### Meet Ryan!

### What are your 4-H achievements?

I recently became a member of the 4-H Michigan State Youth Leadership Council (SYLC), which works to spread the ideas of 4-H by improving existing programs and making more people aware of the impact 4-H has. Our job is to spread the word about 4-H to both youth and donors, as well as come up with ideas to make Michigan 4-H a better place for everyone. At our last meeting, we discussed plans for an ASL club! We also volunteer at different events across the state, where we share the work 4-H is doing to the community.

#### How and when did you get involved with 4-H?

I joined 4-H in 2020 during the [COVID-19] lockdowns. My mother was looking for virtual activities for my siblings and I to do, and she came across 4-H. I pretty much did every virtual program 4-H offered for that first year. At the start, it was primarily little nerdy clubs, including a Dungeons and Dragons club, an Among Us club, a few cooking classes, a class about the history of the Navy, and a neat little group where we designed LEGO sets using an online system. Eventually it expanded to adulting classes, such as Adulting 101, a course on helping to save for college (with Frank, who I now work with in SYLC), and, of course, Future

I volunteer in Detroit at Pingree Farms as the 4-H Youth Leader. I work as a Licensed Veterinary Technician in Biomedical Science and Emergency Veterinary Medicine. I got started with 4-H through a colleague and very close friend of mine, Mykela Orsette. We were at work one day, and she was telling me about her experience in 4-H growing up. I mentioned to her that my kids were interested in joining a 4-H club. She directed me to the website, and we found a club in our area. We have been involved ever since.

# What has been your favorite or most fulfilling part of volunteering with 4-H?

My favorite part of volunteering for 4-H is being able to share my passion for animals and learning to the kids. Making big concepts that seem huge and important into something fun and understandable. We have all types of project areas in our program, but animal science is what the kids tend to gravitate towards the most. The most fulling part for me is watching how much care and responsibility the kids put into their projects. I also enjoy watching the club members grow from student to teacher. The main goal is to instill confidence in the kids. Confidence comes through knowledge, and this fosters independence.

#### What volunteer projects do you like most to be a part of?

I enjoy teaching the kids about animal welfare, enrichment and veterinary science. I also enjoy teaching about biosecurity and helping the kids produce health maintenance plans for the animals and SOPs for the farm. We did a blood draw workshop this summer and some of the club participants were able to learn and practice venipuncture [the puncture of a vein] on goats. The blood samples were used for health screenings, and they learned about the different diseases that the blood was being checked for. I also enjoy teaching the kids about public speaking and leadership.

#### Do you have any advice for other 4-H Volunteers?

My advice for other 4-H volunteers would be to bring whatever skill you have or whatever your strengths are and lead with that. 4-H is so many things. Lots of "helping hands". You never know what activities the youth members are interested in exploring. You never know what asset your experience with a hobby, or a subject area could be to the club. Don't be afraid to coordinate educational activities, community service or fun activities to see what different projects the kids may be interested in doing.

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# WAYNE COUNTY 4-H SUCCESS STORY

## All About Cattle 4-H Afterschool Program at The Dearborn Academy

The All About Cattle program was a three-week afterschool program, with the goal of teaching youth about the cattle industry. Youth were taught the ins and outs of the cattle industry, while also participating in fun, educational activities.

In week one, youth received a general overview of cattle, how they live, what they eat, and what their purposes are. The youth got to participate in a fun hands-on stomach digestion activity as they learned the difference between a ruminant and a monogastric digestive system. Youth also examined feedstuffs and discovered all the ingredients that go into a cow's diet.

In week two, we focused on the dairy industry. Youth learned how the dairy industry has advanced over the years and how technology has made the dairy industry more productive. They were also able to make their own homemade butter. This was a huge hit, we made as much butter as we had cream! One of the 4-H volunteers also shared her experience back in her home country: how they used to make butter on their farm, a few different methods they used, as well as what they used the buttermilk for. The youth thought it was so cool, one of them shouted, "Can we make biscuits too, Ms. Ashleigh?!" If only we had an oven, all the ingredients, and more time we definitely would have!

Lastly, in week 3 youth learned about the beef industry. We talked about some differences between beef and dairy cattle, and different recipes you can make with beef. The youth shared the various ways their families prepare beef at home. This was a very diverse group made up of cultures including Muslim and Arabic, Hispanic, black, and white youth. Some of the meals shared were beef tacos, shawarma, cheeseburgers, and more. One of the youth, of Muslim identity, also went into depth about how in his culture they can only eat beef if it is halal. The youth explained to the rest of the classroom, for those who may not have been familiar with halal, what it was and how it consisted of the animal being butchered and processed a special way. The most exciting part was when we brought in a 3-week-old calf to school for the participants to handle at the end of the program. For many of the youth, this was the first time they ever saw a cow in person, we had all levels of excitement and fear, but we made sure to go over safety measures to take while interacting with the calf. It was the perfect way to end the program and leave a lasting impression on the youth.

This program was a huge success. The youth loved 4-H and all the experiences it brought. Every week the youth were engaged and eager to learn. It was a rather large group with 40 youth, but it was successful, and learning was never hindered because we had amazing 4-H volunteers and staff to help make the program a success! I will never forget every time I walked into the school, and the youth running up to me and saying, "Hey! You're the 4-H lady, we miss you!" I am so glad not only did they remember me four months later, but that I was able to come back and provide them with yet another amazing 4-H experience.

# MSU Extension announces statewide public listening sessions

Whether it's supporting the dedicated professionals who drive the state's agriculture economy or empowering children to develop leadership skills, helping others is central to the mission of Michigan State University Extension, the community outreach arm of the university.

"Service is at the core of who we are," said Quentin Tyler, director of MSU Extension. "As we think strategically about our organization, we value input from those we serve most of all."

With that in mind, MSU Extension is holding a series of public listening sessions at various locations across the state as part of an ongoing strategic direction process. These sessions will begin in late November and continue through mid-December.

Through these sessions, the organization hopes to gather input from a diverse group of people to determine where MSU Extension is, what is working well and opportunities for improvement. This feedback will be used to help shape MSU Extension's priorities and service for years to come.

Each listening session will begin with a welcome from MSU Extension leadership and staff. Then, participants will be divided into two groups – external participants and partners will gather in one room, and MSU Extension faculty and staff will gather in another. In each of these rooms, participants will be invited to share their perspectives and insights through a series of facilitated activities. Questions will center on topics such as: emerging social, economic, and other trends that participants expect will impact them in the future; what participants know MSU Extension for; what participants believe MSU Extension does well, and what they think can be improved; and what participants envision a thriving MSU Extension would look like in the future. Common themes heard from participants will be identified and reflected to the entire group for each activity.

**Everyone** is welcome and encouraged to attend – youth, parents, community and statewide partners, all MSU Extensionaffiliated faculty and staff, and curious community members. Translation and interpretation services, as well as other accommodations, may be available upon request.
