Guidelines for Shooting Sports Education Classes

General Information

1) All Shooting Sports Education Projects are due no later than the last day of Shooting Sports competitions. Check the 4-H Fair Book for the correct dates and locations to drop off your projects. Entries can also be taken to the 4-H office before the last day of the competitions. NOTE: these competitions are held before the Fair.

2) Ribbons will be presented during Fair at the Shooting Sports Awards Ceremony. Check the 4-H Fair Book for the date and location. Best of Show ribbons will be awarded if applicable.

3) All projects must have a 4-H Project Report Form securely attached to their project.

4) <u>Division A</u> is open to all members of Sanilac County 4-H that are interested in Shooting Sports Education and Safety. You do not have to be currently enrolled in the project area. <u>Division B & C</u> is for members that are currently enrolled in the Sanilac County 4-H Shooting Sports project and working with a Certified Shooting Sports Instructor within their club.

5) Judging will consist of a team that may include Shooting Sports Superintendent, Shooting Sports Committee Members, Certified Instructors or other qualified individuals as deemed by the committee.

Division A Project Guidelines and Information

- All entries must demonstrate a focus on positive youth development
- Do not use copyrighted materials or characters.
- Good posters and displays focus on one main issue that will gain the attention of the viewer
- Be sure to add your resources to your Shooting Sports Project Record Form
- Video or power point presentations should be turned in on a CD/DVD/ disc or flash drive, clearly labeled or with a tag attached

Exhibits or projects may be presented in any media format. Examples may include any of the following ideas:

- Photo board
- regular size poster board (22' " x 28")
- science fair display board
- video presentation
- power point presentation
- Diorama or model

The above media formats can include any of the following:

- Illustrations, drawings or pictures, clippings
- Graphs and/or charts

- Photography: judging will not include composition or technique. The photography should tell a story or communicate what you are trying to show the audience about the Shooting Sports Education project.
- Videos: taped presentations using volunteer subjects, a safety or educational advertisement or commercial segment, an illustrated talk, a problem solving scenario etc
- Diorama or models: miniature scene involving any positive aspect of shooting sports safety or education, a model of a bow rack,

Projects will be judged on the following:

Neatness, organization, creativity and accuracy of information

- Must be in entered in an organized folder or notebook that includes a Title Page or Cover

- The record keeping should show the members progress throughout the year
