make sure that the rinse water runs clear before you stop rinsing, to ensure that all of the remaining soap has been removed. Allow the item to dry completely before using.

- Creating opportunities for project coordination and hands-on learning


