Have You Sold Cattle on the Farm?

If so, be sure you paid the \$1 Checkoff.

Did You Know?

Every time you sell a bovine animal, regardless of age, sex, breed, purpose, or number a dollar-a-head is due. The dollar is to be collected by the buyer from the seller, although both parties are responsible for remittance. The Checkoff is designed so that everyone pays their fair share.

How are you Checkoff dollars being used?

- Beef and veal television, radio, and print advertising
- Food safety, health and nutrition research
- Product technology and development
- Educating consumers and children about beef's role in a healthy diet
- Refuting issues that could negatively impact the beef industry (such as BSE, E. Coli and Footand-Mouth disease.)

How Do You Pay?

Complete a remittance form and mail it along with your check to the Michigan Beef Industry Commission. Additional remittance forms are available through the Michigan Beef Industry Commission, 2145 University Park Drive, Suite 300, Okemos, MI 48864. Fax: (517) 347-0919

Who Pays?

When cattle are sold or imported, the buyer of the cattle must withhold a \$1 per head, or equivalent, from the seller's purchase price. Failure to do so is a violation of the law and may be subject to a \$5,500 penalty. It's the law—no one is exempt.

Michigan has had a long relationship with Belize. In 1968, Michigan 4-H was asked to travel to Belize to start a Belize 4-H program. It was a success and we have been partners with Belize 4-H ever since. They have decided to bring a small delegation of 4 youth to Michigan June 19-July 10 to experience our culture and Michigan 4-H. The boys will attend 4-H Exploration Days June 20-22 and then meet their host families. We are in need of host families for these 4 boys. The boys are ages 14-17 and they speak English.

***Belize is our first priority right now since they arrive in two weeks, but as for the 29 Japanese, 9 Korean, and 1 Taiwan delegates, we are still looking for host families for 4 Japanese boys, 4 Korean boys and 3 male chaperones (two week stays for chaperones).

Rabbit Project Update

Can you believe fair is only two months away? Now is the time to really focus on your showmanship skills, working with your rabbits, and finishing your posters and rabbit notebooks.



Our next meeting will be the Breed check in on June 9th in the arena at the fairgrounds. This does count as one of the three meetings required to be eligible to show at fair. If you have a conflict, you can designate a family member to bring your rabbit to the check in. We ask that you please tell us who will be bringing your rabbit.

Additional information about fair will be provided at the Breed check in on June 9th and there will be an opportunity to practice showmanship and get your last-minute questions answered.

At the Rabbit breed check in we will have a picnic. Hot dogs will be provided. All we ask is that each family bring a passing dish. Table service will be provided.

Fun Facts:

- Beeswax come from the abdomen glands of a worker bee, they use the wax to form the walls and caps of the comb.
- Mosquitoes prefer O-type blood, people with high body heat, pregnant women and heavy breathers. Many of these reasons are because mosquitoes can sense carbon dioxide (CO2) from up to 100 feet away. Which is a reason they circulate around our heads where we exhale CO2.
- Apart from insects, hummingbirds have the highest metabolism of all animals
 due to the need to keep their wings rapidly beating. Because of this the hummingbird visits hundreds of flowers each day and consuming more than their
 own weight in nectar each day.

July 20: Fitting and Showmanship clinic

We will be combining with the Beef project for a fitting and showmanship clinic on July 20 at 6pm at the Myer Farm (7565 40th St South, Scotts MI 49088). We will be going over the basics of fitting steers for show as well has having some showing tips.

This will be a potluck, so we ask every family to bring a dish to pass and a lawn chair. Hot dogs, lemonade, and paperware will be provided.

July 28: Barn cleanup

8 am — when we get done we will be cleaning up the dairy/feeder calf barn at the fairgrounds. Youth that attend the entire day will receive a free ride wrist band from the Kalamazoo County Youth Fair.

Please bring rags, buckets, scrub brushes, paint brush/rollers, and a smile! Pizza and pop will be provided for those that help.

August 2: Pre- Fair Mandatory Meeting

Meet at the dairy/feeder calf barn for a meeting at 7pm- don't forget to sign in! If you cannot come, you must make arrangements with Veronica at the fair office (269) 383-8830.

We will be decorating the barn in a Red/ White/ Blue theme this year- check out Hobby Lobby and JoAnn's for some good deals!

August 4: Still Exhibit check in/Calf check in

Bring your feeder calf educational exhibit to the fairgrounds to be judged. Here is the link for the required notebook for feeder calves: http://msue.anr.msu.edu/resources/4 h market animal record book. It is considered the minimum- be creative! A profit and loss statement must be filled out and included in your educational exhibit for your calf to be sold in the auction (as well as minimum calf weight of 366.5 lbs at weigh-in on Sunday, August 5).

You can check in your calves into the dairy/feeder calf barn between 4:30p and 6:00p - Greg or Sara must look at your calf before the calf comes off of the trailer.

<u>August 5: Calf check-in/ Weigh-in/ Showmanship clinic</u>

You can check-in your calves into the dairy/feeder calf barn between 9:00a and 12:00p - Greg or Sara must look at your calf before the calf comes off of the trailer.

Feeder calf weigh-in will take place after the beef are weighed in.

We will have a showmanship clinic in the exercise arena – time TBD.

August 8: Feeder calf show

The feeder calf show will be held at 1:00p.

August 9: Auction

For your calf to be eligible to go through the auction, you must have submitted a picture via Facebook/email/ mail to Sara or Greg by earlier in the year (May), a picture of a clean calf/clean 4H member must be given to either Sara or Greg on Tuesday of fair (to be given to your buyer), your calf must have weigh at least 366.5 lbs on Sunday, August 5, and you must have a profit and loss statement filled out.

Dear Michigan 4-H families and volunteers:

With the busy summer months approaching, Michigan State University (MSU) Extension would like to take this opportunity to make you aware of a change to the Michigan 4-H participant age policy that will be implemented this fall. Michigan 4-H Youth Development serves youth 5-19 years of age. Youth 5-8 years of age are currently considered Cloverbuds and participate in fun, non-competitive learning experiences whereas youth 9-19 participate in both competitive and non-competitive experiences. All learning actives, regardless of age, are designed to be age appropriate. However, beginning September 1, 2018, the Michigan 4-H Participant Age Policy will change so that youth 8-19 years of age will participate in both competitive and non-competitive learning experiences, while youth 5-7 years of age will remain Cloverbud participants.

This policy change is being implemented by MSU Extension after lengthy consultation with early childhood and Michigan 4-H youth development staff, as well as careful consideration of research regarding youth and competition. Furthermore, it will move Michigan 4-H into alignment with counterparts across the country, including National 4-H.

As always, age appropriateness and safety will remain a top consideration for 4-H programming areas and Michigan 4-H will continue to have minimum age limits for certain learning environments that may not be appropriate for children 8 years of age. Additionally, individual county 4-H programs with MSU Extension will also retain their right to determine the beginning age for 4-H involvement within that county.

Upcoming changes to Michigan 4-H Age Policy



Beginning September 1, 2018, the Michigan 4-H Participant Age Policy will change to reflect a younger beginning age for 4-H members. The new age for 4-H members will be 8 to 19 years old, continuing to use January 1 of the program year as the date of calculation. The 4-H Cloverbud experience will remain available to youth ages 5-7.

This policy change is being implemented by MSU Extension after lengthy consultation with early childhood and Michigan 4-H youth development staff, as well as careful consideration of research regarding youth and

competition. Furthermore, it will move Michigan 4-H into alignment with counterparts across the country, including National 4-H.

As always, age appropriateness and safety will remain a top consideration for 4-H programming areas and Michigan 4-H will continue to support minimum age limits for certain learning environments that may not be appropriate for children 8 years of age. Additionally, individual county 4-H programs with MSU Extension will also retain their right to determine the beginning age for 4-H involvement within that county.
