4-H Club of the Month: 4-H Tech Changemakers

This group of teens is made up of teens from the Chelsea community who are leading a 4-H effort to address teen mental health in Washtenaw County, starting in their community. The teens first were invited to Microsoft HQ in Redmond, WA to learn about a new grant opportunity wherein they could address a community issue with technology as part of the solution. These teens quickly decided that teen mental health was the biggest issue they felt needed to be addressed back in their community in Michigan. From there they spent a year brainstorming and planning a tech cafe, a peer-helper training weekend, and currently are working on a "Think-a-thon" similar to a hack-a-thon, but to think about ways to address teen mental health both using and not using technology. They have been brave and proud 4-H spokespeople and we are glad to have them as part of our program.

Farm Safety Day is Back!

Farming is one of the most dangerous occupations there is in this country, and it involves many families. Farms are great places for children to play, visit and work, but they can also be places where kids are injured or even killed. In the U.S. every three days a child dies in an agriculture related incident and every day about 33 young people are injured in agriculture-related incidents. It is very important that young people and adults are educated about the potential hazards on a farm so that they can be safe while working and playing around a farm and are better prepared if an accident does occur. To help those who live and work on farms stay safe and learn the basics of farm safety, the Washtenaw County Farm Bureau and Washtenaw County 4-H program, in partnership with local Farm Bureau Insurance agents and the Manchester, Milan and Saline FFA Chapters, is hosting the Washtenaw Farm Safety Day. This educational program will be held on Saturday, April 6 in Buildings A & B at the Washtenaw Farm Council Grounds, 5055 Ann Arbor-Saline Road, Ann Arbor. Sign-in begins at 12:30 p.m. and the program will be held from 1 to 3 p.m. The program will be family focused and for all ages. Topics to be covered include tractor safety, grain and wagon safety, animal safety, first aid, fire safety and small equipment safety. Important Updates for Swine and Beef Exhibitors

Swine Exhibitors:

As many swine showman know, last year was the last year that the National Pork Board offered Youth Pork Quality Assurance certifications. If you went through the certification last year, that will still be accepted this year. However if you have never been certified, or are up for recertification this year we are offering Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) certification.

Beef Exhibitors:

On January 1, 2019 Tyson Foods announced that starting in 2019 they are requiring ALL beef producers who market their cattle with Tyson to receive a Beef Quality Assurance (BQA) certification. A large number of our cattle who are sold at the 4-H Youth Show are resold to Tyson through Napoleon Livestock Commission Company. Tyson has announced that they will be accepting YQCA for youth instead of BQA.

<u>What's Next:</u>

You can take the YQCA certification online at <u>http://yqca.org/</u>. As of right now, the only way to go through the certification is online, as Agriculture teachers and veterinarians are the only folks who can become YQCA instructors in the state of Michigan. Extension staff are trying really hard to A) find local instructors to teach an in person training, B) work with YQCA to allow Michigan Extension staff to become certified instructors. We realize that many folks in rural areas of the county do not have the greatest internet services, so we are more than willing to allow you to go through the online certification at the Extension Office. We also understand that right now this is confusing, and a big change so if you have questions you can call/email Kathleen at (734)222-3936 or nogglek1@msu.edu. In the next couple of months we will have more answers about where Extension Staff stand and what we will be requiring for Washtenaw County, so please stay tuned.

Livestock Weigh-In and Tagging Dates

Beef weigh-in and tagging will be March 2nd and **Lamb. goat. and feeder calf** weigh in and **swine** tagging will be **May 4th.** Both weigh-ins will be held at the Farm Council Grounds and will go from 8:00 – 11:00 AM. Here are a few reminders about weigh-in/tagging rules:

- ALL cattle must have an RFID tag in their ear at weigh-in and at the Youth Show
- Animals MUST be tagged in at the spring weigh-in in order to be shown at the Youth Show.
- Exhibitors are allowed to tag in up to 4 animals, but can only exhibit 2 at the Youth Show
- All males must be castrated before tagging
- All sheep and goats must have a Scrapies tag or tattoo at weigh-in and at the Youth Show
- Lambs cannot exceed **<u>110</u>** pounds at the spring weigh-in
- All market hogs must be tagged at the spring weigh-in, but they will NOT be weighed. Hogs are not allowed to leave the trailer

This year we will be opening the 2019 4-H Youth Show Registration on Martech Blue Ribbon on May 1st. Registration will be closed June 23 at 11:59 PM. This is moved up by one week, so please plan accordingly.

REGIONAL AND STATE 4-H OPPORTUNITIES

Ready to bring your fair projects home? Consider these tips as you prepare to purchase your livestock project!

Acquiring new livestock is exciting, no matter if it is to build your herd or if it is the purchase of your annual 4-H project. Making sure to do your homework so that you are fully prepared is key in starting off on the right foot. Michigan State University Extension recommends that you take the time to get all of the important health information about potential purchases from the seller and that you prepare animal housing facilities ahead of time. Taking these steps will help to make the transition to a new home as stress free as possible.

Assessing Animal Health and Treatment Documentation

When purchasing animals, it is important to know their history. Answering the following questions will help you make an informed purchase:

- 1) When was the animal born?
- 2) What vaccinations has the animal been given and when were they given?
- 3) Have any other treatments been administered to the animal (deworm, delouse, antibiotics, etc.)? If so, what is the withdrawal period for the drugs given?
- 4) Have any of the animals on the farm been ill or shown symptoms of illness?
- 5) If acquiring a market animal, what is the approximate weight?

Bringing New Stock Home

Once you make the decision to purchase new stock, there are many additional considerations to keep in mind. These include:

- 1) **Transportation.** If you do not own a trailer, you may need to make arrangements with the breeder or someone else that has a trailer to transport animals for you. Please remember that although some people may want to help you out free of charge, as a courtesy, you should be prepared to pay someone to provide transportation.
- 2) **Unloading.** Making sure that your facility is ready to acquire new livestock before they arrive is essential and can make the transition less stressful. Make sure that you have a pen identified for new animals to go into that is set up with water and appropriate feed when you arrive.

- 3) **Settling in.** Newly acquired animals should be quarantined, or kept away from other animals that are already housed on the premises, for a minimum of 21 days. The more physical space you can put in between animals, the better.
- 4) **Comingling.** When you are beginning to comingle animals, remember that each specie has a herd hierarchy. It is important to make sure that hazards to animals as they establish their place in the herd or flock are kept to a minimum.
