PAR Report - Kathryn Fitzpatrick



Winter has set in with a vengeance, and the snow is deeper than it has been in a long time. The deep freeze is also reaching record proportions. But this is good for our crops as it increases cold hardiness, helps suppress pests and disease, and helps with soil nutrient management as it helps break down soil particles through frost-heaving.



We are well on our way to getting set up with the requisite seeds and plant material to start transplants in the greenhouse. This year we will be starting all but the garlic, potatoes, turnips, pole beans, carrots, and radishes in the greenhouse. We will be marking the PAR crops in the CSA fields to help us stay on top of the vegetables for donation while allowing us to work single crops for both PAR and CSA, but we will be benefiting from any surplus from the CSA yields – definitely a win-win.

Many of the logistics for working the two gardens have been ironed out, but the proof will be in the pudding, so to speak.

As we are adjusting to the new arrangement, I'm sure we will need to address any unanticipated challenges. I am looking forward to the collaboration with the CSA team!

Hope to see you in the garden this year or perhaps in the greenhouse in the spring,

Benefits of snow cover in the gardens

Snow-Lovely to enjoy from the kitchen table with a cup of cocoa but a pain to drive in and shovel! Gardeners need to look for the silver lining of our winter woes. Snow cover provides many benefits to soil and plants:

- Insulation of roots for plants with less heaving from fluctuating temperatures that could cause root damage
- Protection from soil erosion from un-checked winter winds
- Prevents deeper soil freezing
- Provides a blanket of protection to foliage to lessen desiccation from winds
- Nutrient Boost: Snowflakes trap atmospheric nitrogen, nitrate, and ammonium, delivering these nutrients into the soil as they melt.
- Slow moisture release into soil with melting.

PLANT OF THE MONTH

Lori Heiden – AGL Hosta Garden

Helleborus orientalis



Helleborus orientalis (common name: hellebore) are tough, shade-loving perennials, also call Christmas or Lenten roses, that bloom in winter and early spring with cup-shaped, often nodding, flowers.

Unlike other perennials, the large palmate leaves of Hellebores are almost always evergreen, truly an under-rated feature. They begin blooming in early spring, so they're a first source of nectar for pollinators. Flowers can last more than four weeks.

After flowering, remove old, tattered foliage and spent flower stems to encourage new growth and prevent disease.

Hellebores are largely trouble-free, deer-resistant, and drought-tolerant once established, but require well-drained soil in shade to avoid fungal issues.

You can find Hellebores in the Hosta garden and Demo garden.

HOME GARDEN TOOL MAINTENANCE

Tool maintenance is an important part of a gardener's life. Winter is a good time to take a good look at your home garden tools. A check to see if they are clean, free of rust and dirt, are sharp and ready to use and are in good, working order. Not only do you want to check your pruners, but also your hedge clippers, hori hori (garden knife), trowels, various shovels, and electric tools. While there are different methods of cleaning, the following is a simple guide in cleaning those tools.



1. Suggested supplies: steel wool pads, rubber gloves, clean rags, wire brush, scotch pads, honing stone (sharpening stone) and oil, machine oil (WD-40), isopropyl alcohol, graphite lubricant



2. Scrub off any dirt, tree sap, or rust with steel wool, wire brush, or rags. Wipe clean with alcohol or machine oil.



3. Oil tool joints with machine oil or graphite lubricant.

4. Sharpen the blades-
 - Sharpen on the beveled side
 - Start inside and pull out towards the tip
 - Repeat approximately 25 times (or more) beveled side only
 - Stroke on the opposite side 1-2 times to remove any burrs

5. Wipe all tools with a clean rag when done.


