Lansing Riverfront Activation Project

Project Overview

The Lansing Riverfront Activation Project is an implementation-focused plan developed by the MSU Urban and Regional Planning Practicum Team in partnership with the Lansing Economic Development Corporation (EDC). The plan aims to outline strategies that will transform Lansing's riverfront into a more vibrant, accessible, and economically productive space. The project focuses on three key sites: Dietrich Park, Adado Riverfront Park, and the proposed pedestrian walkway site – each chosen for their potential to catalyze continued revitalization along the riverfront corridor.

Goal

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The overarching goal of this project is to provide an implementation "road map" to guide future development and position the riverfront as a valuable community asset. The following objectives outline the critical components necessary for achieving this vision:


- Trail improvement

Key Steps for Connectivity along the Riverfront Corridor

The focus areas revealed common themes for recommendations along the entire riverfront corridor:

- Add more lighting, public restrooms, and sanitation initiatives throughout the riverfront corridor
- Improve signage and wayfinding methods along the river trail
- Enhance pedestrian pathways, bike lanes, and street crossing to connect key areas along the riverfront corridor

Implementing these key steps in strategic areas along the corridor will activate Lansing's riverfront.


