WHAT IS THE MICHIANA IRRIGATION ASSSOCIATION


The Michiana Irrigation Association is a nonprofit professional organization formed in 1980 with the following primary objectives:

Corn: Seed corn and field corn. In Michigan more than 200,000 acres of corn comprise 51.7% of all irrigated crops; in Indiana, the percentage is even higher.
