Michigan's Failed Silk Industry: The Great Mulberry Hoax

VOLUME 27

On September 16, Tollgate volunteers and supporters can learn details about Michigan's failed silk experiment, known as the "Multicaulis fever" or "Multicaulis humbuggery." The presentation on silkworm wishes and mulberry dreams will include a short history of silk, an overview of silk production, and the story of Michigan's promotion of raising silkworms and growing mulberry trees. Naturalist Gerry Wykes' four-page article is available at <u>Michigans-Silkworm-Fever.pdf</u> (revize.com).

Author, illustrator, historian, presenter, retired curator and supervising interpreter of the Huron-Clinton Metropark's Lake Erie Marshlands Museum and Nature Center, **Gerry Wykes** is a contributor to *Michigan History* magazine. In 2014, the Historical Society of Michigan gave Gerry the award for the best article in *Michigan History* for "A Weed Goes to War," about northern Michigan school children harvesting milkweed floss during 1942-1944 for life preservers that helped save U.S. aviators and sailors toward the end of WWII.

An Interpretive American and a Renaissance man, Gerry Wykes educates with humor and stories combining natural science with regional history and geography. In 2013, Tollgate volunteers enjoyed his program on mammals. In 2016, Gerry shared information about the plant world of the Huron/Wyandot. In 2017, he talked about the return of beavers to the Detroit River after a 150-year absence, the subject of the book that he wrote and illustrated. *A Beaver Tale: The Castors of Conners Creek* was published by Wayne State University Press in 2016, <u>A Beaver Tale | Wayne State University Press</u>. In 2018, Gerry gave his presentation on "A Weed Goes to War." You can listen to a 7-minute interview at <u>Michigan milkweed played a key role in WWII | Michigan Radio</u>.

Greetings all,

August has come and gone. Summer is flying by. Colder temperatures may soon arrive – but are not here just yet. The end of August has seen the completion of a successful summer camp season. Several hundred campers had lots of adventures on the farm. In addition to the usual camps which featured hiking in the woods and fishing in the pond, Tollgate hosted a week of Adventure camp filled with kayaking, rock climbing, and other high energy outdoor sports and two weeks of horse camp filled with, well, horses. Due to Covid considerations, camps were about half the size this year than they were in past years and almost all activities were conducted out of doors. Even with smaller numbers and camp conduct modifications, having the kids back on the farm did feel like a breath of normalcy.

Lots of other happenings around the farm recently. On August 21, Tollgate conducted its first summer volunteer recognition picnic. The event brought together volunteers from the gardens, 4H club, maple syrup project, educational programming support and other areas. The weather was beautiful, and the talks, food and tours made for a nice day.



Since winter is inevitable, we have been spending a lot of time recently gathering the second cutting of hay. If you are a goat, the second cutting is much yummier than the first cutting harvested back in June.







Lots more grass blades in the second cutting and fewer of those pesky stalks. With all the rain and hot weather, this year's crop promises to be especially plentiful. We use lots of hav to keep the Tollgate animals well fed.

It takes lots of work to keep them happy through the winter. It's all worthwhile though each time one of the goats gives you a nod of approval and a wink of appreciation when they dive into the hav feeder for a winter bite.

Recognition Dinner: At this point, we are planning to host the volunteer recognition dinner this November. If you have attended past year's events, you know that the recognition dinner is a great event that brings us all together in a celebration of the gardening year. It remains to be seen whether it will make sense to gather in close proximity indoors in consideration of Covid. For now, we are hopeful. To get an invitation to the dinner, you need to sign in at least once at a Tollgate workday using the QR code system. The Recognition dinner is scheduled for Saturday, November 6, beginning at 4:00pm. Although November seems like a long time away, it will be here soon!

Astilbe – this terrific shade plant has sold very well for us at the spring sale. It's a shade garden staple, and even does well in sun if kept consistently moist.



FERNS – these plants are a great accent in almost any garden! Some of the very popular varieties at our Plant Sales are in the Athyrium genus - Lady Fern, Ghost fern and Japanese Painted Fern. Cinnamon Ferns (Osmunda genus) are also in the "Most Wanted" category.

Echinacea purpurea –Native Purple Cone Flowers and the many cultivars developed from that genus are garden staples, and we would like to have many more!



Geraniums - are popular for shade gardens, and our stock is very low! Whatever variety you have, I think we need it – the native as well as the many cultivars with variations in leaf size or shape and varied bloom colors.



Monarda – Bee Balm is always a popular plant sale offering, and we need lots more - both purple and red blooming varieties.

Summer Camp has concluded, and the heat wave has finally broken! We are nearing the tail end of the season with a harvest totaling 1426 lbs. of garlic, radishes, cabbage, turnips, potatoes, onions, beets, carrots, beans, zucchini, and yellow squash. Cabbage, onions, potatoes, and turnips are the heavy hitters so far, but there are more beets, carrots, onions, beans, zucchini, yellow squash, and winter squash to harvest over the next two months, so I am confident that we will exceed 2000 lbs. for the season. We are staggering the harvest to spread out the quantity and variety of vegetables delivered each week to CARES or Feed the Need.



The onions are being pulled and laid out in the sun to cure as the tops have all fallen over. The tops are mostly brown, but

until they are dry, we will let mother nature help us prepare them for consumption. This year we had three varieties – early fresh onions, sweet yellow onions, and red onions.



The early fresh onions and the sweet yellow onions have already been prepped (dry tops removed)

and delivered. The red onions are next this month, and we will have completed the onion harvest for the season.





The garlic has been prepped for use – roots and dry tops removed, and we had a whopping 58 lbs.! Alas, the shed no longer has

the aroma of an Italian restaurant. The seed garlic has been secured in the barn to keep it dry until we are ready to plant in October.



We had some fun with the beans this year and planted four different varieties in bands across the trellis. Our standard

variety in years past has been Fortex - a green bean which is a prolific producer.

This year we added Kentucky Wonder, Scarlet Runner which has beautiful red flowers and pink beans, and the gorgeous Chinese Red Noodle. The latter two have provided beauty and interest, but not the yield of the other two, so we will have to decide

on our criteria for next year. It sure is pleasant to work around the beautiful red flowers and beans.



We are letting the winter squash cure on the vine, until the vines are spent and will then move them into the greenhouse to cure

further until they are ready for consumption. The hard exterior of winter squash needs time to ripen for the best results. We have Acorn and Delicata this year and although the plants aren't quite as full as last year, they have produced well.

This month we will be having an al fresco BYO lunch meeting in the pavilion to plan and prepare for next year. It is great to review our successes and challenges, share experience and ideas, decide on the composition of vegetables for the upcoming year, as well as discuss strategies for addressing our pest and weed problems. It is also fun to get together and enjoy one another's company without unrelenting heat, dirt, and sweat. The PAR team harvesting and weeding:

Just wanted to share the recipes that Mary Spencer presented at the August Tollgate Garden Volunteer meeting. It was a nice evening for an outdoor meeting in the Pavilion. All in attendance enjoyed the dishes prepared using the veggies of the season, many collected right from Tollgate!





PASTA WITH 15 MINUTE BURST CHERRY TOMATO SAUCE

1 lb. pasta Kosher salt

½ cup olive oil

2 large garlic cloves, finely chopped

3 pints cherry tomatoes

½ tsp. freshly ground black pepper Pinch of sugar

1 cup coarsely chopped fresh basil

Freshly grated Parmesan for serving

 Cook pasta in a large pot of boiling salted water, stirring occasionally, until al dente; drain and transfer to a large bowl.

 Meanwhile, heat oil in a 12 Inch skillet or wide heavy saucepan over medium high heat. Add garlic, then tomatoes, pepper, sugar, and 1 tsp. salt. Cook, stirring occasionally, until tomatoes burst and release their juices to form a sauce, 6-8 minutes.

3. Toss pasta with tomato sauce and basil. Top with Parmesan.

Serves 4-6

PAN CON TOMATE- Spanish Tomato Toasts

1 large loaf crusty country bread

Olive oil for brushing the bread

4large cloves garlic, cut in half

3 large tomatoes Fleur de sel or coarse salt if desired

 Pre-heat oven broller. Slice bread into thick slices, generously brush them with olive oil and place them on a cookie sheet. Place bread under broiler and toost until golden. 2. Cut tomatoes in half. Cut each garlic clove in half and rub each bread slice with the cut side of a garlic clove. Rub toast with tomatoes, squeezing slightly to distribute juice and seeds evenly on bread. Sprinkle with fleur de sel or coarse sait and serve immediately. Makes 6 servings

TOMATO, CUCUMBER AND AVOCADO SALAD WITH UME AND FETA VINAGRETTE For the Salad: % small red onion, thinly sliced 1 large English cucumber, quartered lengthwise and sliced

1 pint halved cherry tomatoes, about 2 cups 2 medium avocados, peeled, pitted, and diced 1/3 cup crumbled feta ¼ cup chopped fresh cilantro For the Dressing: 3 tbsp. fresh lime juice 1tbsp. extra virgin olive oil 2 tsp. honey 2 cloves minced garlic (about 1tsp.) Salt and pepper to taste 1. Place the sliced red onions in a small bowl and co them with cold water (this helps remove some of the onions' harsh bite). 2. In a small bowl or large measuring cup, whisk together the dressing ingredients: lime juice, olive oil, honey, garlic, salt, and pepper. In a very large bowl, place the cucumbers, tomatoes, avocado, half of the feta, and cilantro. Drain the red onion, then add it to the bowl. Pour the dressing over the top, then stir very gently to combine. Sprinkle the remaining feta over the top. Enjoy immediately or cover the bowl with plastic wrap and refrigerate for up to 4 hours. Give the mixture a gentle stir just before serving. Serves 6

Plans for the Rose Garden

The plan is to restore Tollgate's Rose Garden and recreate the spectacular centerpiece garden with roses as the stars of the show!

The remaining plant material must be totally removed including roots with no evidence of return shoots before rose plants can be replaced. All rose plants will be carefully inspected, ensuring they are healthy and free of pest and disease symptoms, including those of Rose Rosette Disease (RRD).

Studies show that tall barrier plants are useful in reducing new infections when the barrier plants are installed on the windward side of the garden. It is helpful to install a mixed planting using some non-rose material to reduce disease spread. Since Rosa species and hybrids are the only known hosts, mixed plantings interfere with the disease cycle and slow the spread of disease. Our renovation plan will reflect this mixed planting concept.

Roses should be monitored throughout the season for symptoms of RRD. Stressed plants are more likely to become diseased so meeting horticultural water and nutrient needs, and IPM is important. Management is most successful when entire neighborhoods or communities are educated to recognize the disease and act quickly to remove symptomatic plants. Consider the references below to learn more about Rose Rosette Disease.


