Price Risk Management Opportunities in the Beef Cattle Business

Beef Cattle prices can be severely impacted by events occurring in one day or over time. In 2019, a fire at a large packing plant severely reduced harvest capabilities in this country and drove prices of feeder cattle and market ready cattle down over the next several months. In 2020, many packing plants were shut down over various periods of time due to many workers contracting Coronavirus and drove cattle prices lower. In both years, cattle producers sold both feeder cattle and market cattle at prices lower than expected.

Cattle prices through 2023 have been at record level highs. Most of the reasons behind these prices are due to low supply and stable demand. The US cattle population appears to be stable with no indication of an increase in numbers through next year. Consequently, prices should be high again next year unless something happens on the demand side.

Cattle producers that take the opportunity to obtain market price protection will frequently realize more income than producers that do not during times of falling cattle prices. The USDA Risk Management Agency (RMA) has implemented a market price insurance program since 2004. The Livestock Risk Protection program (LRP) allows producers to purchase market price protection insurance against falling markets. Farm business management educators and specialists at Michigan State University Extension recommend developing marketing plans and developing market risk strategies.

Through LRP, producers can purchase market protection from insurance agents in a similar manner to buying crop insurance. Agents selling crop insurance frequently sell LRP policies. The LRP works similarly to purchasing put options setting a floor on the market price; however, LRP like crop insurance is government subsidized. LRP insurance fits with various size operations as producers can get protection on as few as one head.

It is critically important to point out that LRP policies offer market price protection and have no influence on the price producers receive for their cattle. Cattle are sold and marketed by producers in the method of their choosing. Consequently, producers are still encouraged to market cattle for cash sale to the best of their ability. The actual policy is insurance against cattle market prices going lower.

In most years it can be difficult to get really good prices locked in on the fall feeder calf index. This year appears to be unique and that prices for the feeder calf index can be logged in at prices of \$2.50 - \$2.65 per pound for five weight calves and \$2.35 - \$2.40 per pound for 750 weight calves. Right now, you can buy those policies for about \$70 - \$100 per head. That may seem expensive, but it is the price to lock in near record prices.

I have lots of experience using LRP's and if you're interested, I'd love you to call and we can talk about the details. I'm planning on using this as one of the topics during the winter beef meetings coming in January or February.

Farms Branching Out:

Expanding opportunities for agroforestry markets, connections, and conservation

We are a team from Michigan State University, University of Wisconsin-Madison, Ohio State University, Central State University (Ohio), and the USDA Forest Service who were recently funded to survey and interview farmers and natural resource professionals to better understand and accelerate agroforestry practice uptake and to develop a research protocol for agroforestry demonstration farms that will also host long-term research.

What are Agroforestry practices?

Agroforestry Practices	Examples
Alley Cropping: The planting of rows of trees and/or shrubs to create alleys within which agricultural or horticultural crops are produced.	
Forest Farming: The cultivation of high-value crops under the protection of a managed tree canopy.	
Riparian Forest Buffers: An area adjacent to a stream, lake, or wetland that contains a combination of trees, shrubs, and/or other perennial plants and is managed differently from the surrounding landscape, primarily to provide conservation benefits.	
Silvopasture: The deliberate integration of trees and grazing livestock operations on the same land.	
Windbreaks: Linear plantings of trees and shrubs designed to provide economic, environmental and community benefits.

Peer-to-Peer Agroforestry Exchanges

Are you interested in sharing information with like-minded individuals? We are seeking farmers who would **host** an Agroforestry Exchange at their farm (or a series of meetings). We are recruiting interested farmers who have already initiated an agroforestry practice, are thinking about initiating a practice in the next 1-2 years (so we can follow your process of installing this practice), or are not yet sure if agroforestry is a good fit for their land. Case study materials (videos, photos, written material) would be shared on the National Agroforestry Center website, the project website, and with other groups who serve farmers. Interviews will inform research to better understand the decision-making process for agroforestry practices.

Demonstration sites for field days

Are you interested in your property becoming an educational site? We are seeking farmers with current agroforestry practices to host other farmers for field days and demonstrations. We will support you with refreshments, guest speakers, and assist with logistics.

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Pasture Walks are a great way to spend an evening

What's a pasture walk? It's an event, hosted at a farm that is pasturing some type of livestock. In the case of the pasture walks that I have worked with, we have been on sheep, beef and dairy farms.

Discussion topics are chosen through a series of conversations with the coordinator and the host farm, typically showcasing one or more innovative or game-changing ideas that farmers have developed. For example, some focus on watering systems and others on fencing. Other topics include bale grazing, strategies for handling the spring flush, supplements, pest control, soil health, shade, sacrifice lots, plus, marketing and sales.

In a typical grazing season, <u>Michigan State University Extension</u> educators, along with partner agencies like <u>Michigan Natural Resources Conservation Service</u> (NRCS), <u>Michigan Agriculture Environmental Assurance Program</u> (MAEAP), and <u>local Conservation Districts</u> host two to four pasture walks. In 2022, there was an increase to seven.

In terms of excitement about pasture walks, the 2023 pasture walk season proved to be even better, with a total of 11 being conducted in Michigan. Thanks to the support of the Michigan Forage Council, we were able to offer food and drinks at almost every one of these events. Average attendance at each of these events was around 30, allowing for great discussion, learning and network building. Geographically, the 2023 pasture walks were conducted across the state from southern Michigan to the western Upper Peninsula, and many places in between.

There is excitement brewing about trying one or two winter pasture walks. MSU Extension uses the Great Lakes Grazing Newsletter to inform people about our pasture related events. Stay informed of these events, by signing up to receive this newsletter.
