2013 4-H CLUB AND F.F.A. MEMBERS SPECIAL PREMIUM BOOK

Championship Ribbons and Awards in this Section given only at Judge's discretion.

- 1. All properly enrolled participants in the Calhoun County 4-H Program and Future Farmers of America in Calhoun County may make entries in this department. Youth must abide by CCAIS age regulations.
- 2. Children 5-8 years of age who are enrolled in 4-H may enter non-animal exhibits in this Division. No premiums or placing ribbons will be awarded. Regular entry forms are not to be used. Special entry forms will be provided by the 4-H program. Judging will be held in the Boys/Girls 4-H Building.
- 3. 4-H& FFA participants must make entries through their 4-H Club leader or the Vocational Agriculture instructor respectively. 4-H, FFA participants and youth must abide by the guidelines stated in the 4-H section of the fairbook and those available at the MSU Extension office and the Calhoun County 4-H Youth Program Conduct Policy. All livestock exhibits must be entered through respective county wide livestock club leaders or superintendents. All livestock exhibits entered must comply with rules stated under "Rules for Livestock Exhibitors" found in this section. Entries are to be submitted to the Calhoun County Fair Office no later than Wednesday, July 17, 2013, 5:00 P.M.
- 4. All exhibits must be in place by 8:00 P.M. on the first Sunday of the Fair, unless otherwise specified.
- 5. All animals are subject to examination by a veterinarian at the request of the Superintendent, and; if in their opinion, the presence of these animals are a hazard to other animals or people on the Fairgrounds, the owner must remove such exhibits at once or such exhibits will be removed at the owner's expense.
- **6.** 4-H & FFA animal exhibit stalls and pens shall have been cleaned and bedded and animals cleaned by 9:00 A.M. each day. All exhibit areas and animals must be kept in a neat and tidy condition during exhibit hours. The Superintendent may request any exhibitor failing to keep their stalls in a clean and tidy condition to remove their animals from exhibit.
- 7. An adequate amount of feed and bedding must be supplied by each exhibitor.
- **8.** Members wishing to enter open Classes may do so but must make regular entry with the Fair Office prior to date such entries are closed.
- 9. Market animals going to slaughter will be loaded starting at 12:00 A.M. midnight, Saturday. Market livestock will be released at 2:00 A.M. Sunday. 4-H Horses and other 4-H Livestock exhibits will be released at 6:00 A.M. Sunday. Non-livestock exhibits will be released and picked up between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 2:00 P.M. on Sunday. Any exceptions will be made only on written permission from the Superintendent presented to a 4-H Staff member and the CCAIS Executive Director. Members unable to pick up exhibits at this time must make arrangements for someone else to pick up the exhibits. Exhibits removed prior to release time without permission will **forfeit premium**.
- 10. Notification to the Extension staff if any premiums need to be forfeited.
- **11**. An educational Exhibit means a poster, an article or an item having to do with the project entered for public display at a Fair or Show and judged in competition.
- 12. Youth exhibitors will not be allowed to exhibit or show projects or livestock which has been exhibited in 4-H Classes at another County Fair during the current year.
- 13. 4-H members who transfer the same species of market animal project membership from one 4-H club to another, except new residents of the county, will not be eligible to show in championship Classes or for any special awards including participation in the 4-H Livestock Auction for a period of two years.
- **14.** Only 4-H & FFA exhibitors are eligible to receive special awards associated with Classes 1100-3869, except Classes 1300, 1315, 1420, 1430, 1480, 1520, 1521, 1530, 1531, and Rate of Gains for which 4-H livestock club members only are eligible.

CONDUCT OF EXHIBITORS

- 1. All exhibitors at the fair must abide by 4-H and CCAIS Rules and Regulations.
- 2. Exhibits and surrounding areas must be ready for show by 9:00 A.M.
- 3. Exhibitors are not allowed in the livestock or exhibit areas after 11 P.M. and will not be allowed to stay in livestock barns overnight.
- 4. Exhibitors may stay on the fairgrounds in the designated camping areas only in the company of their parents, but must secure a permit from the Fair Office.
- 5. All exhibitors and adults should be on their best conduct at the fair.
- Harassment, profanity or unsportsmanlike conduct toward officials, judges, show managers, staff, leaders or other exhibitors will not be tolerated.

Date for computing age shall be the age that the member is as of January 1 of that year.

Michigan 4-H Guiding Principles for Positive Youth Development

 Youth develop positive relationships with adults and peers.
 Youth develop sustained relationships with peers and adults that nurture their positive development.

Elements of effective practice:

Adults and youth are available and accessible to each other for information, guidance and support.

The development of positive, meaningful relationships that foster a sense of belonging and connectedness over time is encouraged and supported. Adults and youth are consistently and actively engaged together in activities and experiences.

Cooperative experiences that build trust and foster honest and open communication are developed and supported.

2. Youth are physically and emotionally safe.

Youth will learn more and participate more fully when they feel physically and emotionally safe. A structured yet flexible environment encourages honesty, trust and respect among all youth and adults.

Elements of effective practice:

Adult and youth volunteers model constructive ways for providing feedback and addressing situations, behaviors and emotions. Activities and programs are held in environments that maximize the safety and well-being of participants.

Youth are encouraged to try new experiences through positive risk-taking. Rules, expectations and consequences are clear, consistent, developmentally appropriate and applied fairly.

3. Youth are actively engaged in their own development.

Through a process of identity discovery and awareness, youth increase their personal competence and sense of well-being.

Elements of effective practice:

A wide range of opportunities and experiences that encourage youth and adults to explore, discuss and reflect on ethical values, personal interests, strengths and accomplishments.

Youth explore, discuss and reflect on ethical values, personal interests, strengths and accomplishments in purposeful and meaningful ways. Opportunities and experiences are provided to foster youth's positive sense of purpose and view of the future.

Youth are recognized for both their participation and achievement.

4. Youth are considered participants rather than recipients in the learning process.

Youth are encouraged to actively participate in their own learning. Opportunities for youth to learn and develop take place in many different contexts and take into account a variety of learning styles.

Elements of effective practice:

Learning is encouraged in formal and nonformal settings, in planned and unplanned ways.

Opportunities for shared decision-making, planning and program implementation are provided for youth.

Adults and youth work together to overcome barriers to participation such as transportation, cost and scheduling.

5. Youth develop skills that help them succeed.

Youth experience and learn from hands-on educational opportunities that help them develop the skills they need to be successful adults.

Elements of effective practice:

Youth identify, develop, practice and articulate their skills.

Youth set challenging yet realistic goals; they follow through on their commitments to achieve their best.

Youth receive support from adult and teen volunteers, family members, peers and the larger community throughout the skill-building process. Youth recognize and celebrate their skills and accomplishments within their own definition of success and mastery.

6. Youth recognize, understand and appreciate multiculturalism.

Youth will respect differences among groups and individuals of diverse backgrounds. Youth will develop skills and competencies that help them foster social justice in their communities and their world.

Elements of effective practice:

Youth explore and value their own diverse abilities, skills, interests and cultural backgrounds.

Youth explore diverse people, places and ideas.

Youth and volunteers from diverse backgrounds and with diverse abilities are included in decision-making, leadership and planning.

7. Youth grow and contribute as active citizens through service and leadership.

Youth feel included and involved in their communities. They have significant roles to play and important contributions to make as stewards of the future. Youth develop personal competencies that foster leadership, caring and citizenship.

Elements of effective practice:

Youth are aware of and informed about local and global needs, opportunities and issues, and are provided meaningful roles in how decisions are made.

Youth use their time, energies and skills for the benefit of others. Youth practice leadership skills to address needs, issues and opportunities.

Youth are encouraged to recognize their roles as stewards in their communities.

CALHOUN COUNTY 4-H YOUTH PROGRAM POLICIES & PROCEDURES

New members must be enrolled in a club by having a completed 4-H member enrollment form on file in the MSU Extension Office and their participation fee paid by June 1st of the current project year. NOTE: The 4-H project year for Calhoun County is September 1 to August 31. 4-H clubs are required to submit renewing 4-H member enrollments and paid member participation fees to the MSU Extension Office by March 30th each year, (unless approved in advance by the 4-H Educator), with June 1st being the final deadline for Fair eligibility.

Enrollment process must be renewed annually

Adult Volunteer Leaders: All prospective volunteer leaders must complete the volunteer selection process. The responsibility for the well-being of children lies with each and every one of us who have ongoing, unsupervised access to children or to adults who have severe mental, physical, or emotional disability conditions during the course of their participation in MSU Extension Youth Programs.

The Michigan State University Extension program prides itself on providing quality educational programs. The primary purpose of this Code of Conduct is to ensure the safety and well-being of all participants.

MSU Extension volunteers will:

- Accept their responsibility to represent MSU Extension Calhoun County and MSU extension programs with dignity and pride by being positive role models.
- Conduct themselves in a courteous and respectful manner, exhibit good sportsmanship and provide positive role models for youths.
- Respect, adhere to and enforce the rules, policies and guidelines established by MSU Extension - Calhoun County and MSU Extension programs.
- Abstain from, and not tolerate physical or verbal abuse.
- · Comply with equal opportunity and anti-discrimination laws.
- Avoid criminal activities.
- Under no circumstances, possess, sell or consume alcohol or possess, sell or use controlled substances at a MSU Extension youth activity or event.
- Under no circumstances, attend or participate in a MSU Extension youth activity or event under the influence of alcohol and/or controlled substances.

- Accept the responsibility to promote and support MSU Extension to develop an effective, county, state and national program.
- Operate machinery, vehicles and other equipment in a responsible manner.
 - •It is important that all Michigan State University Extension volunteers comply with the Code of Conduct. Failure to comply with any component of the code or participation in other inappropriate conduct as determined by MSU Extension representatives may lead to dismissal as a volunteer from the MSU Extension program.

Residence:

- a) Youth are expected to affiliate with the program in their county of residence. It is recognized that limited situations may occur where membership in a county other than the county of residence might be positive.
- b) 4-H membership in two counties simultaneously is discouraged.c) 4-H membership in two states simultaneously is discouraged.
- d) Consideration for membership in a county other than the county of residence should be given only in situations where a positive educational experience will result. Any change motivated by perceived competitive of sale advantage, due to controversial issues, or other similar motivations will not be seen as justified reasons for consideration for membership in a county other than the county of residence, and should be automatically brought before the Council involved.
- e) Any consideration for membership in a county other than the county of residence within the limits of this policy and not addressed by the above statement should be brought to the attention of the MSU Extension Office. MSU Extension staff will then provide leadership for decisions in these special situations.

Deadlines: Compliance with established, stated and published final dates and deadlines is considered an expectation of 4-H membership. Submitting required exhibits, applications, reports, etc. on time and within the rules is part of the 4-H learning experience. Individuals not complying with these expectations may lose awards and privileges. This is especially important in animal projects where animal ownership, raising and identification have a specific time line as a part of the project requirements. Members not complying with established and published requirements may be denied any and all premiums or awards for that project.

Project Eligibility: All projects must be prepared, constructed, and/or assembled by the member. The member is responsible for the development, care and/or training of their project on or before any and all applicable county enrollment, registration and ownership deadlines and continuously until after the project(s) is officially released from the fair. It is the responsibility of the youth exhibitor and his/her family to follow all prescribed and accepted livestock exhibition and care practices pertaining to when ownership of animals is to occur. Possession means the animal(s) are in the youth exhibitor's name with written proof of ownership as evidenced by one of the following: bill of sale, lease agreement or purchase agreement. The youth is to provide at least 75% care of the animal project(s). Parents providing family owned and/or raised animals to their child need to provide a signed statement documenting ownership of the animal(s) in the name of the youth member.

Project Exhibition: Handicapped youth may be assisted, as necessary, during project evaluation and/or in the show ring by a leader or other youth exhibitor. Any exhibitor unable to attend non animal judging, must have a written explanation as to why they could not attend and information about their project and it can only be exhibited by another 4-H member or sibling.

Attendance: Members are strongly encouraged to attend 4-H meetings as part of the overall educational experience. 4-H club leaders and members may establish goals for attendance, projects, completion, etc. to meet criteria established for awards and recognition within their club provided they do not conflict with MSU Extension Equal Opportunity or Affirmative Action policies.

Exhibition: Exhibition of 4-H projects in local, county or state exhibits/fairs is considered a privilege and is voluntary on the part of the member. The exhibitions of 4-H projects provide the member an opportunity to display their 4-H projects, entertain wholesome competition and enjoy a positive educational/social environment with their peers. With the privilege of exhibition, also comes the responsibility for abiding by all of the rules relative to the respective 4-H project.

Disobedience of the established rules of the projects may be grounds for disciplinary action up to and including exclusion from the 4-H Department of the Fair.

Completion: A 4-H member is considered "complete" in his/her project work when he/she has:

- 1. Filled out and submitted an official 4-H Club member enrollment form by the established and published deadline.
- 2. Turned in any required project reports by the established and published deadline.
- **3.** Exhibited the required project exhibit at the Calhoun County Fair during the current project year.

Special Note: Members who have met requirements (I) and (2) above, but who are unable to or wish not to exhibit at the Fair may still receive a "complete" in a given project area if the member provides a project demonstration/illustration to their 4-H club and if the Administrative and project leader provides approval.

- 4-H members participating in/or acting on behalf of the Calhoun County 4-H Youth Program are expected to conduct themselves in accordance with accepted standards of social behavior, to respect the rights of others and to refrain from any conduct which may be injurious to the program. Actions constituting misconduct for which 4-H members may be subject to disciplinary penalties include, but are not limited to:
- 1. Dishonesty in connection with any 4-H activity by cheating or knowingly furnishing false information.
- 2. Alteration of/or unauthorized use of 4-H records.
- **3.** Obstruction or disruption of any 4-H activity or aiding and encouraging other persons to engage in such conduct.
- 4. Failure to comply with specific rules of a given project, contest or activity.
- 5. Failure to comply with directions of 4-H officials acting in the proper performance of their duties.
- **6.** Possession or the use of fire crackers, gun powder, firearms, chemicals or other materials that can be used to create an explosive mixture
- 7. Misuse of fire equipment or fire alarms.
- **8.** Any exhibitor under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs will not be allowed to participate at the fair and will remove projects from exhibit and forfeit premiums.
- **9.** Physical abuse or conduct which threatens or endangers the health, safety and/or well-being of any person/animal.
- **10.** Theft or malicious damage to property.
- 11. Possession and/or use of distribution of alcohol or illegal drugs.
- 12. Lewd, indecent or obscene conduct and/or language.
- **13.** Unauthorized entry, use or occupancy of any facility.
- **14.** Any conduct which threatens or interferes with the maintenance of appropriate order and discipline, or invades the rights of others. When violations of the above policies occur, the following procedures will be followed:
- **A.** The parent(s)/guardian(s) will be contacted.
- **B.** The 4-H Extension Staff will be notified.
- **C.** At the discretion of the 4-H staff members, leaders or other individuals in charge, the offender(s) may be turned over to the proper authorities.

Penalties: If in the opinion of the 4-H staff member(s), leaders or other persons in charge of the event/activity, evidence of alteration, excessive outside help, unethical preparation and/or misconduct is noted, the exhibit and/or member may be subject to any and/or all of the following penalties may be applied:

- A. Disqualification from the show/exhibition.
- B. Forfeiture of all premiums and awards.
- **C.** Disbarment from participation in that project/event/activity and/ or other related projects/events/activities.

Further, enforcement may be selective and does not waive the MSU Extension staff's right to enforce penalties at a future date and appropriate circumstance.

Rules and Procedure Violations:

When there is an issue or conflict at the fair, the following chain of command needs to be utilized.

- **Step 1.** YOUTH MEMBER is to bring the situation, with facts, to their administrative leader (head leader for that project area).
- **Step 2.** If the leader, under his/her authority, is unable to handle this matter, he/she is to go with the youth and the youth's parent /legal guardian to the appropriate superintendent.
- Step 3. If the superintendent is unable to settle the conflict, together

the leader the youth and their parent/legal guardian and the superintendent are to go to a 4-H agent within 24 hours of occurrence. **Step 4.** This must be accompanied with a factual, descriptive written incident report. An exhibitor, against whom a protest has been filed, shall have the right to read the statement of protest.

Step 5. A committee made up of Extension staff, fair liaison, superintendent for that area and 2 adult council leaders will come together on a fact finding discussion and make a decision.

Step 6. A written decision will be made within 24 hours and be provided to the involved parties.

Appeals: 4-H members have the right to appeal the levying of a 4-H rule(s) violation penalty(ies) according to the following process: A person making a formal protest shall deposit a sum of \$25.00. If the appeal results in a revised decision, the deposit shall be returned to the complaintant.

- 1. The member must request a hearing before a 4-H Council committee at its next regularly scheduled monthly meeting. This committee will consist of an Extension staff member, a project superintendent and at least 3 adult council members. Request must be made in writing to the 4-H Council, c/o Calhoun County MSU Extension, 315 W. Green Street, Marshall, MI 49068, at least ten (10) business days prior to the meeting.
- 2. All parties involved will be notified by certified mail with return receipt of the meeting date, time and location.
- 3. All parties involved will have the right to present their case as to why he/she/they feel the decision should be reconsidered.
- 4. All parties involved will be notified in writing within five (5) business days by certified mail with return receipt of the 4-H Council's decision regarding the appeal.
- 5. All decisions by the committee are final.

2013 FAIR RULE CHANGES CALHOUN COUNTY ANIMAL TEST RULES 2013 LIVESTOCK HEALTH RULES

All new rules and changes for the above topics are found in the front half of the Fairbook.

RULES FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

- 1. Each member must personally show their own livestock.
- 2. Members exhibiting breeding stock will be limited to one breed in any one division, except poultry where two breeds may be exhibited, and goats, beef breeding, dairy where any number of breeds may be exhibited.
- **3.** Any one member is limited to one animal in any individual Class except dairy and beef breeding.
- 4. All members are to have gates for their beef and horse project.
- 5. Each Exhibitor in any livestock Class must own their animal before June 1 of this year, unless otherwise specified. Ownership must be in the exhibitor's name.
- **6.** 4-H members are limited to selling one small animal species and one large animal species of livestock.
- 7. 4-H members may participate in all large animal showmanship Divisions. Members are only allowed to show and sell one large animal species of market livestock. Decision must be made at weigh-in.
- **8.** Youth who have not enrolled their Market Sheep, Swine or Beef project through the respective county wide Calhoun County 4-H Sheep club, Calhoun County 4-H Swine club and Calhoun County Beef club will not be eligible for Championship Classes or for any special awards including participation in the 4-H Livestock Auction.
- **9.** All youth exhibitors must have had their market animals identified by the date and methods specified in species rules listed below to be eligible to make a fair entry with the Calhoun County Fair.
- 10. 4-H members who transfer the same species of market animal project membership from one 4-H club to another, except new residents of the county, will not be eligible to show in championship Classes or for any special awards including participation in the 4-H Livestock Auction for a period of two years.

JUDGING

Animals in each Class will be judged on the individuality of the animal and then placed into Classes A, B, and C and premiums will be paid on this

basis. Selections for champions, reserve champions or special awards as provided by sponsors will be made at the time of judging.

DAIRY

First year dairy exhibitors are limited to not more than 3 animals. Advanced dairy exhibitors may not exceed 5 head of dairy animals. Exhibitors are allowed to exhibit 2 animals in one Class. No animals with horns may be exhibited in 4-H Classes except Junior Heifer Calf. NO BULLS MAY BE SHOWN IN THIS DEPARTMENT

DAIRY STARTER CALF

- 1. A dairy starter calf is an immature bovine animal of a dairy breed. (Holstein, Brown Swiss, Jersey, Dutch Belt, Ayrshires, Guernsey's and Milking Shorthorn) that has been raised on a diet of milk, milk replacer, grains, and/or roughage. The calf must be weaned by the time of the fair.
- 2. Dairy starter calf must be 100% dairy breed bloodline.
- **3.** Calves must weigh between 100-250 lbs. at the spring weigh-in. All starter calves must be weighted and tagged at the pre-weigh-in held at the fairgrounds. Exhibitors are allowed to weight two calves. No home weigh-ins. Exhibitors are only able to show one calf.
- **4.** All exhibitors in the dairy starter calf project are required to keep records of their project and be judged on Saturday before the fair, and all junior and senior exhibitors must participate in the showmanship Class. Showmanship is mandatory.
- **5.** All starter calves must be completely dehorned and castrated/banded, no clamping allowed to be exhibited. Any calves with signs of horns may show only in showmanship and will not be sold at the auction.
- 6. Starter calves are to be steers, no heifers or bulls allowed.
- 7. Weigh-in for starter calves will be the first Sunday of the fair. Calves will be shown by weight Classification with the weight schedule being decided after calves are weighed in on Sunday. Classes may be divided at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- 8. Starter calves are to be exhibited like a beef animal, with a show stick.
- **9.** All calves must participate in the mandatory weighing and tagging. Minimum average daily gain requirement of 1.5 lb. per day to be sold. Exhibitor will be notified and animals that don't make minimum average daily gain will be retagged with a different colored tag and will not be able to sell at fair. Growth implants are allowed.
- 10. All calves must come from a TB free herd or be from a TB free state. (Papers)
- 11. All calves must be vaccinated.

SHEEP

A maximum of 4 lambs can be weighed and tagged for the market Divisions at the May weigh-In. A maximum of 6 lambs may be weighed per child provided the child participates in the carcass Division. A market pen shall consist of two (2) lambs. Weighing in any more than 4 requires the youth to participate in the carcass Division. Weighing of the carcass lambs takes place the same time as the market lambs. Lambs may be weighed in at the May weigh in under a family name. The lambs may then be designated to a particular child at the Sunday weigh in at the fair. If there are any problems in determining the family name it will be left to the discretion of the superintendent.

Lambs must weigh a minimum of 90 lbs to show and sell at the fair. Lambs not weighing 90 lbs will be entered in the feeder Division and are not eligible for sale or champion Divisions.

Each exhibitor is limited to showing a total of two market lambs. Each exhibitor will have a choice to exhibit one market lamb and one pen of market lambs OR two individuals, but not both.

An exhibitor may own any combination of market Division winners and/or department winners, but can only own one of the Grand or Reserve Champions. Champion Market animals include: Grand Champion Lamb, Reserve Champion Lamb, Grand Champion Pen, and Reserve Champion Pen. If an exhibitor's animal is chosen for a grand or reserve champion, their other animal must be withdrawn from further consideration for any other champions.

If Champion and Reserve Champion Home Bred and Raised are not shown in Division 10, the lamb will not be considered for Individual Champion and Individual Reserve Champion.

Ewe lambs may be entered in market Divisions. Ewe lambs show as market lambs may NOT be shown as breeding stock. No ewe lamb entered in the breeding stock Division may have a CCSC tag in their ear.

All exhibitors of market lambs must indicate whether they want to sell or not on Tuesday night of fair week before 8:00pm. Animals designated as No Sale are still eligible for Championship Divisions. Any market animal named Grand or Reserve Champion (Individual or Pen) will be sold at the 4-H Livestock Sale. If a first year member wins Grand or Reserve Champion Pen, they will sell both their animals as a pen.

First year members may show two lambs, but may only sell one lamb. If a first or second year member wins Grand Champion Pen, they will sell as a pen. Any member that has participated more than one year may show and sell two lambs. First year members must indicate which lamb is to be sold, and must indicate the shipping arrangements of the second lamb to the shipping committee before 8:00 am Saturday. This should be indicated on or before show day to help the committee.

Code of Conduct must be signed and turned into a leader before weigh-in at fair. Every Sheep Club Member must sign up for at least one barn duty time slot. All exhibitors must complete thank you notes for prizes, trophies, and buyers. These thank you notes must be turned in to a leader the Saturday of fair.

Market lambs must be slick shorn before crossing the scales, at the discretion of the superintendent or the administrative leader, for the final weigh in on Sunday of fair (Recommendation: slick shorn within 2 weeks of final weigh in). All lambs must be in good health. Those with clinical signs of infections, contagious diseases {such as ringworm, fungus, etc}, and/or prolapse will be removed at the discretion of the superintendent. Intact male animals will be disqualified. Any sheep participating in a fair, exhibition, exposition, or show must have an official USDA Individual Scrapie Identification Tag. This means that your lambs must have these tags. If you are unaware of what this tag is, contact the superintendent for assistance.

There will be no drenching allowed on the fairgrounds. No coloring agents are allowed, including but not limited to: any product which enhances or alters the natural color of an animal such as paint, dye, powder, non clear adhesive, foam or shoe polish.

SHEEP CARCASS

Any 4-H Sheep Club member may participate. One carcass animal per member may be exhibited. Carcass lambs may be entered in the rate of gain contest. Lambs entered in the carcass Division must be presented clean, halter trained, and clipped at the live evaluation.

Exhibitors participating in the carcass Division must participate in the live evaluation. The carcass [rail] evaluation is optional.

All responsibility for sale, processing, and pick up of the carcass animals lies with the exhibitor. Processing sheets will be made available at the live evaluation. Exhibitors are responsible for any monetary obligations associated with the sale, processing, or delivery of their carcass lamb. Transportation from the live evaluation to the packer will be provided. Carcass shall be free of bruises, surgical altering, and evidence of injections in valuable carcass parts such as the leg, loin, and rack. Carcasses determined to be unsuitable will be disqualified. Intact male animals will be disqualified.

MARKET BEEF

Classification will be judged by weight by the Superintendent. No bulls or stags are to be exhibited.

A member may show a maximum of 1 steer, and may sell same. Members must be enrolled by February meeting date. All beef animals must have been weighed and tagged by designated Saturday in March, to exhibit and sell at 4-H Livestock Auction.

Location for weighing is the Calhoun County fairgrounds.

Ownership must be in the exhibitor's name or their immediate family.

Steers showing horns deemed unsafe by Superintendent will not be allowed to exhibit.

All market steers must weigh a minimum of 950 pounds to sell at the 4-H Livestock Auction unless deemed finished by beef club superintendent and leaders.

All beef club members need to exhibit a Feed Record in order to sell.

BEEF BREEDING

The breeding animals must be heifers or cows being kept for beef breeding purposes.

First year exhibitors are limited to 3 breeding animals. Advanced exhibitors may show 5 breeding animals. No breeding animal may be shown in more than one Division. Bulls will only be allowed to show in cow/calf Class. Exhibitors are allowed to exhibit 2 animals in one Class.

SWINE CARCASS

The Calhoun County 4-H Swine Carcass Show is open to any Calhoun County 4-H Swine Club member. The show is limited to 25 carcasses due to available cooler space at the packer's facility. If more than 25 members are interested in participating in the carcass show, we will limit by years of membership in the Swine Club (i.e. the 1st and 2nd year members will be eliminated first). All entries must be submitted by the 3rd Thursday in April.

Gilts & barrows are eligible & must not weigh over 280#. Only one pig per member may be entered into the Carcass Show.

A Live Evaluation Show and Carcass "On Rail" evaluation will be held prior to fair. Pigs must weigh at least 230#. Any pig under 230# will be sent to a packer or market immediately (cannot be entered in the carcass show or sent back to the farm).

Each participant of the Carcass Show is responsible for the sale of the carcass. The packer must have cutting instructions sent with the pigs on the evening of the Live Evaluation Show.

All participants will receive a premium and the 1st & 2nd place winners will receive an Award.

SWINE

4-H members will not be allowed to exhibit breeding swine at the Fair. A breeding exhibit will consist of a 14"x22" poster containing a picture of the breeding animal raised, its birth date, litter size, weaning date, feed and weight record.

All market swine must have proof of a negative blood test for Pseudorabies within 45 days of beginning of fair, subject to change. A pen of market hogs will consist of two (2) animals. All market hogs will be weighed on Sunday morning to determine weight Class for exhibition. The Superintendent of the 4-H Swine Exhibit will have authority to divide and/or combine Classes according to weight and numbers as warranted. First year exhibitors may show one animal only. Second year members may show two hogs but only one can sell through the 4-H Livestock auction. The 2nd market hog of the 2nd year member cannot go through the auction. All other members may show one pen of two market hogs and/or an individual market hog. If a member wishes to show in both the Pen and Individual Classes his entry in the individual Class must be one of the animals from his pen of two market hogs. Gilts exhibited in the market Class may not be entered in breeding Classes.

To be eligible for the market Classes and livestock sale, hogs must weigh 220 lbs. and not more than 290 lbs. Market animals weighing less than 220 lbs. will be entered in the feeder pig Class. Feeder pigs are not eligible for sale at the 4-H Livestock auction.

The exhibitor must have owned all animals being exhibited since May 1, current year.

SWINE CERTIFICATION

PROJECT ANIMAL CERTIFICATION: We certify that we will not have administered to the animal(s), nor has it received, any substance not approved by the Federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA), the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and/or the County the exhibition is being held. 4-H & Youth Fair for slaughter/breeding stock/exhibition animals. This includes, but is not limited to, diuretics, steroids, repartitioning agents, tranquilizers and analgesics. We also certify that, with respect to any drug, chemical or feed additive approved

by the FDA and/or USDA for slaughter animals that no illegal use of approved chemical/compounds has taken place and that the applicable withdrawal period as recognized by the FDA has expired prior to shipping

We acknowledge and accept the fact that all animals entered at the County 4-H & Youth Fair may be subject to blood, urine and tissue tests, and that the Fair reserves the right to disqualify any animals, either live or slaughtered, found in violation of the use of drugs, chemicals or feed additives as described above and in the County Fair Book and policy brochure. Disqualification will result in the placing(s) of the animal in question being voided; the forfeiture of any and all

ribbons/trophies/special awards earned with the animal(s); voiding of the sale (s) if the animal(s) has been sold in the 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale. We will allow the designated tester/veterinarian to draw any and all samples deemed appropriate from our animals. We will indemnify and hold harmless the Fair and all of its sponsors and assisting organizations and their employees and agents, against all legal or other proceedings in connection with said testing procedures. We will indemnify and hold harmless the Fair and its sponsors and assisting organizations against all claims of injury to the animal and any damage or injury to any person or property caused by the animal.

ETHICAL AND HUMANE TREATMENT OF ANIMALS: We acknowledge that inhumane fitting, showing and/or handling practices or devices shall not be used. Furthermore, surgery, injection, or application of foreign material under and/or into the flesh of an animal to physiologically or physically change the natural contour or conformation of the animal is illegal. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, insertion of foreign material in the animal, or other such practices are not acceptable and will be prohibited. Violation of the above mentioned items could result in the disqualification of the animal and/or exhibitor.

We acknowledge and accept the fact that the Department Chairperson for a given animal species and the County Fairboard Livestock personnel may authorize the examination of a given animal for the identification purposes and/or health related concerns in our absence, including obtaining the temperature of the animal in question.

HORSES

All horses must be entered in Animal Exhibit. Exhibitors may enter other Classes as determined by exhibitor's age or size of animal, limited to one fitting and showing Class.

Classes shall be judged according to the standards as outlined in the 4-H Bulletin, 4-H-1145. SEI approved helmets are required for some Classes.

All horses must have been identified and under the management of the exhibitor by May 1 of the current year. Change of horses may be made for cause as approved by the Calhoun County Horse Leader Association prior to the fair.

POULTRY

Birds should be uniform in size, weight and finish.

All birds being exhibited must have been owned by the exhibitor since June 1, current year, except market Classes which have specific starting dates.

RABBITS

County exhibits are recommended to be purebred stock. All rabbits will be judged by the ARBA Standard.

GOATS

General

Ownership must be in the exhibitor's name or their immediate family or must have a written lease agreement that is approved by the superintendent to be eligible for championship Classes, special awards or the 4-H small animal auction. Exhibitors must be registered in a Calhoun County 4-H Goat Club.

An exhibitor may show a maximum of five animals and/or pack/cart animal, and one market wether, totaling no more than six animals. Thank you notes must be turned into a leader by end of week. All exhibitors must follow 4-H goat superintendent barn rules, copies available at the Extension Office.

out of market livestock on any and all approved chemicals/ compounds administered.

All pens are to be bedded with wood shavings (no straw). No bucks allowed. All dairy breeds must be free of horns. Market wether's horns are optional. Horns are allowed in non-dairy breeds. All dairy and market goats are to be fully clipped within 2 weeks of show day.

All Market wethers must be born on or after January 1, current year All Market wethers must be owned and castrated by mandatory spring weigh-in.

Each exhibitor may enter only one market Class. Grand and Reserve Grand Champion must be sold in the Small Animal Auction. All Market Wethers must be sold in small animal auction except C ribbon, or 'no sale' decision is communicated to leaders and superintendent by 7pm Monday, show day.

1st and 2nd year exhibitors entered in a market Class must complete Management/Feed Record. Feed records and Educational Exhibits will be judged on Saturday, pre-fair. Each pen must have adequate water, hay, and feed provided. Feeding grain on the ground will not be allowed. All exhibitors are required to fulfill barn duties. If barn duty is not done, premiums may be withheld at discretion of superintendent and leaders.

LARGE ANIMAL MARKET LIVESTOCK AUCTION SALE

The 4-H Market Livestock Auction Sale will be held on Friday beginning at 11:00 A.M. in the 4-H judging arena. For sale order, refer to sales flyer or 4-H auction sale catalog. Market beef, sheep and swine will not be re-weighed, but will be sold at their show weights. You can only win one Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion in one market species.

A commission will be charged on sales to cover sale promotion expenses.

Sale committee consisting of 4-H Countywide Market Beef, Sheep and Swine Club leaders will determine sale order and rule on any irregularities.

HOGS

All 4-H exhibitors of market swine must sell. All hogs entered in the 4-H Market Hog Classes must weigh 220 to 290 lbs. The 2nd market hog of the 2nd year members cannot go through the auction. The 4-H Champion Individual, the Reserve Champion Individual, the 4-H Champion Pen, the Reserve Champion Pen, the 4-H Champion Home Grown Individual and the Reserve Champion Home Grown Individual, will be sold individually at the auction.

LAMBS

All exhibitors of market lambs must indicate whether they want to sell or not on Tuesday night of fair week before 8:00 pm. Animals designated by exhibitor as "not for sale" are still eligible for Championship Classes, but if named Grand Champion or Reserve Champion, they MUST be sold at the 4-H Livestock Sale. All lambs entered in the 4-H Market Classes, except the 2nd market lamb of the 1st year members, may be sold at the 4-H Livestock Sale. Grand Champion Individual and the Reserve Grand Champion Individual will be sold individually.

STEERS

All 4-H exhibitors of market steers must indicate whether they want to sell or not sell on entry day, when they will be weighed. Animals designated by exhibitor as not for sale are still eligible for championship Classes but if named Reserve Champion or Grand Champion, they must be sold at the 4-H Livestock Auction. All 4-H exhibitors may sell one steer only. Any animal repurchased or bid-in will not be recognized as a 4-H project. The

Beef club superintendent and leaders reserve the right to reject any animal deemed not in marketable condition.

4-H SMALL ANIMAL AUCTION SALE

A 4-H Small Animal Auction Sale will be held on Wednesday beginning at 6:00 P.M. in the 4-H judging arena. All animals must have been exhibited to be sold.

You can show in all Small Animal Clubs, but you are only allowed to market through one. If you win Market Grand Champion or Reserve Champion in any of the Small Animal Clubs, you must sell per club bylaws. A small animal sale committee will determine sale order and rule on any irregularities. The committee reserves the right to reject any animal deemed not in condition to sell. NO "C" Exhibits will be SOLD at auction. A commission of 7% will be charged with 4% going to the club and 3% to the Small Animal Sale Committee. For sale order, refer to sales flyer or 4-H auction sale catalog.

GENERAL MARKET PROJECTS AUCTION SALE

- A 4-H General Market Project Auction Sale will be held on final Saturday of fair week at 3 pm in the 4-H Judging Covered Arena. Projects include: floriculture; clothing; sewing; knitting/crocheting; needlework; woodworking/industrial arts; ceramics; crafts; stamping; jewelry; paintings/drawings/sculptures; & photography.
- The General Market Project Auction Committee will determine sale order and rule on any irregularities.
- A commission of 3 % will be charged from each 4-H member participating in the auction. It will go to the General Project Auction Committee, toward sale expenses.
- Responsibility of buyer: Pay for item in full on auction day. Conglomerates of buyers are allowed and will need one representative to collect money from its' members and make payment on auction day, and receive auction item.
- 5. Responsibility of members auctioning project include inviting buyers and handing out invitation letters/admission pass. Wear either club t-shirt and tidy jeans or casual show clothes during auction. Assist in set up of auction area ½ hour prior to sale, greet buyers and deliver item to purchaser. Write buyer a thank you note
- Basic General Market Projects may include more than one item from a Class when related as a set. Advanced General Market Project Classes should include more than one related items from different Basic /Division 9 Classes as a combination (Dept 72).
- 7. Each 4-H member may enter both Basic and Advanced Market Projects, as long as market records are kept for each Division separately. There is no restriction against entering a market project similar to another item entered in a non-market Division, as the marketing project is a product of 4-H craftsmanship. Member must invite potential Buyers to the auction sufficient for both projects.
- Each club member must register their market projects on the Exhibitor Entry Form.
- Each participant must enter both the project to be auctioned (from Division 9 / Division 12) and the market records (from Division10/ Division 13). Original marketing, Division 11, is an optional Class (Dept 72).
- 10. Judging Day is the Saturday that general projects are judged, beginning at 9:00 a.m. All market records will be judged by a single judge. Basic General Market Projects will be judged in the usual manner for each project type: woodworking by woodworking judge, photography by photography judge, etc. It is important to understand and follow general craftsmanship guidelines for each project area.
- 11. All basic and advanced general market projects must receive an "A" award on judging day AND all general market records must receive an "A" or "B" on judging day, for the related market project to be eligible for the auction sale. It is the responsibility of the club member to follow the guidelines available from the fair office for general craftsman of a project. This is especially important for woodworking, industrial arts, ceramics, and flower arrangements.
- Should the market project earn a B/C award or if the market records earn a C award, the project is displayed during fair week

- and premium is awarded, however member will NOT be allowed to sell project in the auction.
- 13. The general market project must be displayed in the General Market Project Auction Booth in the 4-H Boys and Girls Building for the week. Not the regular club booth. Projects may NOT be dropped off to the booth until judging concludes for the day (3:00 p.m.) Projects are released to the buyers after the buyer has completed paperwork at the auction. Records will be available for pick up on Sunday after fair week (9-2p.m.).
- 14. Best of Class Rosette and Best of Show awards may be awarded in each Class, competing only against projects entered in that Class. Club members take these awards home at end of fair.
- 15. If 4-H member has completed market projects & corresponding market records, but is unable to attend judging, projects must be accompanied by letter of explanation when shown by another 4-H club member (or sibling, as allowed by 4-H). If 4-H member is unable to attend auction, a written explanation should be given to the General Market Project superintendent and provide the name of the 4-H club member who will participate in the auction on behalf of absent 4-H club member. In either of these instances, the 4-H member registered in market project is responsible to invite potential buyers to the auction.

You may not enter any other riding Class except for Walk/Trot Trail, Green as Grass, Walk/Trot Pattern Class, Walk/Trot over Ground Poles or Walk/Trot Cloverleaf.
- 4. Dressage: Enter only one Class. If you placed 1st thru 3rd in Green as Grass, you must move to Training Level 1, Test 1, when showing the same horse and rider combination. If you placed 1st thru 3rd in Training Level 1, Test 1, you must move to Training Level 1, Test 2, when showing the same horse and rider combination.
- 5. Walk/Trot Equitation over Ground Poles & Walk/Trot Equitation over Fences: You must enter only one Class. You may not enter Hunter Hack Class.
- 6. Novice English/Western Riding & Basic Riding 1 & 2: You may enter only one Class. If you placed 1st thru 3rd in Basic Riding 1 Class last year at fair, you MUST move on to Basic Riding 2 or Novice English/Western Riding Class. If you placed 1st thru 3rd in Basic Riding 2 last year, you MUST move on to Novice English/Western Riding when showing the same horse and rider combination.
- 7. Ponies MUST be shown in pony Classes only, except where indicated with a H/P. When a member showing a pony is 19, the member MUST show in horse Classes.
- 8. If you are showing a 2 year old horse/pony, you may go in 2 & Under Halter, Showmanship, In-Hand Trail. If you want to ride in the regular riding Classes, you cannot go in 2 & Under Halter or In-Hand Trail.
- 9. In-Hand Trail Class is for 2 & Under horse/pony that is NOT ridden in regular Classes at fair. Also for any age horse/pony that is NOT ridden at fair.
- 10. Lunge Line Class is for 2 yr. olds & Under.
- 11. Horse reports must be exhibited at fair on Saturday of non-livestock judging in Horse/Science.

- Dogs must be 9 months old by fair in order to be exhibited, and one year old to be exhibited in agility.
- Members & parents will be responsible for the care and cleanup of their dog. Each member must provide the proper equipment.
- Dogs must have been enrolled in the 4-H Companion Dog Club by May 1 of current year to exhibit at fair. Members are able to be in one dog club in the State of Michigan.
- Each member must work and train their dog. A maximum of 2 dogs per member will be allowed, as long as the exhibitor has trained all the animals. They must compete in different Classes. All dogs must be owned &/or reside in members household.
- 5. Exhibit dogs will be kept at the Fair each day of showing. They will be brought in, exhibited and taken home on Show day.
- An exhibitor must notify Superintendent and Administrative leader at check-in, if your female is in season, if females are pregnant, or dog is lame the day of judging.
- Any exhibitor and/or dog who has paid a fee for Professional training for an agility or obedience degrees or titles in A.K.C., U.K.C. or any other organization other than 4-H or has shown in the entered agility or obedience from previous years, shall enter in the experienced Class.
- Anyone severely disciplining/abusing their dogs will be immediately dismissed from the show by the Superintendent or Administrative Leader.
- 9. A superintendent/administrative leader meeting will be called in the event of aggressive behavior, to determine the eligibility of the dog to continue to be shown that day. Any dog that bites at a 4-H function will be dismissed. Further participation in 4-H by the dog will be decided by the Superintendent and Administrative leader at their next meeting following the incident.
- Any dog that the dog leaders deem unsafe will be unable to exhibit at Fair.
- Three Dimensional exhibits must follow county 4-H guidelines. Available from the MSU Extension office.
- A notebook is required in order to show the project animal in performance events at the Fair along with Dog Project Form. Available at the MSU Extension office.
- Proper dress attire is to be worn in show ring. No advertising on clothes or leashes. Dress requirements available at the MSU Extension office.

- NO PROFESSIONAL grooming. This is the 4-H member's project to groom and bathe.

DEPARTMENT 72 – EDUCATIONAL GENERAL MARKET PROJECTS

- A 4-H General Market Project Auction Sale will be held on final Saturday of fair week at 3 pm in the 4-H Judging Covered Arena. Projects include: floriculture; clothing; sewing; knitting/crocheting; needlework; woodworking/industrial arts; ceramics; crafts; stamping; jewelry; paintings/drawings/sculptures; & photography.
- Basic General Market Projects may include more than one item from a Class when related as a set. Advanced General Market Project Classes should include more than one related items from different Basic /Division 9 Classes as a combination.
- 3. Each 4-H member may enter both Basic and Advanced Market Projects, as long as market records are kept for each Division separately. There is no restriction against entering a market project similar to another item entered in a non-market Division, as the marketing project is a product of 4-H craftsmanship. Members must invite potential Buyers to the auction in numbers sufficient to support both projects.
- Each club member must register their market projects on the Exhibitor Entry Form.
- Each participant must enter both the project to be auctioned (from Division 9 / Division 12) and the market records (from Division10/ Division 13). Original marketing, Division 11, is an optional Class.
- 6. Judging Day is the Saturday that general projects are judged, beginning at 9:00 a.m. All market records will be judged by a single judge. Basic General Market Projects will be judged by the usual for each project type: woodworking by woodworking judge, photography by photography judge, etc. It is important to understand and follow general craftsmanship guidelines for each project area.
- 7. All basic and advanced general market projects must receive an "A" award on judging day AND all general market records must receive an "A" or "B" on judging day, for the related market project to be eligible for the auction sale. It is the responsibility of the club member to follow the guidelines available from the fair office for general craftsmanship of a project. This is especially for woodworking, industrial arts, ceramics, and flower arrangements.
- 8. Should the market project earn a B / C award or if the market records earn a C award, the project is displayed during fair week and premium is awarded, however member will NOT be allowed to sell project in the auction.
- 9. The general market project must be displayed in the General Project Auction Booth in the 4-H Boys and Girls Building for the week. Not the regular club booth. Projects may NOT be dropped off to the booth until judging concludes for the day (3:00 p.m.) Projects are released to the buyers after the buyer has completed paperwork at the auction. Records will be available for pick up on Sunday after fair week (9-2p.m.).
- The General Project Auction Committee will determine sale order and rule on any irregularities.
- A commission of 3 % will be charged from each 4-H member participating in the auction. It will go to the General Project Auction Committee, toward sale expenses.
- 12. Responsibility of members auctioning project include inviting buyers and handing out invitation letters/admission pass. Wear either club t-shirt and tidy jeans or casual show clothes during auction. Assist in set up of auction area ½ hour prior to sale, greet buyers and deliver item to purchaser. Write buyer a thank you note
- Responsibility of buyer: Pay for item in full on auction day. Conglomerates of buyers are allowed and will need one representative to collect money from its' members and make payment on auction day, and receive auction item.

- Best of Class Rosette and Best of Show awards may be awarded in each Class, competing only against projects entered in that Class. Club members take these awards home at end of fair.
- 15.
