A Letter from Les

Good cold, snowy morning 4-H faithful! It's February and I'm looking forward to a great year in Alcona County. For those of you that haven't heard, the millage that the county citizens passed last August to support MSU Extension will allow me (starting January 1st) to solely focus on Alcona County in my work duties, not to mention that it will also increase access to the MSU Extension Office– from 8 hours/week to 28! Needless to say that I will miss the staff, volunteers and families in losco, but I am VERY HAPPY to be back in my home county. Though the 18 month period with the split assignment was not a favorable situation, the upside is that it made me a better programmer. I have seen the program through a different lens and I would like to start to use that new perspective to make our program in Alcona better. One of my goals for the upcoming year is to be very intentional about showing the community that their investment in MSU Extension is money well spent. I want to not only expand what we are doing, but also, more importantly, strengthen and grow the programs we already have in place. Inside that goal, I have a few specific goals:

Increase the number of youth taking advantage statewide and regional programs, trainings and shows. I can accomplish this by helping youth with scholarship dollars, arranging chaperones, promoting opportunities and making sure that all these opportunities are open to everyone.

Increase the visibility of club programming. This will be the one I will need help from club leaders, parents and members. Clubs continue to be the 4-H outlet that creates the most amount of impact. For example – Before I learned about it in my 4-H club, I didn't know how to sew a button on my shirt. You can throw any example in the sentence– sheer a sheep, bake a cake, show a horse, teach a skill; but the important thing is to get the community to realize that this program does (or can do) all of those things. I can accomplish this goal by submitting press releases, having better communication with clubs and asking for **photos** for our upcoming 4-H SHOWCASE magazine.

Increase support and opportunities for volunteers. This is crucial because volunteers are the ones that are making the most difference in the lives of youth. They are often times working directly with youth and are heavily invested in that process. For me, accomplishing this also requires help from volunteers. If you are struggling with something club related, let me know. If I can't fix it myself, I will help find the resources to make sure it gets fixed. If you would like to attend a training, I can help you get there.

In short, I need to communicate better (more often) with volunteers and families, the community at large as well as stakeholders and community partners. We need to tell the great story of 4-H in Alcona County and tell it to anyone who'll listen.

By the way, this newsletter will help with the communications goals-enjoy!

4-H at the Breslin Program features local 4-H Club

4-H at the Breslin is more than just a MSU Women's basketball game. It's a chance for more than 4,000 4-H members, their families and friends to explore the world of Michigan 4-H through interactive displays and projects set up on the Breslin Center concourse. The program, in it's 6th year, has been a very successful recruiting tool for Michigan 4-H, as well as attracting several thousand more fans than a normal Division I Girls game.

But for one Alcona 4-H club, it's even more than that. For the members of Born in a Barn 4-H club, it's a chance to get on the floor, interact with the players and lead the 4-H pledge in front of the anticipated 5,000 fans in attendance. The members and leaders of Born in a Barn will be on the floor at halftime to lead the pledge as well as welcome the players back on the court to start the second half of the game.

This years game will be between the MSU Lady Spartans and the Wisconsin Lady Badgers and will happen on Sunday, March 3rd at the Breslin Center in East Lansing. Tipoff will be at 2PM and the gates will open at 12:30.

Participants are encouraged to show their team spirit as well as their Spartan Pride by dressing in green.

A limited number of free tickets are available at the MSU Extension Office in Harrisville—for more information or to reserve yours, call Les at 724-6478. Orders placed before February 22 will be mailed— after that date, orders will have to be picked up at the office. In the event that the Alcona tickets run out, more can be ordered, but they will be only available at the "will-call" window at the event.

Fundraiser Policy for all clubs

Step one: Club determines that they **need money for something**. Could be a trip, membership fees, club resources, 4-H paraphernalia; whatever. You may not raise money for the sake of having it.

Step two: Club **plans** on a fundraising project, carwash, bottle drive, bake sale—something that all or most of the members will be able to help with. Remember that raffles or other *games of chance* are not allowed for 4-H clubs in Michigan

Step three: The club leader **submits a fundraising request** to the MSU Extension Office no less than 2 weeks prior to the start of the fundraiser event. This document can be picked up at the office or can be found in the Michigan 4-H Treasurer's book.

Step four:Wait until confirmation is given for thefundraiser; either right then by staff or by phone or mail.You may NOT go ahead with the fundraiser unless this con-firmation is given.

Step five: **Conduct fundraiser** and make sure to include all members; this can be a very valuable learning experience for everyone. Make sure that all moneys are accounted for and that they are carefully tracked using the Michigan Treasurer's book.

Step six: **Complete** the Fundraiser Wrap-Up form found in the Michigan 4-H Treasurer's handbook. Mail or drop it off to the Alcona County MSU Extension office.

A reminder--All clubs will be asked to complete an **Annual Fiscal Statement** to be on file with the MSU Extension Office no later than November 1 of the following 4-H year. If your club had no fiscal activity (no current balance or money raised or spent on behalf of the club in the past year) simply zero the form and return it to the office. Bank slips and receipts should be turned in where appropriate.

Alcona 4-H Advisory Council

The Alcona 4-H Advisory Council recently approved their 2011-12 budget including numerous items that will benefit the active 4-H family. Through tireless fundraising, the council has set aside funds for youth and adults to use when attending 4-H programs on the local, regional and state levels. Additionally, funds from the annual membership fee are also available for youth wishing to attend state programs for the first time such as Exploration Days and Great Lakes and Natural Resources Camp. 50% of the member fees collected annually stays within the county to be used in this manner.

Scholarship Policy

Any current 4-H member may request that an educational program be paid for up to 50% of the total cost of registration, not to exceed \$50 annually per member. To apply, simply request this benefit when registering with the Alcona MSU Extension Office. In the event of a no-show where fees are collected, the scholarship will be removed and payment must be made by participant. This benefit will occur at time of registration.

Training Policy

Any youth or adult registered volunteer attending an educational training program, may request up to 50% of the total cost of registration be paid for elective training and 100% for mandatory training (not including room upgrades.) In the event of a no-show where fees are collected, this benefit will be removed and payment must be made by participant. This benefit will come in the form of a reimbursement after completion of the program. Loans for Market Beef Projects

The Ludlow Family of Alpena has set aside money in a loan program for any youth who wishes to raise a beef project and would like financial help to get started. This is a zero interest loan that can offer up to \$500 per year on a first come—first served basis. All loans are subject to repayment by September 30th without penalty.
